

## Bright brained

IMPLEMENTING THE LATEST in infant brain-development research is simpler than you think. It isn't brain surgery; it's brain science. And Jill Stamm, Ph.D., cofounder of the New Directions Institute for Infant Brain Development, translates the latest neuroscience research into practical suggestions for parents in her new book, *Bright From the Start*. Stamm and co-author Paula Spencer give parents and caregivers the ABCs of parenting the very young:

- Attention: face-to-face time and a varied, naturally stimulating environment.
- Bonding: at least one consistent caregiver.
- Communication: exposure to spoken language.

Stamm and Spencer also dispel some myths—like the belief that playing a CD of Mozart will make your child automatically smarter. Sorry. Computer games for kids under 3? Nope. Their needs are far simpler. They need your time, your talk and interaction with you and caregivers.

"It is the amount of time you spend, not the amount of money," says Stamm, an associate clinical professor in the Department of Psychology in Education at Arizona State University. ## Childsplay season will open in a new venue

CHILDSPLAY HAS COME a long way in the 30 years it has been performing around the Valley and state. Arizona's professional theater company for young audiences and families was founded in 1977 with four actors and a station wagon. The company has

grown to encompass 60 employees, 700 performances a year and a \$3 million annual budget. It will open its 2007-08 season in the new, state-of-the-art Tempe Center for the Arts on the banks of Tempe Town Lake.

Childsplay also broke ground in June on a renovation project at the Mitchell School in Tempe. The new facility, which will be called the Sybil B. Harrington Campus for Imagination and Wonder at Mitchell Park, will house Childsplay's administrative offices, production shops,



the Childsplay Academy, a laboratory theater that seats 70 and a rehearsal hall, as well as collaborative space for other local arts organizations. Next month, the company opens a national tour of "Tomás and the Library Lady" in Hampton, Iowa, the setting for a story that inspires children to look beyond the confines of poverty, language barriers and cultural intolerance to find joy in reading. The play is based on the book of the same name by Pat Mora, with music adapted by José Cruz González. childsplayaz.org.
