An exploration of color, grain and texture in abstracts, landscapes, still lifes and even portraiture, this new medium offers an unexpected variety of techniques that mimic metallic sheens, patinas and even stained-glass. There is a sublime beauty, comfort and warmth in his work which must be seen to be understood.

THE SEVENTH ANNUAL ASHLAND OPEN STUDIO TOUR













The 2019 Ashland Open Studio Tour looked like rain, but instead it was lightly rinsed. By Sunday afternoon it showed its colors inside the studios. Here is a sampling:

Julia Janeway's ceramics, in her discrete, comfortable studio, are always a delight in the whimsy of her animals; carved into the slip-covered clay at the perfect point of dampness. Her creatures charm her collectors, who were acquiring bagfuls of new favorites. She is finding new variations on her themes, like some tiles with sheep heads to be embellished by knitted frames.

Julia and **Paula Fong** share the prize for the best view from the studio window, with Margie Mee a close second. Paula Fong and her husband, Doug built her studio at the top of a hill with vast views in every direction. Originally it was their home, until they built a bigger one. The see-forever view from Paula's drawing table contrasts with her subjects' life close to the ground. Fungi, lichens and mosses keep company with native flora in the frames on her studio walls.

The art glass studio, **Ashland Glass Act** displayed so many techniques of glass forming, it was hard to keep track. Fortunately, **Daniel and Stefani Seppinger** each gave demonstrations. I was fascinated by Stefani's beadmaking, dripping molten glass on a slowly-rotating rod. There's a lot more to it! It gave me an appreciation for handmade beads. I hope I have a chance next year to attend Daniel's demo.

Margie Mee's studio had a crowd of welded metal sculptures nearby, made of parts from a rusted past given new life and thought. Margie has gone into assemblages for wall hanging. What she attaches are various seed pods, bones, feathers and seaweed. I saw dried flowers, drips from a bronze pour attached beside paint sprayed through lace stencil, and a print from the 60s calling for peace, "We have yet to get the peace," Margie noted. The newest work attracted comments from everyone.

Sarah Burns' teaching studio in downtown Talent was well-prepared for her demo of oil painting. She enjoys teaching and designed this studio for it. She had still lifes set up, lesson statements posted, and student works on the wall beside her own. A human skeleton stands ready. 17 attended, learning how color and tone value work together. Sarah's primary genres are figurative, still life, and plein air landscapes, in classical realism. It is a worthwhile destination and a great place to learn to paint.

Denise Souza Finney gave a painting demo in acrylics in her style of layering

mediums with use of color and texture. She showed how to create a surface that can bring light into your painted image for the illusion of depth, with up to 20 layers. We learned uses for those mysterious mediums from the art supply store. She advises us to keep playing with what we like and try something new to get what we want. She teaches a class in composition, working out problems with color and texture, and black and white. Getting a good start prevents future frustration. Her light-filled studio looks onto her garden at the end of Ohio Street. Denise thoughtfully provided three signs, making it easy to find.

The variety of styles, genres and mediums in all the studios was wide, and the artists were welcoming. I was comfortable spending time learning in each studio I attended. The two words I wrote on the passport card to describe the event was: "go again."

THE ASHLAND OPEN STUDIO TOUR 2020 WILL BE OCTOBER 10 AND 11, 11AM-4PM.

It is a free event, thanks to grants from the City of Ashland and Oregon Community Foundation. The Ashland Gallery Association strives to promote visual arts and education with events like this.

WILD BEAUTY ON DISPLAY AS CASCADE-SISKIYOU NATIONAL MONUMENT TURNS 20

Many parts of Ashland offer stunning views of the Cascade-Siskiyou National Monument the sweeping terrain from Grizzly Peak to Pilot Rock. Yet, seen from afar, these views only hint at what you will find as you explore close up.

It inspires many to get outdoors to hike, fish, camp, and for some, to capture the beauty through their art. This abundance of art is on display several times in 2020 as Southern Oregon celebrates the 20th anniversary of the monument's designation.

Before we dive into the art—a brief explanation about what makes this monument such a national treasure: Cascade-Siskiyou National Monument is one of the most biologically diverse areas in the United States. It's home to an incredible variety of plant and animal life and provides critical habitat for many rare and endemic species.

