"Perseverance Furthers," it is written in the ancient scrolls. Weathering the losses, we now celebrate the gains that begin to rebuild the visual art presence

in Ashland and the Roque Valley. The First Friday Art Walk, having been the AGA's first event in 1994, is the first to return from the pandemic's void. The nonprofit, Ashland Art Center closed when everything did, but could not reopen, despite valiant attempts to reassemble. Hanson Howard Gallery, following state mandates, stayed alive using best practices and fortitude. A third of the galleries closed.

Artists were left without representation, still scrambling to recover. Several, with all their art stored in home studios, experienced double the misfortune when the Almeda Fire destroyed it all in homes reduced to ash. Facing this landscape, all members are determined to keep the arts strong in themselves and for the community. Donations flowed freely. Many are back on their feet, and the road to success lies ahead.

The Schneider Museum of Art originated an outdoor arts festival, "Art Beyond," locating art installations far afield in the valley, and in the heart of Ashland, attracting visitors from all along the west coast. This response to the limits of the pandemic was bold and inspired hope.

We are proud to promote our membership of Galleries, Associates, Studios and Artists, and encourage you to share in their renewal with your support.





Open Studio Tours

Inside, Outside, All Around the Towns.

This is our 9th year of the annual Ashland Open Studio Tour. In 2020, opening anything was deemed too hazardous. In 2021, we put together an event at Ashland ArtWorks where artists could show their studio work under tents, on the grounds, for one half a day. It was a temporary solution. Now, in 2022, after we dodged a few variants of the deadly virus, we will once again invite you into artists' realms. Some will be inside, some outside, some both. Please honor each artist's safety measures.

It is their workspace they are opening to the public, revealing sometimes surprising processes. It is a place they love to work. It can be solitary work for many months, and having visitors bring their interest and curiosity often brings stimulation and new ideas.

Coming through pandemic circumstances, many artists lost gallery representation after permanent closures. Direct studio sales on this day helps a lot while artists continue to seek new outlets. The Tour could also serve as a first studio visit from a new gallery owner.

The Open Studio Tour can also be a fun outing shared between friends on the 3rd weekend of October. Abiding by requests for COVID safety may include providing proof of vaccination.

There is no charge to take the Tour. Find Tour maps in AGA member galleries, and look for corresponding lettered signs. October 15 and 16, 11–4.

KRISTEN O'NEILL

The studio is situated on a road north of Grants Pass with a view giving onto a downhill slope of trees. We passed inspection by the large Alaskan malamute security detail, aka studio dog. By the end of our visit, we were good friends with Mack.

Kristen sat at her easel, mixing colors and painting a scene of skeletal trees above a bank of fog. On counters around the room are finished paintings included in the current series. They will be shown at Manly Art Center in Brookings this summer.

The house is new to Kristen and her partner. They bought it months ago, but had to wait to move in, and are still adjusting to the environs, much privacy, thanks to the trees.

After trying to make a living in various locations, she moved to southern Oregon in 2015 and felt like she was home. She grew up in the forested hills outside Santa Cruz, Bonny Doon, with so many paces to play. Alas, one of those places was a parcel of forest nearby that was bought and logged,

likely never seen by the owner. The loss was profound to Kristen. The following day, the Loma Prieta earthquake hit. It was clearly a deity expressing a reaction to such a travesty. Young Kristen acquired a world view that landscapes are not stable, placid places, they are dynamic. What we perceive as normal is just a moment in time and liable to change. The same forest caught fire last year.

Kristen completed her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree at the School of the Art Institute in Chicago. Spending so much time with the actual art hanging in the Museum made the experience of art very personal.

Her family is art-oriented. Her great grand-dad was an artist. She started young, drawing with her dad since childhood. Both her parents made their living as computer programmers, and supported her art education. She enjoys paying it forward – helping other artists. While in art school she heard that a mere 2% of the students would actually make a living as an artist. She was determined to be one of them.

She was still in college when the World Trade Center was attacked. As an artist, with any luck, your art becomes the way you control your reactions and process your grief. It is your outlet, especially when shared. The arts are what you need to process trouble. One of her childhood friends in Bonny Doon became a world-renowned violinist. "Your most valued friends expand your world," said Kristen, musing on where they grew up.

