Three Great Rules*

1. **Double:** Double the last consonant in a **CVC** closed syllable word when adding a vowel suffix.

- Do not double <x>, <y>, and <w> (as in boxing and rowing)
- 2. Drop: Drop a single Silent-e when adding a vowel suffix

3. Change: Change the <y> to an <i> when adding a suffix.

$$try' + ed \rightarrow tried$$
 $reply' + es \rightarrow replies$
 $fancy' + er \rightarrow fancier$

- Leave <y> when adding suffix -ing (as in crying—because English does not use two i's in a row)
- Leave <y> when part of vowel teams <ey>, <oy>, and <ay> (as in buyer, praying, or joyous).

* Advanced Rule (for older students)

Double: Double the last consonant in a 2-syllable word when adding a vowel suffix.

- IF the second syllable is a CVC closed syllable, and
- IF the second syllable is accented.

• Do not double if the accent is on the first syllable (as in visiting and creditor).