To celebrate and honor the monument, the Schneider Museum of Art is curating a summer 2020 exhibition, *Celebrating Wild Beauty*, to showcase several artists who have worked directly in the monument, draw inspiration from it, or from other wild spaces in the Northwest. The exhibition features New York artist, **Mark Tribe** who is working on, *Deep Green: Cascade-Siskiyou National Monument*, July 20, 2019. It's a 24 hour, 4K digital film he shot in the monument as an artist-in-residence. He says it's a way to preserve the monument for generations, adding it is "certainly one of the most beautiful places I've ever been." (see photo above)

Eugene, Oregon-based artist, **Rick Silva** is also offering a 4K digital video. His film, titled, *Western Fronts,* was shot in the Cascade-Siskiyou National Monument, as well as Gold Butte, Grand Staircase-Escalante, and Bears Ears.

Portland-based artist, **Malia Jensen's** work, *Nearer Nature: Worth Your Salt* shows wildlife interacting with various landscapes throughout Oregon. *(see photo below)*







Other featured artists include: **Dot Fisher-Smith, Chris Russell** (see photo above), **Isabella Thorndike Church,** and **Grayson Cox.** The exhibition offers a wide variety of approaches from video to painting to printmaking.

Scott Malbaurn, Director of the Schneider Museum says, "I hope audiences leave with inspiration, creativity, new knowledge, and a deeper, more meaningful understanding of contemporary art, culture and the Cascade-Siskiyou National Monument."

Celebrating Wild Beauty will first be shared at the Schneider's biennial Gala on May 30.

To celebrate and honor the monument, the Schneider Museum of Art is curating a summer 2020 exhibition, Celebrating Wild Beauty

The following week, on June 5 from 5pm–8pm, the Friends of the Cascade-Siskiyou National Monument will host an Open House at the Schneider to celebrate the monument and the artistic inspiration it provides for so many.

"We want as many people from the community as possible to understand that the monument is their monument and to see the beauty and inspiration it offers all of us," says Shannon Browne, Executive Director of Friends.

In partnership with the Bureau of Land Management, The Friends of the Cascade-Siskiyou Monument, support artists every year through the Artists-In-Residence program. The program started in 2017 and now attracts artists throughout the country to apply for a two-week residency.

The program, according to the BLM, "was founded on the belief that artists look closely at the ways the world works, noticing things that other observers may have missed."

To date, the BLM and Friends have supported nine artists: Matt Witt, Darlene Southworth and Mabrie Ormes in 2017; Jeanine Moy, Kim Faucher and Dave Adkinson in 2018, Mark Tribe, Siggy Bengston, Mary McDermott in 2019. A new artist (yet to be named at the time of publication) will be working in the monument this summer.

Just outside Ashland in the community of Talent, artist **Sarah Burns** (see photo below) is bringing together several local artists for an exhibit called, Land That





I Love: Scenes from the Cascade Siskiyou. It also focuses on work inspired by the Cascade-Siskiyou bioregion.

Artists aren't necessarily looking at maps and boundaries when something

inspires them. So, there is a lot of creativity that happens at the edges of the monument too. The privatelymanaged Vesper Meadow Restoration Preserve, adjacent to the monument, is hosting two summer events for the art community. Jeanine Moy, director of Vesper Meadow Education Project, is organizing the events.

The first is a plein air landscape painting workshop led by Sarah Burns. The event features an opening talk and demonstration at Project Space, followed by three days of painting at the Vesper Meadow Restoration Preserve. Burns will support students throughout the process of preparing painting materials, studying the landscape, creating composition, exploring natural color

palettes, and encouraging personal artistic expression. (see dates and details to the right)

The following week, on June 27, Jeanine Moy is welcoming artists to a Southwest Oregon Paint

The Vesper Meadow Restoration Preserve, adjacent to the monument, is hosting two summer events for the art community.

Out! Out! Out! Oregon Paint Out! It's a non-competitive event for artists ages 18 and older. Artists should bring their own supplies and plan to spend the day outdoors at Vesper Meadow. The group will celebrate at the end of the day, sharing their work and a potluck meal.