Two summers past, fires were burning near her mother's home in California. Another fire threatened her daughters' part-time home. Kristen felt helpless, unable to offer aid. Then came the Almeda Fire. It was getting personal! What she could do was paint, and she started her series on fires. She referred to the paintings facing us. Eighteen years after the Biscuit Fire, the regrowth is still so short and compact, while gray rib-like remains of the forest tower above. The ghost forest. The fire had too much fuel and sat down and burned the soil sterile, she explained.

She showed her "thumbnail" paintings from snapshots of the burned



Kalmiopsis forest that she used in her enlarged compositions. The colors were unique to her style of painting. She took her inspiration and painted her reaction, partly for self-care. This show went up at the Rogue Valley Manor.

In early 2020, she had plans made to go to Ireland, until Covid hit, and Ireland was sending Americans back home. This is what started her thought process about land use and forests.

The year after 9/11, She moved to Washington state, then to Santa Cruz and volunteered at the art museum. She found a job in Omaha, in insurance for 10 years. That was enough to motivate her to build her own artist website, remembering her determination to be one of the professional artist 2%.

When she moved to southern Oregon she was married with two girls. She still has the two girls. She found a real community among the arts, and found love at the family's kung fu lessons.

Kristen has been the Administrative. Assistant at the Grants Pass Museum of Art for six years. And, she has an online job working for Alyson Stanfield, of Art Biz Success, since 2018. Her work is as an artist mentor. She helps artists learn how to get representation in galleries; to apply business techniques for sales; how to teach art; write PR; resumes; coaching. Sometimes she travels for meetings. She was a former student of Stanfield.

Kristen loves to teach painting, giving lessons on an online platform. During the school shut-down, she had the girls, 6 and 11, at home, getting schooled online. Live Zoom in the living room! A bit crazy.

She looks forward in time to giving workshops while traveling. She wants to show her girls the world. She will continue with online workshops and making art. She wants more time for art, kids and teaching, feeling that doing artist mentoring shows a good role model for the girls. One of her daughters shows signs of becoming an artist: always drawing.

It was easy to see that Kristen has energy for all of it. She was busy painting throughout this interview. Asked the titles of her burned forest paintings, she said she names them after the forest's place name, "It's good for internet sales." If someone googles the place name, her painting pops up. Some of these places are special to people, some were married there. It brings people together. It's a New World of inter-connectivity.

PENNY YOST

"The Monkeys Wait Patiently to Play Again." The title of one of Penny's paintings says a lot about her philosophy of art. The image is of a woman meditating in lotus position. Around her sit four gray monkeys with thoughtful expressions before playfully colored trees. One reason she paints is to learn more about her subject matter. Thinking while painting, she considers, "monkey mind." She researches the symbolism and more ideas emerge. She meets challenges in techniques. And then there are "animals as guides." Who are these monkeys? She has a favorite.

Her paintings are planned out. She makes a lot of photo references to get human figures with correct anatomy. She keeps a delicate balance between looseness in stylizing, and essential control; between transparency, detail, opacity for definition, precision. Rather than creating likenesses, Penny intentionally stylizes the figures. She has worked in watercolor and oils but now primarily works in acrylics.

In her current series, most recently shown at the Rogue Valley Manor, she starts with black gesso and paints a colorful floral background merging with small color fields. Then begins the careful application of the partially transparent figures, usually in purposeful poses. Allowing the floral background to show through in the shadow areas by leaving it untouched, while matching the values of the colors.

Penny sows conceptual seeds for the future, painting study sketches, recording color ranges, and levels of transparency. Bolder lines and color fields are a strong part of her style, calm compositions intentionally linear.

Penny enjoyed art and music in her younger years growing up in Montana. She moved to California to study art and design in college and stayed for her design career. She loves learning and returns to classes throughout her life. Art philosophy is a thread through it all.

Penny holds an MBA and bachelor's degrees in both Art and Multimedia from California Lutheran University. She returned for the additional degrees throughout her design career. Penny credits her initial art professors for her diverse art education: John Solem taught how to truly see and classical drawing techniques. Sir Ben Weber taught design and dedication to craftsmanship. Jerry Slattum taught art history and painting with an emphasis on expression and taking risks with your art. Penny went back ten years later to study with Slattum again for a more modern approach and experimentation.

