


GRANTA BEST OF YOUNG BRITISH NOVELISTS

Hitler, Stalin, Mum and Dad is a Sunday Times bestselling memoir, depicting one family's story of bravery, resilience and survival during one of the most terrible periods in human history. 
THE FRAUD: ZADIE SMITH

QUEEN'S PARK RESIDENT ZADIE SMITH RETURNS TO THE FESTIVAL WITH HER NEW NOVEL

Zadie Smith's new novel *The Fraud* is set in the 1870s in Kilburn and Jamaica. The famous 'Tichborne Claimant' trial has galvanized Britain. Two people, a widowed housekeeper and a former slave, have very different perspectives on the case and what it says about Britain, its people and its history. Zadie's first historical novel explores how, in a world of hypocrisy and self-deception, deciding what is true can be a complicated task. She will be in conversation with author and journalist Alex Clark.