LIVING SCULPTURE, THE ART OF BONSAI

ne choice an artist makes before beginning a piece is scale. Will it be large or small? An artist can look at a lovely tree and decide to draw it. They will bring the scale down to the size of the paper, necessarily. Their task is to represent a lovely tree using one, two or many mediums to express the wildness or the certain exposure to the elements, or the seasonal adaptations. It could be in charcoal, or watercolor, maybe ink. Now consider one medium option to be the tree itself. A tree that could fit within a sheet of paper's margins. This piece of art is not finished in an hour, a day, or a year. It may take longer to create than your remaining lifespan.

in China, finding its way into Japan's refining influence, and Korea. Wellfostered bonsai can live more than 500 years, lasting through 25 human generations. The art of bonsai has the timeless nature of the ideal form, or it can be trained to represent survival of catastrophe, which would have occurred in a particular moment in time and borne its mark for the remainder of its life.

Tradition has been a force in the art form that has driven its remarkable longevity and defined its ideals, but movements are afoot to expand the diversity of species and accept styles and esthetics not seen in bonsai; at least not by us. The scope of this evolving form spans the mists of the past to the unknown future. The changes in the choice of species clearly reflects the worldwide love of bonsai and the resulting desire to create with local species, at a variance with asian originals like Japanese pines, maples and junipers. These choices are made by someone with an artist's eye, a steady hand and sharp shears. The artist has an understanding of the way the species grows, and how the life force moves through their particular specimen, to determine what parts to take away. Like a stone sculpture, it is a technique of removal. And then the tree grows through a season, adding buds, leaves or needles, flowers, and roots. The artist sees the tree's response and it is up to them to make the right change. It is an art for those who can wait.

Another intriguing direction is a practice of gathering a tree, not from the nature of wilderness, but from the nature of an urban setting, where the specimen has survived neglect and abuse that was applied unwittingly by humanity, then rescued and preserved in the beautiful shape of its survival. It is tolerant of the stresses it has outlived, making it suited to the rigor of bonsai cultivation. It is called, Urban Yamadori. In 2017, the Pacific Bonsai Museum, in Federal Way, Washington mounted a six-month exhibit of bonsai juxtaposed with an environment where it could have grown. The idea came from the sense that bonsai is usually shown isolated from wild environments. Among the eight artists was Victoria Chamberlain, a ceramicist residing in Ashland. Her role was to create vessels in collaboration with kusamono artist, Young Choe. Together they

provided the accent plants that were indigenous to each featured bonsai environment. In one example, volcanic ash sourced in Alaska was used in the soil of the bonsai specimen, in the glaze of the kusamono pot, and in the painting accompanying and artistically interpreting each environment. Vicki's ceramics mimicked ice, metal, wood and textures that seemed to have come directly from the ground.

In 2019, Vicki led a one-day exhibition with the Cascade Bonsai Society at Ashland Art Center, October 4th First Friday. The showing was titled, Living Sculptures. Three asian art forms were displayed: bonsai, kusamono and ikebana. These were accompanied by paintings and other media by artist members of the Art Center, expressing their perception of the environment: Lewis Anderson, Paula Fong, Elaine Frenett, Darcie Sternenberg and Arlene Warner, among others. Members of the Cascade Bonsai Society provided the tree specimens from their private

collections, and the kusamono. A local ikebana group led by Goly Ostovar assembled the exquisite ikebana, which were auctioned to raise funds for the Art Center. The accent plants and pots, kusamono, were created to complement each bonsai specimen.

Vicki Chamberlain is quite busy in her ceramic studio filling orders for bonsai planters. She described the formal culture of bonsai extending well into the vessels that hold the living sculptures. A deciduous tree would be in a glazed pot; a conifer would grow in an unglazed pot. This expresses the voices of the plant families. The height of the pot is made to match the width of the trunk. Studying bonsai would teach enough rules for a lifetime of practice, like most of the classical

art forms. Centuries of understanding has produced an inspiration behind the shape and aesthetic of bonsai, that being its source: a wild place.

The exhibit was timed to celebrate the fall colors. The culture is imbued with respect for the living species as a thing of beauty. "By participating together we can celebrate how each of our respective art forms view nature from a different perspective. It is a richer experience, and a rare opportunity to view bonsai."

"I HEARD IT ON A PODCAST"

Being an artist involves spending a fair amount of time alone in the studio. Some artists love silence, some listen to music or the radio. This extroverted artist listens to podcasts and uses them for company, education, and entertainment.

