



There are artists who teach, among our membership, which is good news for anyone looking to begin or resume their art instruction, and a list of contacts provided for you.

The art that is free to enjoy in the public sphere has a committee looking after it. We try to have the latest news on Ashland's public art from those dedicated souls of the Ashland Public Art Advisory Committee.

THREE ARTISTS

Selected at random from the artist membership. Interviewed by Ann DiSalvo photos by B. Bayard

CINDY TRIPLETT

In Southern California, her great Aunt Ruth encouraged five-year-old Cindy to paint in watercolor. Her mother's best friend, Netta Stuart, mosaicist and modern art painter mentored Cindy, who later inherited her paints. All through high school she followed art. She got her art degree from SOSC, 1974 to 1979, in classes from Robert Alston, Lyle Matoush, Betty LaDuke, and Clifford Sowell, who focused on watercolor. Cindy came away with a curiosity for a variety of mediums.

In the greater art world she discovered the mid-century modern artist, Toza Redakovich, who became an influence, as did Wayne Thibaud. She took a postmodern watercolor workshop with Michael Schlicting. Van Gogh and Picasso were favorites, and later, Suzanne Seddon Boulet. Cindy enjoys variety too much to be pinned down to one style, but she always comes back to watercolor, to abstract landscape forms and mixing in other mediums.

She showed a consistent theme in her series, "Portals," a kind of gateway to a connected dimension. Her first was more terrestrial, but the rest appear to be a watery transition. One had swirls of a mixture of gesso and matte medium on heavy watercolor paper, which would then have a watercolor





overpainting pooling beside the strokes, heightening the sense of motion, as she demonstrated.

Her studio is down the hall of her cozy house with a view of the mountains. A 6' x 4' tapa cloth she got in Fiji hangs on the wall, spreading good feelings in the space. Mulberry bark with intricate designs painted in pigments. Cindy has visited many places in the South Pacific: Fiji, Hawaii, Tahiti, New Zealand and Australia. There is a strong influence of the sea and these cultures in her later works. Nearby was a table loom. Her elders were weavers and bought this loom for her in hopes she would be, too. After many moves in 35 years and no weaving, she recently decided to honor her promise to them. Taking classes from the Rogue Valley Handweavers Guild, she came to enjoy it.

To make sense of all the paints on hand from various sources, she made a study of color samples in her tidy, functional studio. A short walk behind the house is another studio that was built as a small greenhouse.



She transformed it into a place where she can paint larger works in oils and acrylics. A triptych abstract of wind and water was in progress. She started early studying oils and continues to keep her hand in it, taking care to ventilate the studio well.

Cindy's living room is her showroom, and the point she made about painting in a variety of styles was quite evident. Two plein air oils were painted in a residency in southern California and stood out as more true-to-life than much of her plein air. The two had a warmer palette, capturing low light in a valley.

Cindy plans series with specific themes. One example is relating expressive ceramic masks with weavings and paintings—her "elemental series." The theme running through all of her works is painting her reactions to the natural world, often a response to the sea; being out in nature; mountains, creeks, waterfalls, lakes. There is much water in her imagery, bringing spiritual and metaphorical references.

Cindy pointed out an abstract piece that was accepted into a show by the International Society of Experimental Artists, or ISEA. She is a member of Watercolor Society of Oregon and shows with them in spring and fall. And as a member of the Rogue Gallery & Art Center, she shows in the Members' Gallery and annual shows. She is represented by Gallerie Karon.

Teaching art to teenagers kept her on her toes, first at Ashland Middle School. Then, while living in Talent from 1995 to '98, she taught at Crater High in Medford. The following year was a big move to Warner Springs, near San Diego. She continued to teach art, this time to Native American teens from the nearby reservations, and the Hispanic students.



During her time in the south, she met and married Ryan, a significant part of her life. Fifteen years later, she retired from teaching and returned alone to the Rogue Valley, having lost Ryan to cancer. She still has a small model ship he made, which turns up in her artwork.

