

The Art Walk begins at 5 pm. Closing times vary from 7 to 8 pm. We look forward to seeing you on First Fridays.


ONLINE ART SHOWS

hroughout this year, the AGA hosts a series of themed online art shows. These shows serve as small fundraising initiatives for us, fun and easy ways for our members to participate in something creative, and sell their artwork.

Our first Online Art Show, *Inked*, opened February 8 and runs to May 30. Seventeen artists created 9" x 12" artworks with ink being the primary medium. 50% of proceeds from this online art show benefits the AGA and our mission to support the visual arts community in Southern Oregon.

All current artist members are invited to participate and submit one entry. Artworks are displayed and available for purchase on our website, ashlandgalleries.com. Artists arrange pick-up or shipping within 7 days of sale.







THREE ARTISTS

Artists drawn randomly from early-bird memberships

MICAH Ofstedahl

Micah lives in a little house on Normal Avenue. "Normal" does not prepare you for his art, a style he calls "altered realism." On the walls of his studio are paintings of "surreal biological landscapes" exquisitely rendered in gentle colors of acrylic. The detail holds my gaze as he tells of shipping pieces to Denver, and in May, to Philadelphia, for shows.

He's been drawing since childhood and never stopped; all through school it was a strength. He grew up in Austin, Minnesota. In high school he was invited to work on his paintings in his art teacher's studio. At the end of his senior year, during the art assembly in 2000, he was awarded "Artist of the Year" and a check for \$500. "That was a big nudge."

Micah enrolled in Minnesota State, Mankato, as an art major focused on sculpture. After a gap year midstream, he finished with a BFA in 2006. Meanwhile, he was following an interest in playing music and joined a band: Byron Space Circus. He moved with the group to Santa Cruz, California.

At first, Micah worked in oils. Gradually, while using both, chose only acrylics. He was inspired by the close-up views in Gray's Anatomy, the abstract biological patterns. Between that and Ernst Haekel's texts, he would make pencil sketches



preparing for painting, as he did in college. Also using charcoal for figure drawings which opened into abstractions and surreality.

He would go online to see other artists' works; paintings with surreal elements. Instagram and social media brought new ideas, which were added to the solid foundation of skills achieved in school, where he developed his own style of sculpture.

His music resonated well with his art and was a big influence inspiring him to be in a creative space. But, eventually his band broke up. He moved to Arcata, and then to Ashland, with his wife, Angelina, about 17 years ago.



His style started changing five years ago. He painted backgrounds from his landscape photos and added transparent forms as a foreground. Pitcher plants; microscopic forms like diatoms and radiolaria were his focus, along with so many other elements in nature and realism that enabled him to go further with art and the mystery of life.

Adding patterns is a more stark juxtaposition with realism. He is open to growth and new ideas, and new successes. New works resonate with more people. Micah tried painting from his previous style and saw how the past can hinder the future. But he admits his changes needn't go so far as to leave collectors behind. He very much wants to make a living with his painting. Fortunately, hermit tendencies help with that.

Creative forms open us up into new realms—the unknown. He's still trying to figure out where his art comes from. *See his listing on page 33* photos by B. Bayard (except where noted)

KRISTY KÚN

We were invited to interview in her capacious studio as she worked on a felt commission; a 5 foot high, 20 foot long wall-mounted mural comprising many narrow strips with flanges that, when assembled side-by-side, will evoke ripples on the surface of water. Lustrous white silk is integrated into the edges of the blue felt fins to reflect highlights. Several layers of wool have structural purposes, lending stability.

It is a wet felting process and she is equipped with boots, gloves, and apron to massage the wool on a wide, watery, tray-like table. Periodically pouring on steamy teakettle water, she increases the tightening of the fibers, monitors the shrinkage, feeling the change as she squeezes. The fibers transform, she can put so much into it; soap provides slipperiness, alkali opens fibers for the tangle. Then alkali is neutralized with vinegar, which the wool likes. Slight acidity helps preserve the wool. Cotton and linen like alkali.

She is on a schedule, required for a commission. When on the wall, it will still have a watery appearance while dryly calming the library's acoustics. She's had several hotel commissions and lots of proposal requests, rare for felt architectural works. Kristy innovates her own processes; very complex constructions.



Kristy grew up in the suburban Midwest, started working at age 15 at Kinko's, transferring from Nebraska to Arcata, California for a total of nine years, while she studied. First at University of Nebraska in Omaha, then at College of the Redwoods, the Krenov School, in Fort Bragg, learning to build furniture and studying construction engineering.

She got a job with a woodworker, and they married in 1998, developing an Arts and Crafts Style, mortise and tenon, furniture business. It involved a foundry, drying kilns, big equipment. It wasn't til her daughter, Olivia, was in Waldorf School that she discovered felting as art. After separating



from the wood business she went into the wool business; "100 colors of everything." She hosted international instructors in dyeing, spinning, felting. It took years for her to figure out what she wanted to do with felt; trying things out.