You're probably familiar with podcasts, but if not, they are basically like a radio show that you can get on-demand. Podcasts can be accessed through a website or more commonly, through an app on a smart phone; most of which

have a podcatching app built-in. But many can be downloaded and used on phones or tablets.

Podcasts range from professional, highly produced soundscapes made by teams of experts, to those made by an individual with basic skills, equipment and a dream. There are podcasts on any topic you can think of. I listen to a wide variety. Below are some of my favorites, divided into News and Entertainment, True Crime, Art, and those that surpass all categorization.

My daily listens include many news and entertainment podcasts. When looking in this category you will find the usual suspects: NPR, NYTimes, Washington Post etc. Besides these staples, my favorites include:

- Longform with hosts Aaron Lammer and Max Linsky has in-depth conversations with long-form journalists and non-fiction writers about their work and how they tell stories. Thoughtful interviews, great topics. Check out episode # 311 with art critic Jerry Saltz.
- The Nod with Brittany Luse and Eric Eddings. Their website says they "gleefully explore all the beautiful, complicated dimensions of Black Life." Honest, serious and humorous. I recommend starting with, Cha Cha Now Y'all.
- Judge John Hodgman, the writer and comedian hears cases and settles disputes between friends, family and coworkers. It's hilarious, irreverent and still full of humanity, done in the style of People's Court with Judge Wapner.

I recommend episode # 381: Jerky Duty, mainly because my daughter Adara is one of the litigants.

Reply All, tech stuff that is funny, scary, and fascinating, excellent reporting meets goofy tech nerds. My favorite thing is when they explain confusing stuff from Twitter. Check out episode #149 30-50 Feral Hogs.

True Crime has a huge interest among podcast fans and there are mountains available to listen to. A few top-notch traditional True Crime podcasts include, **Serial, The Accused,** and **In the Dark.** Three that I especially love are,

Criminal with Phoebe Judge is delightful. Who knew crime could be so heart-warming? Each episode tells a

single story. Phoebe has covered stories that range from police dogs to famous prison breaks, as well as serious stories of traumatic incidents. Done with loving care and quirky charm; Phoebe's voice is legendary.

Small Town Dicks, hosted by, Yeardley Smith, Detective Dave and Detective Dan. This podcast might not be for everyone. Yeardley is a big fan of good police work and sometimes she comes off as excessively fawning. That being said, these stories are really interesting, and told well. Cops are excellent at recounting events—I think because they are trained to do so for court. You will hear stories of good detectives doing the job we want them to do. It's pretty one-sided, but if you're capable of enjoying stories of horrific crimes from law enforcement's

point of view, you will like this. It's very sensitive to victims and their families. Bonus: it's recommended by a local badass female police detective.

This podcast anonymizes its detectives, crime victims and families. However, the savvy Oregonian will start to notice things sound pretty familiar. And any fan of the TV show, The Simpsons will recognize Yeardley Smith as the voice of Lisa Simpson. The show has major Oregon references. I'll let you do your own detective work if you want to figure out the small town where Detective Dave and Detective Dan work.

True Crime Obsessed, with Gillian Pensavalle and Patrick Hinds; the minute it hits my feed, I hit play. Musical theatre nerds go play-by-play through true crime documentaries. This is truly the friend substitute needed for extroverts who work alone.

Although I'm an artist and very interested in art, I usually find artist interview podcasts boring. Unless I know of the artist, or they are especially charismatic when speaking, this type of podcast is best used for falling asleep. Visual artists choose to make visual art for a reason. But there are some arts-related podcasts that I love, and highly recommend, that focus on artist and curator interviews.

- The Sculptor's Funeral with sculptor, Jason Arkles tells wonderful histories of sculpture and sculptors, from antiquity to the 20th century. I recommend starting at the beginning and listening to them all. His website has images to go with each episode. One seductive thing about podcasts is that it's easy to hear one and think, I would like to do a podcast. That sounds fun. I have a great idea. If you try it, you find that it's super difficult! Speaking logically on tape, recording and editing is harder than it seems. Jason is a one-man-band and makes it seem easy.
- The Art Angle, "Where the art world meets the real world." Professionally produced, well reported big stories cover current events in the art world, from artnet news.
- Hyperallergic with Hrag Vartanian has in-depth stories and discussions with a social justice perspective.
- Modern Art Notes Podcast, Tyler Green has been making the MAN podcast for a number of years. He frequently interviews curators and discusses current shows at museums around the United States.

