

6. Characterized by severe gastroenteritis with rice water diarrhea.
8. In a disaster setting this color code signifies extreme injuries and that survival is unlikely.
12. Amyl nitrite is the antidote for this poison.
14. Nerve agent which produces excessive lacrimation, salivation, pinpoint pupils and seizures.
16. Used to treat the symptoms due to exposure to nerve agents.
17. This color code used in a disaster setting signifies that immediate treatment is needed for good chances of survival.
18. Type of fracture with broken skin and damage to soft tissues.
19. Example of a radioactive material.
20. One of the four categories of asphyxial injuries.

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1. Triage in the field uses this color coded system.
3. The compression of blood vessels and air passages result in anoxia and \_\_\_\_\_.
4. A tear in the skin and soft tissues with ragged edges.
5. A classification of a chemical agent.
7. Caused by friction and results in the removal of the superficial skin layers.
9. Skin flap formed by the forceful separation of the tissues.

11. Ambient oxygen levels below this percentage are dangerous and can be fatal.
13. Results from fluid in the respiratory passages.
15. Device applied proximal to a wound to control bleeding.