Penny continued her art training taking head and figure drawing classes at California Art Institute with Fred Fixler, Glen Orbik, and Mark Westermoe – all excellent illustrators who taught classical drawing skills. After college, Penny started a graphic design business and taught at Pepperdine University for nine years. After she received her Multimedia degree, she made the switch to web and interactive design – and went to work in corporations such as ABC.com and NBC.com as creative director, heading their web design teams. After 30+ years in design, Penny took a five-year hiatus before moving to the Pacific Northwest to return to fine art.

Penny and her artist husband of 38 years, Michael Lynn Adams, moved to Ashland in 2017. As both are artists, she loves being able to discuss many facets of art. He is very encouraging and supportive, understanding the joys and challenges of the artist's life. For this, she feels blessed and thankful.

Penny's extensive career in design has had a profound impact on her creative approach as an artist. Her favorite artists and art (regardless of style) often demonstrate strong design. She cites artists Gauguin, Van Gogh, Degas, Modigliani, and Thiebaud as her early influences.

Penny believes life is a creative project, always transforming – we are the art.

PAULA FONG

Paula Fong shares a habitat with cougars and ringtails, high above Yank Gulch, outside of Talent. Her studio, a tidy hand-built cabin, shares the point of the ridge with the house they built about 18 years ago. The view is the primary feature you notice, driving up the side of the ridge and emerging onto the top. See it to believe it. Prearranged visits are welcome.

Walking into her studio, with many wire-grid walls hung closely with framed prints and originals, you notice that her focus is not on the vast view, but what she finds within inches, or a few feet. Intimate detailed portraits of mosses, lichens, mushrooms, native wildflowers share the walls with a coy squirrel, and a pair of the aforementioned ringtails. So many more, you could spend some real time looking before you pick one out to take home, like the delicate pink phacelia, or, on a larger scale, a flock of pelicans gliding at nearly wingtips reach of ocean waves breaking on the sand.

Paula's art evolved from her scientific career. Paula received her B.S. In Biology from Denison University in Ohio, and her M.S. in Forest Ecology from the College of Forestry, Oregon State University.



She began by illustrating for science classes, working in pen and ink, continuing to illustrate forest life for her professor, and then for government publications as her career took her through central and eastern Oregon, and eventually to the Rogue Valley. She expanded from black and white to color with a detailed drawing of wildflowers on a poster for the Forest Service, and tried colored pencil as the color medium. She chose watercolor from that point forward, liking its combination of detail and flow.

Paula and her husband came to the Rogue Valley in 1987, "the year of the Silver Fire," by the way they mark years at the Forest Service. She spent 17 years in Grants Pass, where their two children were born. In those years she was a commercial artist, after leaving the government work. There are interpretive signs that can be seen year 'round in several parks. One is at the Grants Pass All Sports Park, another at Rough and Ready Botanical Wayside, and at Pierce Riffle Park in Grants Pass. She made trail signs for Limpy Creek Botanical Trail. She also produced artwork for the Forest Service, including a poster of Rare Plants of the Siskiyous.

She left the Forest Service to focus more time on artwork, moving to Talent in 2004. There was an art community starting to bloom in Grants Pass, and she painted one of the first bear statues that now fill the "Bear Hotel." Paula felt they were leaving behind art opportunities. But she became a member of the Ashland Art Center and could be seen working the front desk, until it closed two years ago. Art shows and festivals became a focus.

They found their amazing aerie in Talent while the kids were still young. On a hike, Paula found a tiny, old apple tree way up on the ridge, evidence of a settlement. She made a painting of its blossoms, thinking about some of its long history.

Paula is on the Natural History Board at Crater Lake. An upcoming project is to produce an illustrated journey along the Rogue River from its inception at Boundary Springs and continuing to the ocean. This will include a variety of perspectives, changes of focus, details and landscapes. She even bought treeclimbing equipment for aerial views over the river. It will be a journey in pictures: an artistic celebration of the diversity in our dynamic watershed.

She is imagining a full-size sheet of watercolor paper, feeling it is time to go larger with her painting. Presently, she has a show at Simple Machine Winery in Talent. She's looking forward to finding new places to exhibit her artwork, and the next Open Studio Tour, to welcome visitors up the high road.

The Golden Connection

With completion of the railroad, "Ashland had a population boom. Local agriculture, industry and cultural activities all expanded."

he "Golden Connections" sculpture marking the Historic Railroad District is scheduled for completion and installation in the spring of 2022. The sculpture will be placed in the Railroad Park in a small, grassy area at the bottom of 7th Street.