Some podcasts reach the level of becoming art in and of themselves. These are the podcasts I save for when I can really focus and savor the listen.

- The Anthropocene Reviewed with John Green has monthly reviews of things from the human-centered planet, from tacos to sunsets. How is the Canada Goose part of the Anthropocene? Listen to find out. They get three stars, but I give them five out of five stars.
- The Memory Palace, writer Nate DiMeo creates short pieces that put seemingly dry bits of American History into new light. For a time, during Nate's residency at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, he chose a series of art objects to build episodes around. The beautiful thing about Nate's work is his ability to flesh out history from a broader and deeper perspective. He brings some heroes down to earth, politely, even kindly.
- Ear Hustle, with visual artist, Nigel Poor and former inmate, Earlonne Woods. I have saved the best for last. I urge you to listen to each and every episode of this outstanding podcast. Written and produced inside San Quentin, this podcast tells stories of prison life. In the 3rd season it expands to cover life in prison and after prison. I cry every single episode. It's earnest, heartfelt, excellent work.

JAY GORDON

Six small watercolors are on the wall: six heads of faceted deer with antlers. Jay Gordon used a computergenerated deer head image showing the planes of the 3-D shape six times, each in a different color study. She was looking for a way to assign color to a facet rather than blending colors that overlap over a curving surface. She showed 14 sheets of color studies, using Mary Whyte's palette, methodically blending two colors at a time, 14 times, in rows of varying color patches. It is a thorough investigation of color combinations for future reference, and an approach that belies her many years in academia.

After studying piano and woodwinds in high school, she received a degree in music at the University of Oregon in bass. She worked in electric and acoustic bass as a freelance musician, then she moved to Manhattan to attend Columbia Medical School. She got her degree in Pediatrics and did residencies at NYU and Belleview.

She did pediatric work after moving to Washington D.C., where she raised her two boys. The free public art museums are where she extended her art education. Jay found the docent tour programs through the museums' big shows to be marvelous and edifying. Some of her favorites are John Singer Sargent, Edward Hopper, Edgar Degas, and Andrew Wyeth. She also mentioned the "Japonisme" movement, the aesthetic developed in the cultural exchange between the Impressionists and the Japanese art students who went to Paris to study, and ostensibly were studied by their colleagues, and generations later by Jay herself. She signs artworks with her "chop" identifier, and was drawn to Japanese prints, and printmaking too, at the museums.

Both of her parents are creative, and her younger son (15) draws a lot. Her father is a ceramic artist—his jars and bowls were set up for still life in her studio. Her mother is a writer. Jay moved to Oregon to be closer to them in Salem. Jay was born in D.C. Her family moved to Lander, Wyoming, staying through her elementary school years, whereupon they moved to Old Town, Maine for her dad to enter architecture school. She has lived in Ashland for two and a half years so far, and has her studio at Enclave since the summer of 2018.

She has really enjoyed being there and seeing all the different techniques and mediums by the artists around her. She takes classes with Gabriel Lipper, the primary instructor at Enclave, and is enjoying more exposure to oils.

THREE ARTISTS

She finds it to be changeable. It can be precise or messy, textural, and malleable.

Its colors remain true, and she feels that it is the best at extending drawing into color painting. She showed six-inch oil panels, exercises in speed painting, allowing only 45 minutes on each. Oil is great for this, to understand its properties.

Jay feels strongly that drawing is fundamental; an artist can communicate anything by drawing, in any medium. Watercolor is sensitive and requires patience. She likes acrylic for multimedia works like collage. Further down her studio exhibit wall are four pieces themed on the Chinese zodiac, each with a central iconic head of a zodiac animal also using the faceted matrix like the deer. Their backgrounds are a grid

of found images of the corresponding animal in many genres. The facet theme continues with studies of origami lilies in larger, complete paintings in red and gray. And there are two paintings of three origami paper skulls capturing the unusual play of light on the surfaces and from within.

