It's important for kids of all ages to learn how to identify ads and avoid dangerous content online.

## **Educator Prep**

#### **Materials:**

- Activities on pages 4-9 printed (1 per learner or group)
- Colored pencils, crayons or markers

#### Prep:

- Read through the game instructions.
- Print out pages 4-9 for each small group of learners. Provide some coloring supplies.

- Cut out the game cards ahead of time, or provide scissors so your learners can cut them out.

• Print out a copy of the answer sheet for each learner. Or, go over the answers together as a class.

#### **Objective:**

Understand that most ads are designed to sell products, but not all ads are legitimate. Learn how to identify common signs of scams.

#### **Key Terms:**

- Authentic: Truthful, trustworthy, genuine.
- Advertisement (Ad): A message that shares products or information. Fake ads may lead to dangerous sites or malware.
- Malware: Software that harms a system, steals money, or collects personal information.
- Scam: A message that tricks people into downloading malware, sharing personal information, or sending money.
- Bad Actor: A person who breaks into systems to install malware, steal money, or collect personal information.

#### **Background Information:**

Ads are all around us. Every day, we see billboards on the drive to school, hear ads on the radio, see pop-ups on our phones and watch influencers promote their sponsors. You may even have clicked on an ad to find this freebie.

While most ads are posted by legitimate businesses and organizations, there are many ads out there that lead to dangerous websites or malware. With emerging technology covering more and more of our world with ads, it becomes critical to learn how to spot the fakes.

Read through Ada and Patti's story to set the scene, then practice identifying good and bad ads with this fun game!



### Story

Welcome to the ad moderation team! Our company sells ad space on our website to earn money to run the site, pay employees, and cover other business costs. Your job is to approve or deny ads that we have received.

Moderators often work with automated systems to find ads or user posts that do not follow the site's terms of use. These systems take user reports, search for keywords, check links, and use other methods to find posts that may break the rules. Today, your role is to check the ads that have been flagged for moderation.

Many of the ads you'll see are authentic. They come from trusted sources, like businesses or organizations with good reputations. Authentic ads are honest and promote products, services, or other messages that are useful and safe.

However, not everyone is honest online. Bad actors try to steal from their viewers by running scams that trick people into downloading malware, sending money, or sharing personal information.

It's your job to sort through the ads and keep our viewers safe!


Looking for red flags will help you spot scams. Let's learn some common red flags and practice finding them.



#### Steps:

- 1. Split into pairs or small groups.

- 5. Does the card have a red flag? If so, set it in the Scam pile. If not, set it in the Authentic pile.
- 6. Repeat until you run out of cards.
- 7. Check your work using the answer key.






