

### Bordeaux 2022

As you may have already heard, 2022 will be remembered as a bit of a miracle vintage. With hot and dry conditions over much of the summer, it has been the complete opposite of 2021 which had struggled with a lack of sun and too much rain. Climatically, the 2022 vintage is much more like 2018 or even 2003, and yet it seems to be a huge success.



#### THE BIG PICTURE

For us, a team who together has tasted many vintages over recent years, 2022 is a great year. It is marked by genuine surprise for the winemakers but reflects the huge strides Bordeaux has taken to improve the quality and knowledge of their supreme region. There is more concern for the environment, biodiversity and less intervention in the vineyard. Gentler processes are the norm in the winery with smaller batches of wines made to increase the quality of the whole blend.

#### THE WINES

The vintage was termed 'Prophetic' by the team at Château Haut-Bailly, who, along with many others, believe the hot, dry conditions of 2022 are set to be the norm in the future, due to global warming. The cooler nights kept the acidity levels up, which is why many tasting notes mention "freshness" and "purity of flavour" - descriptions we'd usually use in a cool vintage. Merlot, usually planted on the cooler, wetter clay soils, plays an important part of the blend this year for the most part. Old-vine Cabernet Sauvignon also seemed to keep this acidity, meaning many of the top châteaux have made a great wine with character and personality. Many of the 300 wines tasted are good enough to drink now, straight out of the barrel - an unthinkable notion even twenty years ago. Yet their superb balance also offers great ageing potential, credit to their greater structure and substance compared to previous vintages.

#### THE CONDITIONS

The foundations of this remarkable vintage were laid out long before the September harvest of 2022. A comparatively

wetter 2021/2022 winter in Saint-Emilion and Pomerol than in the Médoc would go on to prove invaluable, but the earlier part of the year was notable for the significantly warm and dry conditions. Many producers suggested the vines experiencing this lack of rainfall at the beginning of the year intuitively reduced their water intake, perhaps foreseeing the dry conditions to come across the region.

A hot, dry growing season June to September saw Bordeaux experience frequent and prolonged heat waves (with temperatures getting as high as 40°C). Indeed, Edouard Moueix informed us that the region had experienced the highest recorded sunshine hours between June and September since 1949 – a total of 1175 hours!

### "remarkable vintage"

Fortunately, there was some respite from the drought as showers in late June and July gave the vines some much-needed nourishment, staving off the worst effects of hydric stress. Significantly, and unlike recent hot vintages, night-time temperatures were sufficiently cool to enable the vines to rest and retain good acidity levels in the grapes.

When harvesting finally took place, it did so in perfect weather conditions. The absence of severe frost, coupled with consistent warmth and a lack of disease, has led to healthy thick-skinned grapes, rich in tannins with concentrated juice.

The wines are certainly extremely impressive."

# En Primeur: What does it mean?



This means that you pay for the wine itself when you place your order and the duty (currently £2.23 ex VAT per 75cl bottle) and VAT. (As of 1st August, £2.67 ex VAT per 75cl bottle) at the prevailing rates on the whole at the time of shipment and any other applicable tariffs. We anticipate shipping these wines in 2025.

### Left Bank

#### Médoc and Haut-Médoc

Invariably the realm of good value, straightforward clarets, amongst which some stars can be found. In a 'solar' year such as 2022 the cooler, less free-draining soils of the Médoc in the north come into their own so that properties like La Tour de By can, and have, made a compelling wine. The Fifth Growth Cantemerle has made another classy and sophisticated wine, as has Lanessan, situated just south of Beychevelle. Both of these benefit from their locations just outside the more premium communes. Another side to finding quality in these appellations is to follow properties attached to bigger names in Bordeaux: Sénéjac gets the winemaking talent from Talbot; while Madame de Beaucaillou is part of the Ducru-Beaucaillou stable. Both are on top form this year, their terroir backed up by investment from the 'parent' property.

#### Moulis and Listrac

Both appellations here are further to the west of the river, the vineyards running up from north of Margaux. These are heavier, cooler soils which work best in warmer years although frost is often a problem, and there were pockets of frost in Spring 2022. Mauvesin-Barton makes a lovely, lighter style than stablemates Léoville and Langoa in Saint-Julien, and that light touch has worked very well in 2022. Chasse-Spleen is also one of our highlights, this is finally back where it should be, the excesses of recent vintages reined in and a charming, poised wine the result.