Jay has been collaborating with OLLI teacher, Priscila Franco, as an artist consultant in a class on wildfire ecology and management, including other artists. One activity was to draw with charcoal made in the campfire. A result of the class is a show at the Fire Station in May, First Friday. She was glad to be learning from experts in the field.

More shows she has lined up for 2020 start with *Shoe Dreams*, a collection of still life and illustration featuring shows, at the Rogue Gallery January through February. Enclave will have Spring and Fall shows, April 11 and October 10. She will also be showing work at Pangea Restaurant in March and September.

In the future, Jay sees herself resuming work in pediatrics again, stating how it uses a part of her brain that she likes. Art can hold places for science, exploration in the senses, and blending wide-ranging cultural imagery. Art does this for Jay.

DANA FEAGIN

Five years ago, Dana finished renovating her studio in the backyard. It once was a shed built of planks on 2x4s. Now it has siding, insulation, drywall, heat, and AC. They had finished the house earlier. Her husband Bill now calls her studio the "bunny barn." It is a rather posh home for eight rabbits, three of which are temporary foster pets. It was so recently cleaned that evidence of art-making was: two unfinished oil paintings on her large easel, both of animals. All the paintings covering the tall walls were of animals. The smiling three-legged pig on the easel wears a happy grin and a hat knitted for him, tied under his chin, with floppy knitted ears to stand in for the ears he lost (with his leg) in a traumatic encounter with a dog. He lives at Odd Man Inn Animal Refuge.

Dana loves animals. Besides the rabbits, she has two dogs, down from five. One of them, a foster Border Collie, bonded with her and she kept him. She had been studying oil painting with Gabriel Lipper, mostly landscape and the figure. Her last painting in his studio was of a rooster, using a photo she'd brought for reference, while everyone else was working from the model. "Why should I paint from a model?" Dana queried, "I don't even



know her." And she's been painting nothing but animals ever since.

Her reason to paint is all about her passion for animals. She had a science major in college, considering veterinary work-animals always in her plans. But she ended up with a microbiology degree and got work in clinical research in San Diego. Years later, finding herself with a corporate job in management, burnout not far away, she and her husband started planning early retirement. They had no kids, and started downsizing. Surprised when they sold their house in one day, they moved out to their cabin at Lake Arrowhead. She had started taking art classes at UC San Diego in various painting mediums at age 40.

Dana was the only one in her family with art aspirations, but her parents showed no support for that, and had encouraged her to pursue a high-

earner's career. Retirement to the rescue! She started painting with a photo of her Shih Tsu.

On a trip up to see her sister in Ashland, they thought they'd look around at houses. They found one they liked and bought it. They moved from San Diego in 2006.

Dana started taking painting classes from Stephan Baumann at Central Art Supply in Medford. It was good to learn about oils, but she lost interest in landscapes. In the past she'd tried watercolor and acrylic. Now all her animals are in oil. Asked which was her favorite animal to paint, after some thought she replied, "cows," and above her on the studio wall was a very nice cow seeming to enjoy her favoritism.

Early on, Dana began taking commissions of pet portraits. It is nearly impossible to have an animal pose for a painting, and relying on source material from the client became challenging. Now occasionally she will take one on and, ideally, take photos herself.

Animal advocacy groups are very important to Dana. She donates profits from the sale of prints and paintings to nonprofits such as SNYP, FOTAS, Equamore, Odd Man Inn, and Arthur's Acres (in New York). This helps with her self-promotion, and when

she submits her paintings to shows with animal themes she almost always gets in. She shows on Etsy, has a presence on Facebook and Instagram. She is an artist member with HeART Speak International, a nonprofit. You can find Dana's paintings at Ashland Art Center on the main gallery walls.

Dana started and runs the rabbit foster program at Friends of the Animal Shelter. Much of our interview centered on the rabbits living in her studio. She was 50 when she got her first rabbit, and now her knowledge of rabbits is vast. She told about their social behavior, the idiosyncrasies of each one of them, their health challenges, and their affections. There is more to a rabbit than meets the eye. They sleep in their well-appointed pens and get fresh air and exercise in their own fenced yard. I got to hold one as the interview wound down, and was happy to stroke his ears and become enchanted by this beautiful animal.

