

Counter Top

Worktop Oil is designed for untreated or previously oiled/sanded wood surfaces. The oil makes the surface highly water and dirt repellent. Use Worktop Oil, Natural, on both dark and light wood species – such as mahogany, merbau, teak, cherry, ash, oak, beech, maple, birch, pine etc. - to give the wood a mellow, golden color. Use Worktop Oil, White, to lighten up the wood or give it a whitewashed effect. Ensure good ventilation at all times during the application and drying time.



Instructions

- 1. If the surface is particularly smooth, sand it with 180 grit sandpaper.
- 2. Make sure the wood is dry and free of any dirt or grease. Clean the wood with Wood Cleaner. After cleaning, let the tabletop dry for at least 8 hours.
- 3. Stir the oil thoroughly before use.
- 4. Use a paintbrush to apply a suitable amount of oil in an even, adequate coat.
- 5. Wait approx. 20-30 minutes at 20°C (68°F) while the oil penetrates into the wood. If necessary, sand the wood while the surface is still wet with oil. Wet sand along with the wood grain with 320-400 grit sandpaper.
- 6. Next, wipe off all excess oil using a lint-free cotton cloth. Do not leave any excess oil on the surface.
- 7. Carefully polish the wood using a white polishing pad, which makes the surface more hard-wearing.

- 8. Repeat the treatment on highly absorbent surfaces.
- 9. The oil will thoroughly hardened after 24 hours at 20°C (68°F). Do not let the tabletop become wet during the hardening process.

Use Worktop Oil to maintain the tabletop four times a year, or as often as necessary. Before starting the maintenance procedure, clean the worktop using Wood Cleaner, and let the surface dry for at least 8 hours. Follow the procedure in items 2 through 7, but apply only one coat of oil.