Complementing the sculpture will be five bronze medallions to be placed in sidewalks at five historic sites in the Railroad District. The medallions are titled, Ashland Train Station and Roundhouse, the Natatorium and Twin Plunges, Fourth Street Fire Station, Ashland Depot Hotel Kitchen, and Ashland's Chinatown. The Chinatown medallion on 2nd street commemorates the Wah Chung family and the impact he had in supporting the Chinese community that came to work on the railroad. Dale Shostrom, Terry Skibby and Peter Finkle contributed to the production of the medallions. Andy Stallman did much of the overall project coordination and most of the communications with Jennifer Andrews, owner of Masterworks Plaques who cast the medallion plaques. Stanley Smith was a major contributor for the project.

This project represents the first of the Marking Ashland Places (MAP) public art works to create a Historic Marker Program approved by the City Council in May, 2013. The project was dormant until joint sub-committee meetings of the Public Arts Commission (PAC) and Historic Commission (HC) members began in 2018. In December of 2020, the Request for Qualifications (RFQ) was issued to professional artists or artist-led teams to design, fabricate, deliver, and install a contemporary free-



standing, site-specific artwork, within Ashland's Historic Railroad District. The RFQ specified the artwork be visually stimulating, perhaps whimsical and colorful, and responsive to the site in terms of scale, material, and form; and reflect the historic significance of the Ashland Railroad District.

Ashland has a rich and diverse history not easily discernible on the landscape. The MAP project is best described as a historic marker and way finding

project to provide a connection to the history of today's landscape. The project is intended to create a sense of place and pride by establishing distinctive landmarks within the City's **Registered Historic** ASILIAND TRAIN STATION Districts and will serve to promote historic and heritage tourism in the City. In addition, a plaque will describe the importance of the project to the historic district.

Physically the sculpture is described as a "large golden spike which penetrates a 9.5 foot diameter circle made from steel I beam. The topside of the circle becomes a winding train track, signifying the topsy-turvy journey over

The artists' introduction in their submission wrote, "...the sculpture merges a trio of powerful symbols to tell the story of how the railroad spurred a huge transformation in Ashland when Southern Pacific chose the town as a main stop on their Portland-San Francisco line as well as a full-service maintenance yard. The symbols come together in a fun

> way that creates a clean, contemporary artwork that boldly welcomes people to Railroad Park while framing the beautiful mountainous landscape behind it. The artwork becomes a canvas for storytelling vignettes that give the viewer insight into the

important history that surrounds them at that very location."

The artists' submission narrative explains each of the elements of the proposed design. They wrote, "...the spike becomes a canvas for short textual phrases that help paint a picture of Ashland during the days when the railroad was in full operation." And, "...a gigantic railroad spike becomes a focal point for the sculpture. It honors Ashland's

distinction as the final connection (in 1887) for the S&P's complete rail service around the nation. But this spike does more than call attention to this major national event: it also symbolizes the local significance of Ashland's growth and evolution as a town and community as the train service was established. Its gold color alludes to this golden period for Ashland and the Railroad District as population, commerce and culture expanded. The spike can also be viewed as a pin on a map. Because Ashland was a rest stop for train passengers, more and more people came through, stopped to stretch their legs, eat lunch, buy snacks, and get a taste of Lithia water. People from other places got to know Ashland. The railroad put Ashland on the map, so to speak! The 'pin' lands in the middle of the circular frame, right in between its larger, well-known neighbors of Portland and San Francisco."

The North side of the spike contains a long overdue offering of gratitude to the Chinese laborers who worked under difficult conditions to build these tracks despite discrimination and without recognition. Seven Chinese calligraphy characters translate to English as "Today, with regret, we offer our belated gratitude." The artists collaborated with Meiwen Richards of Ashland on the wording on the spike, as well as Dr. Jiyu Yang, a Portlandbased Chinese scholar and artist, who created the calligraphy.

In March of 2021 the PAC reviewed submissions for the project in conformance with City guidelines and confirmed that all three finalists' submissions would be appropriate. A selection panel was formed. The panel selected the proposal by Jennifer Corio and Dave Frei of Cobalt Designworks. The sculpture adds significantly to Ashland's more than forty-nine public art pieces. A complete list of public art can be found on the City website. One PAC Commissioner noted the importance of public art to the culture and allure of Ashland and said, "The entire City of Ashland is a gallery of public art works for citizens and tourists alike." •



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