Asked about her future, she expressed her hopes in balancing her time and efforts between caring for animals and painting them, each as rewarding as the other.

ELIZABETH ELLINGSON

For Elizabeth Ellingson, it all starts with the rock. It energizes her artist eye, and it is everywhere: in table arrangements; gracing the back porch, like the asparagusshaped palm fossil from eastern Oregon: on outdoor shelves and those inside the shed in the backyard where she does the slab-cutting. Therein were small slices of many kinds of rocks with spots and stripes and some subtle shimmer. She held up a stencil with one shape, like the business end of a canoe paddle, in maybe 20 sizes. She also makes expanding stencils for asymmetrical shapes. The stencil, when moved across the slab will find the perfect composition in the rock's figuration, and frame it. Cut to that shape, the stone is polished

Cut to that shape, the stone is polished and goes to her little pantry-sized jewelry workshop, which used to be her darkroom when she photographed with film.

This little room is packed full of tools and supplies. A drawer is full of bright polished stones ready to set. There is a rack of maybe a dozen different little pliers with color-coded handles. Perched at the counter's edge is a solid, small roller mill that could turn a penny into copper foil. But she only works with sterling silver. Gold is scarily expensive. She showed a tiny bit left of a Krugerrand she'd carefully sliced and stretched, then backed with silver in rare designs. Jewelry is an art small in scale but large in impact.

When we arrived at her modest home in the Railroad District, she had been photographing pendants set with attractive stones on a variety of chains; airy and delicate, or hand-cut and soldered. Her compact camera rig was set up on the dining room table. High above on the clerestory wall was a wooden airplane propeller from her pilot father. Elizabeth and her architect husband, Jerome White bought the worn out house in 1992.



They took it down to studs and remade the 1920s cottage with 20th century improvements and loving care.

Elizabeth has always been involved with art. Her first art lessons, aside from elementary school, were in casein paint, from a Catholic nun. After art in high school she went to Boise State for art and music, but a year later left to go to work as an office secretary. That company transferred her to Atlanta, Georgia, where she went back to school, studying commercial photography in a good program. Another move, to San Francisco, got her working with large format cameras and printing 4x5 negatives for a portrait photographer.

When she became a mom they moved to Ashland. True to the Ashland lifestyle, she had a lot of jobs, including photographing artist's work, more secretarial work, and producing Ashland Hospital's publications. Seven years later was the period when digital cameras began replacing film. But what changed her life even more radically was discovering the Crater Rock Museum in Medford, when rock tumbled into her life. She took a silver workshop there, and also had a teacher in Grants Pass. She became enchanted with rock and stones, and little wonder; her father and grandfather

had been too. All of this takes traveling—to find the stones, and to sell the jewelry.

The world's largest rock and mineral show is in Tucson, Arizona. With three weeks in January and February and 40 shows of jewelry, specimens and rarities, the enchanted can become addicted. "We're all obsessed," Elizabeth states. She purchased her weighty beauties and shipped them ahead. Arriving from her flight home, she saw her package and couldn't wait to open it, as excited as a little girl on Christmas morning.

Despite her best efforts, her sons didn't take to art or rocks. One is an engineer who guides

maintenance on nuclear submarines. The other is a helicopter pilot.

Elizabeth went on the road with her jewelry, selling at art shows. She was doing ten shows each year at her peak, including Best of the Northwest and the upscale Salem Art Center. She still does the Corvallis Fall Festival, among others.

She has explored other mediums, studying oil painting with Cliff Wilton for three years, finding principles of abstraction and composition useful in jewelry design. She tried ceramics,

and would immerse herself in woodcraft if she had another lifetime for it.

She started selling her jewelry at Ashland Artisan Gallery, before it morphed into Ashland Art Center. Now she shows as a member at Ashland Art Works, and works on their promotional materials. She loves the artists working in the Studio at Living Opportunities, where she volunteered for six years. She is a board member of Roxy Ann Gem and Mineral Society.

Her newest passion is mixed media and paper collage, composing muted colors and textures borrowed from those rolled into silver, in abstract layouts. She continues in digital photography following useful innovations, showing how she applies tiny lenses to her cellphone camera and the result. Marvelous prints of tiny mushrooms are made large.

With inspirations great and small, she will make jewelry forever and continue the search for new audiences.

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
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
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