#### Margaux

Often the trickiest of the communes to pin a style to, as there are lots of châteaux across a big area. We looked for charm and balance but, despite this being an easier tasting than it often is, a number of Margaux big guns were just that: big and expressive. Tannins were quite chunky in places and alcohol levels more over 14% than under. Angludet was one of our top picks, getting the balance right. Margaux itself and Palmer were impressive with plenty of substance. Durfort-Vivens and Ferrière both seemed to benefit from the biodynamic regimes that are used here – equally leaving herbage between the rows could reduce the heat in the vineyard by up to 10 degrees, a great bonus this year across many communes.

#### Saint-Iulien

Once again Saint-Julien came top of the communes in our book, probably because it covers many top producers more concentrated than elsewhere. Many stars include **Léoville** and **Langoa Barton**, **Branaire-Ducru** (best yet), the stables at both **Ducru-Beaucaillou** and **Talbot**, as well as the very affordable **Gloria**. Saint-Julien offers probably the most balanced wines, softer and well-knit yet having plenty of presence and individual character.

#### Pauillac

Home to three First Growths, Pauillac is in a brilliant location which has accounted, historically, for its position at the top of the Left Bank tree. Interestingly you see quite a wide variation in styles; Lafite this year has much more restraint, Mouton a very plush, opulent side while Grand-Puy-Lacoste and Pontet-Canet have more depth and concentration than other recent vintages. The Batailley stable caught our eye again, while there is much talk about improvements at Grand-Puy Ducasse. The measure of success here was to have 'Pauillac power' but with silky tannins, a proper framework behind rich, dark fruit that has purity and sweetness to it. Our recommendations are all on the money.

#### Saint-Estèphe

This commune does well in 'solar' vintages, although there were two added issues in 2022. A late frost hit here more than neighbouring Pauillac; although not critical, some yields were cut back. Then in early June there was a significant hailstorm which again reduced yields, this time severely in places. The main upshot was that many properties needed to use as much fruit as they could, resulting in less 'second' wine being produced, and in places more press wine. The skill and technology of the top properties calmly circumvented this, with châteaux like Montrose and Calon-Ségur making outstanding wines, lovely fruit underpinned by proper Saint-Estèphe structure. Phélan Ségur and Meyney are excellent too, as are Ormes de Pez and Lilian-Ladouys, both of whom benefit from being part of Lynch Bages and Pédesclaux respectively. As a generalisation, and with requisite good balance, the Saint-Estèphe wines have a bit more potential for ageing than other communes.

#### Pessac-Léognan

Producing outstanding whites as well as reds, the message from this great area on the south side of Bordeaux can be difficult to get across as what can be a great vintage for one colour is not necessarily reflected in the other. In 2022 there are brilliant examples of both, but not everywhere was uniform. Balance between alcohol and purity of fruit was important and, like Margaux, some wines are big and chunky with a lot of grainy tannins. Stand-outs for making harmonious reds were Carmes Haut-Brion, Haut Bailly, Smith-Haut-Lafitte and our favourite, Domaine de Chevalier. Lespault-Martillac, from the Chevalier stable, impressed us, as did a surprisingly good de Fieuzal whose red is often overshadowed by its white.

#### Château Vieux Robin, Médoc

In a year when drought and position played a big part in the balance of the final wine, this Médoc property had some superb Merlot that has richness and structure without too much of either. Soft and fleshy with some chalky tannins, this is a lovely, easy wine for the short-term. 3-9 years.

#### Château Lilian Ladouys, Saint-Estèphe

Quite floral on the nose. Good, sweet fruit on the palate with nice texture, not too much weight for the style but chalky tannins and good persistence. Part of the Pédesclaux stable and reaping the benefits of top winemaking investment, it continues its good recent run. 5-10 years.

#### Connétable Talbot, Saint-Julien

Delicious forward fruit with nice coolness, aged in old oak only so the purity floods through with tannins very much in the background. More class than power with a lovely balance, making this an easy drinker for the mid-term. One of the best second wines of the Médoc in our opinion. 3-9 years.

Always a dependable 'second', Sarget is typically full of blueberry and blackberry fruit, soft tannins and an easy feel in the mouth. The whole is very complete, well textured and quite lively on the finish. It's a classic Sarget made to drink quite early yet showing the power of Gruaud in the background. A good pick this vintage to enjoy a bit younger. 3-9 years.