Since her return she has renewed old friendships and enjoys going out for live music and dancing to rock and roll music, and Balkan circle dances. The movement and joyful sounds become very much a source of enjoyment and inspiration for her art.

CHRISTA DIAMANT

To be an artist was her childhood desire, and throughout her life she was inspired by art she has seen around the world in her many travels for vacations and business trips. Her career was as a law firm administrator in Los Angeles. Her husband was principle attorney. When they rebuilt the office, they acquired art for the walls, and furniture from high-end designers, architects, names like LeRoy Neimann and Frank Gehry.

Buying at galleries in Soho, and so many other New York locations, was an opening into wider art worlds and spurred her creative ideas, while developing a deep appreciation of fine art and design.

Her mother lived in New York and during visits she would take time in art museums like the Guggenheim and MOMA. Her first husband was a graphic designer and influential in



Christa's development of art practice. She is primarily self-taught. She showed us three of her paintings in the style of Kandinsky.

Christa told us a story about seeing a very large abstract painting that she liked, but the cost was prohibitive. Then she wondered, why not make one herself? It's on her wall in a prominent position among many other oil abstracts she's painted over the years. Bright colors in red and gold contrast with the picture window view of the gray, wintry Siskiyou and Cascade foothills.

Before retiring, she took classes occasionally at UCLA extension in Santa Monica. And since moving to Ashland has found workshops, abstract art classes at OLLI, and artists who teach. She enjoyed Cathy Dorris' session in Talent, and the group that formed at Suzanne Etienne's studio. Suzanne really helped her to see, as she began a transition to realism, and gave her confidence. After Suzanne had to move to L.A., her student group rented her studio to continue painting together.

Presently, Christa is working on illustrations for a children's book project, a collaboration with her granddaughter, who is studying musical theater at age 22 and has studied art at the Barcelona Institute. The story is about Christa's dogs. She finds the process enriches her relationship with her granddaughter.

When Christa and her husband were looking for a retirement home, they started on the Oregon coast, having lived near the ocean in Malibu. But they found the art and culture at a minimum. Visiting Ashland, they found the level of culture sufficient, and the house they wanted, but it wasn't available in 2008. Two years later they were able to move into their beautiful home, with only a few minutes drive down the mountainside to theater, art, and good restaurants.

It is also a wonderful place to raise litters of Portugese water dogs, and train them for show and agility events. The book project has tied Christa's art study to her love of dogs. The evidence is her sustained improvement in realism. Dog portraits cover her studio walls alongside the dogs' show ribbons. After twenty years of dog training she knows her subjects well.

She had always considered her art as a hobby, purely for enjoyment. She couldn't become an artist because of work and family. But life changes, and she finds herself going toward art now. It is fun to paint, fun to learn, taking a different direction with illustrating, and spending time with her granddaughter. She has all the enjoyment and something to show for it.

LINDA J DIXON

Art and creativity spans three generations in Linda's family. Her mother and her daughter partook in the practice. While always creative herself, Linda didn't start painting until Camp Darby, near Liverno, Italy. She was 31, taking advantage of an art studio and teacher on the base while it lasted. Later on, she taught herself when they moved to Vicenza for a year. Next, to Germany for three years, where she worked in oils and stained glass, but was always experimenting, trying new mediums. She was overseas for seven years.

Back in the USA they landed in Oklahoma and she got involved with artists by starting groups. In Shawnee, Oklahoma, she organized artists around events, making connections which formed an arts council. She was part of a program, Leadership Arts Oklahoma, where she learned to facilitate and advocate for arts programming, while visiting communities to learn how others were supporting art. She met lots of fun people, like Cynthia Wolfe in her gallery, Adelante, in The Paseo, in Oklahoma City.

Linda also worked at Mabee-Gerrer museum. She was involved with a



Her degree is in 3D arts, and she enjoys breaking boundaries. She works in oils, in short coherent series. It's hard to rein herself in from new ideas. One way was to limit her palette to certain moods. Another way reduced paintings in time (30 minutes) and space (12 X 12), experimenting to find her palette, starting with transparent colors. Painting during the pandemic, she created arches and doorways through

which she would wander and escape into the image.