Up until six years ago she was mostly in business with art and craft materials. There came the realization that she would be an artist. Kristy attended craft events as a seller of wool wares; Gathering of the Guilds, collaborations like Frogwood, which she returned to three times, and where she met Christian Burchard, her partner. He was introduced by Greg Wilbur, a founding member of Frogwood, metalsmith and mentor who promoted her materials at her booths. When Greg asked her for a felted piece, she made one - her very first. Kristy went on to exhibit with Greg in the Waterstone Gallery in 2023. "Antifragility" featured her felt and his raised copper pieces.

The Frogwood collaborative "is like artist's camp." Over 50 members spend five days together making art, culminating in the auction of works to support the biennial future of the event and scholarships to attend.

Kristy had been living in Portland. Now she lives in Ashland with Christian, two dogs and a bunch of milk goats. She has made the covers and featured in American Craft Magazine, and Fiber Arts Now. She received a Haines & Friends support grant and has future ideas, free-hanging felt and fabric sculptures, with a welded hanging structure.

One of her art influences has been Jacoda Buić of Yugoslavia, one of the tapestry weavers of the 60's. She was a costumer and set designer, becoming a creator of monumental tapestries in various fibers for Belgrade Council and for the President's residence.

MICHAEL LYNN Adams

His first introduction of himself as an artist in Ashland was his presentation at the Art Salon which was ongoing at the Ashland Public Library during 2018. He and his wife, Penny Yost moved to Ashland in 2017. A subsequent artist talk was during his exhibit at the Rogue Valley Manor, in Medford. Here he is again, telling his life story which continues to evolve after the pandemic closed the Ashland Art Center, where as a member he exhibited year 'round. For a short time, a few artists from AAC occupied the former Liquid Assets space near the plaza. When that closed, Michael became a member of Art & Soul Gallery. When the gallery changed hands and was renamed Art & Soul Ashland, Penny also joined the gallery. It was the first time that Michel and Penny exhibited in the same place.

Since he was very young, he wanted to be an artist. When starting to paint as an adult in Southern California, he aspired to join the California Arts Club, where the highest accolades went to realism and representational art. Coming to Ashland, he found artists open to all arts and supporting each other's ideas. This "melting pot" strengthened his curiosity for how others see the world. He could see his own work in a new light.




Ashland's impact was this new experience of observing his own paintings, now that he was removed from the strict realism model.

Sometimes, the subject was important to him. There is meaning in his depictions of his family, from photos his grandfather took of him

and his "free range" cousins, who lived close by. Adventures with the many cousins growing up together was the spark that began his life in art. It was in Pacific Palisades with parents, aunt and uncle, where he was embraced by the company of luminaries that would visit, Philip Jessup of the World Court was one, Ray Bradbury another.

Drawing was part of coping with early dyslexia. He read the Time Life Library of Art, but found high school uninteresting. Doing gymnastics and bodybuilding brought him to study anatomy through drawing. Two years in Moorpark Jr. College was good, learning classical drawing techniques. He enjoyed his art professors at California Lutheran University: John Solem, and Jerry Slattum who was very creative and "out there." Bernardus "Ben"Weber, a potter and designer, taught with old school discipline and respect for craft. Michael wanted to be an

artist and is indebted to these great teachers.

He started working for a printing company, bought the company, and eventually sold it. He went to work for California Lutheran University and soon became Director of Marketing Communications. All this was during the time of the dawn of computers.

It was a fascinating time, but he always wanted to paint. In 32 years he made only ten paintings, just enough to keep his skills ingrained. He learned how to see. He went from commercial art to professional painter and gradually phased out of administrative work at age 62. Michael began teaching at Cal Lutheran. He was invited to show at a Santa Fe gallery. His exposure expanded to Sarasota, Florida, North Carolina, and Lily Pad Gallery in Rhode Island and in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. He gained recognition in several national competitions. For his 60th birthday his gift to himself was a Tony Pro workshop.

In 2012, Michael co-founded The Representational Art Conference (TRAC), a 3-day academic conference that explored the philosophies behind realism and skill-based art education. The conference brought hundreds of artists and scholars from around the world to present academic papers, workshops and demonstrations, and show their work at several galleries in Ventura County. He directed three TRAC conferences before he moved to Oregon.

His father taught theater, drama. Michael loved magic acts. As a teen out to lunch with Dad and three magicians, he had his mind blown by their sleight of hand. He began to see that while working his oil paintings, still lifes start with simple shapes, add the physics of light, the detail, and texture – it is like magic in plain sight. Still life is about seeing beauty in the ordinary, framing something as seen in a moment.

Inspired by Ashland's beauty, Michael has started landscape painting again. After all the graphic design work, and teaching art students, he is using all of those skills to build his future works.