#### Château Tronquoy, Saint-Estèphe

Previously Tronquoy-Lalande, the wealth of floral aromas draw you in. Big, rich notes of blackcurrant, black cherry, dark chocolate and spice envelope the palate. With a touch of creamy oak and sweet tobacco on the finish, this is an excellent effort from this newly rebranded debutant. 5-15 years.

Superb aroma on Grand-Puy-Lacoste's second wine, with sweeping black fruit and violet. There is an harmonious feel in the mouth, which is cool and smooth, making it very approachable. It's an easy wine with class and simplicity, a joy to drink now but with potential to age some too. 3-9 years.

#### Château Les Ormes de Pez, Saint-Estèphe

#### Château Meyney, Saint-Estèphe

Dark, plenty of concentration here and good structure, the mouthfeel is big and beefy but the balance is good. There's a smooth, fleshy character this year, generous and big but just on the right side of being too much. Impressive and well-made, Gloria is on a good run. 3-9 years.

#### Château Grand-Puy Ducasse, 5e cru classé Pauillac

A château that has recently blossomed with better texture and presence than a decade back. Bacon fat on the nose, then lovely, luscious ripe black fruit at its core surrounded by dense yet chalky tannins that build to the finish. There's generosity about this wine, power and yet elegance on the finish. Very good all-round effort. 5-15+ years.

#### Château Ferrière, 3e cru classé Margaux (organic)

From the biodynamically driven stable of Claire Villars-Lurton which we feel has done better than many in Margaux this year. The juicy, 'cool fruit' style is backed up by a ripeness and richness at its core while that clean, pure finish shows too. The attention to detail is very much reflected in a precise, focused wine - very good this year. 5-15 years.

#### Château Haut-Bages Libéral, 5e cru classé Pauillac (organic)

With the highest yield across Pauillac, this wine has done well with very good balanced proportions. Blackberry fruit with damson jelly gives a juicy, ripe but pure feel to it. Forward with generous flavours, some tannin and a keen seam of acidity, good depth and concentration at the end. The whole effect is charming and a success. 5-15 years.

#### Château Lafon-Rochet, 4e cru classé Saint-Estèphe

One of the last wines we tasted, so plenty to judge it by, and comparisons are good. Plenty of black fruit, some robust tannins and a chunky presence overall, with richness and ripeness coming through on the palate. Fine oak on the finish, this is firm but succulent and should age well. 5-15 years.

#### Château Phélan Ségur, Saint-Estèphe

Attractive, almost smoky nose from 56% Merlot this year. Good weight of ripe fruit backed by ripe if grippy tannins and nice balancing acidity. The whole builds to a big mouthful in the finish. Stylish and typically Saint-Estèphe, another very good effort from a rising property, well worth a look if you want a keeper. 5-15 years.

#### Château Talbot, 4e cru classé Saint-Julien

At 40 hl/ha Talbot has the highest yield in St-Julien this year and has made a gorgeous wine. Juicy blackberry and blueberry fruit with a lick of oak behind, very fine tannins and a silky fresh finish. #### Château d'Issan, 3e cru classé Margaux

#### Château Durfort-Vivens, 2e cru classé Margaux

Gonzargue Lurton has fashioned a delicious, structured yet ripe and concentrated wine this year. For a second growth Durfort is always good value and the depth and definition of the black fruit is wrapped in chunky, grainy tannins that work well to support the texture here. Biodynamic practices have created a bright, vibrant character, lots of freshness on the finish. A super effort and a Margaux to admire. 5-15 years.

Domaine de Chevalier Rouge, grand cru classé Pessac-Léognan

Gloriously spicy nose of cinnamon and damson, underpinned with a lick of new oak. Masses of dense black fruit on the palate, blackberry and blueberry freshness come through on the end. #### Château Grand-Puy-Lacoste, 5e cru classé Pauillac

Length and precision, the hallmarks of another great Pauillac at a decent price. 5-15 years.

#### Château Clerc Milon, 5e cru classé Pauillac

Mulberry fruit on the nose, more on the palate with a ripe compote feel, lovely texture with chalky tannins propping up the mouthfeel. Generous and attractive, cool and fresh on the finish. Neat and polished. 5-15 years.

#### Alter Ego de Château Palmer, Margaux

Merlot was the key here and only a third of production went into Alter Ego. Lots of structure for Margaux, but the mass of dark fruit, damson and coffee notes wear the firm tannins well. Voluptuous in the mouth, plenty of spice, more extraction than usual, this may take more time to come round, but will be worth the wait. 5-15 years.