Linda joined the Medford Public Art Commission a year ago, finding it a good way to connect with where she lives. Organizing arts in Oklahoma was high energy; she's glad to come to where it's already organized. She is involved in creating opportunities for artists on projects—returning to the Pillars Project under the bypass downtown, and in spring, painting electric utility boxes—a new project for MPAC.

So much is new to her here. She knew everyone in the Oklahoma arts world. Here, there are so many to meet. It feels freer to converse here, but there, she learned how to create a safe haven for creatives in arts organization.

"I'm a good teacher—I can diagnose problems and help students on their journey," says Linda, and she is now teaching in the classroom of Rogue Gallery and Art Center. Artists Who Teach

Ann DiSalvo

here is a belief that teaching art prevents artists who teach from reaching their full potential as fine artists. We believe there is no direct correlation. Some gifted artists are also gifted teachers. They love to teach, and they consistently produce works that sell. In this article we refer you to some of these doubly-gifted artists who are members of the AGA.

You may have been wondering where you could find a teacher of a specific medium, or skill level. After so much time alone in recent years, perhaps you're ready for some direction in your creative activity. There is a certain satisfaction you get from making something with your own hands. Sometimes it's a struggle with doubt or lack of confidence. Help is near, with tips for your success.

Perhaps you had to postpone your study with a favorite teacher due to a deadly virus pandemic. These things happen. Could it be, the coast is clear for return? Some of these teachers are so talented, they are capable of teaching from their studios using lights, camera, and a microphone, and were able to teach remotely after a pause to retool.

There are choices of group classes, or private lessons, and frequency of classes. There are some weekly group sessions with no designated teacher, for artists to show up and put in their hours of practice among colleagues, especially for figure study. Potentially, one could ask for tips on technique.

Looking deeper, one could find local residencies, internships, tutors and mentors.

Kristen O'Neill offers private and group lessons specializing in painting landscapes. Once her studio remodel is compete she will open for private lessons. She has online courses, and she teaches at the Rogue Gallery, the Grants Pass Museum, and the Southern Oregon Guild. Public Arts Advisory Committee 2023 Update

shland's Public Arts Advisory Committee and the Historic Preservation Advisory Committee presented to the City Council a mural work by John Pugh at the second February 2023 meeting. Both committees have recommended the work for the side of the Elks building visible from Main Street, to be accepted in concept as a gift to the city and upon completion included in the public art collection. The mural is presented according to guidelines for murals within the city.

Pugh has created works around the country for three decades. His proposed work for Ashland is regarded by the two committees as an outstanding contribution to the public art collection. Its themes relate to local Indigenous people, the Chautauqua domes and the enchantment of Ashland parks, culture and community.

The past year has been busy for the Public Arts Advisory Committee (PAAC). In January 2023, the PAAC successfully hosted a Public Forum as requested by the Council. Artist Micah Blacklight described and presented illustrations of his future public art sculpture called "Ancestor's Future—Crystallizing our Call." The theme of the forum was how public art can contribute to community understanding, inclusion and healing.

In the summer of 2022, the PAAC approved Ashland High School's gift to the city of the Otterlifter Canoe for placement on Siskiyou Boulevard. The canoe was given to Dan Wahpepah who donated it to the high school. Dan and his wife Jennifer hosted an educational and emotional October 2022 public art dedication ceremony at the high school plaza.



In April 2022, the Public Arts Commission hosted the dedication of the Railroad Park sculpture Golden Connections by Jennifer Corio and Dave Frey. Speakers highlighted the contribution of thousands of Chinese laborers who built the railroad tracks through the Siskiyou Mountains, as well as the impact of the railroad on Ashland's growth from 1888 to the early 1900s.

PAAC looks forward in 2023 to the installation of five bronze sidewalk plaques that will honor historic sites in the Railroad District of town. These historic plaques have been a joint project of the Historic Preservation Committee and PAAC.