#### Château Gruaud Larose, 2e cru classé Saint-Julien

Super mix of fruit: damson, plum, raspberry and a shot of currant. Soft, round and svelte in the mouth, restrained and mineral with plenty of power but refined tannins and great persistence. Very good length too. Superb focus and definition, a very good to excellent wine. 5-15+ years.

#### Château Léoville Poyferré, 2e cru classé Saint-Julien

Attractive floral aromas, blackcurrant too. A blueberry centre with some tight tannins at present, then becomes long and quite luscious, still fresh yet with power on the finish. Juicy in nature, more structured than some but good potential. 5-15+

#### Château Rauzan-Ségla, 2e cru classé Margaux

"This château has been firing on all cylinders of late, no doubt due to the talents of technical director Nicolas Audebert, and a wine that's going to flirt with perfection is their 2022 Château Rauzan-Ségla. Powerful notes of black cherries, currants, smoked tobacco, chocolate, and leafy herbs all define the aromatics, and it hits the palate with full-bodied richness, a deep, layered, concentrated texture, ripe yet building tannins, and a great finish. #### Château Pontet-Canet, 5e cru classé Pauillac (organic)

After a bit of frost loss restricted yields again, this is a magnificent Pontet-Canet. Gorgeous nose full of sweet ripe fruit, black pastilles coming through. In the mouth it's dense, yet fresh - layers of fine blueberry fruit, soft yet structured. Grainy tannins are balanced, ripe and integrated. Power comes on in the finish but kept in check, depth all the way in a very long finish. A superb wine. 5-15+ years.

#### Château Lynch-Bages, 5e cru classé Pauillac

Intense blueberry and blackberry jelly on the nose. The palate is rich, with deep black fruit and an enticing freshness, backed by silky tannins with a hint of vanilla. More restrained than in the past, an improvement, and although the character and power of Pauillac show, there is better balance, suppleness and charm this year. Fabulous. 5-15+ years.

#### Château Ducru-Beaucaillou, 2e cru classé Saint-Julien

The high point of a superb tasting at Ducru-Beaucaillou. Spiced damson to start, then blueberry and mulberry cascades onto the palate with silky tannins, very fine, intense with poise and finesse, very fluid, clean finish and lovely persistence. The whole feels very complete, nicely concentrated with impeccable balance. Lots of energy about it, definitely worthy of its status and rank. 5-15 years.



A big, long-term prospect with gutsy tannin, almost over-ripe but chock full of ripe damson fruit that needs the grip to work. Plenty of alcohol but balanced by the quality of fine tannin and density of fruit. Impressive, if powerful and somewhat atypical. 5-15+ years.

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# Right Bank

#### Pomerol

A fabulous year for Pomerol. Despite the vineyards baking under the heat of a long hot summer, Merlot and Cabernet Franc excelled providing the ingredients for many stellar creations. At their very best the wines are vibrant, sumptuous, and multi-layered with an incredible depth of core fruit. Big hitters like Vieux Château Certan and Château L'Eglise-Clinet have produced contenders for Right Bank wine of the vintage whilst the excellent performance of many of the lesser-known Chateaux such as Château Bonalgue means there's temptation at every price level.

#### Saint-Emilion

Traditionally the greater diversity of terroir in Saint-Emilion results in a broader range of styles compared to Pomerol and this year is no exception. Despite the stylistic differences there's a common thread of abundant blue, black and often red fruit running through the wines. Tanners favourite Château Pipeau produced a powerhouse of black fruit, spice, mocha and toasty oak notes whilst current 'hot' property Château Laroque continues to win plaudits

with its beautiful aromatics, layered fruit and vivacity. The very elite of this commune have produced wonders, with Château Figeac justifying its recent promotion conjuring up a magical multi-layered wine whilst 1er grand cru classé Château Canon continues its superb run of form producing one of the estates finest releases.

#### The Satellites & Côtes de Bordeaux

When very good vintages like 2022 come around its always worth seeking out wines from the 'lesser' appellations as they provide great bang for your buck. The finest examples provide a freshness and depth of sumptuous plummy, damson fruit which make them frankly irresistible. From Castillon-Côtes de Bordeaux, Château Montlandrie produced a fruit bomb, guaranteed to satisfy anyone savvy enough to pick up a case whilst Château de Bel-Air of Lalande-de-Pomerol put its hand up for 'find of the vintage', offering up a wealth of aromatics, sweet plummy fruit and a roundness on the finish which sum up the impressive quality coming from this and other satellite appellations this year.
