PETS GET NICE NEW CEMETERY

Dr. Elinor McGrath Buys Midlothian Plot and Prepares Graves.

An "animals' rest have perma-all the canine saints are to have perma-Dr. Elinor McGrath of 8217 Indiana ave-

nue purchased an acre of land in Midlothian yesterday and has plans all laid for the last resting place of the city's pets.

Buddle, a Boston bulldog that of pneumonia, is already embalmed and waiting interment next Saturday. Refuge and Crematory.

"There is to be a fountain in the center and a plot is all ready for Weenie's grave. (Weenie is Dr. McGrath's vellow alley cat.) There are to be circular drives and grassy mounds, a refuge and a crematory for the animals," she said. " I wish to build a refuge for the stray ani-

mals out there with the proceeds. "This will be the first animal cometery in the west, although Paris, London, New York, and Boston have them. There is a demand for a pets' burial place in Chicago, as the city ordinance forbids the burying of animals within the city limits. So, persons who dislike to discard their faithful companions are forced to bury them in their backyards at nightfall to escape penalty of \$100 tine from the health department.

Special Caskets Ordered.

" Patrons of mine have taken their dead pets into the country for burial, having the expense of railroad fare and so on. They have brought fancy shawls and flowers for their pets to the hospital and carried them away.

"Because of this demand, I have arranged with the Chicago Casket company to make special caskets."

"A plain funeral will be possible for an animal at a cost of \$3. This will include a zinc lined pine box, converance to the cemetery, and a grave. Embalming and flowers come as extras.

No Prayers, but Mottoes.

For a small dog or cat a space two
feet square is sufficient, but for a collic or Airedale a grave two feet by four feet will be required. A canary will occupy a much smaller lot. When one wishes a decorated casket for his pet and a tomb-stone to record the animal's deeds of whor or other inscriptions there will be added charges, perhaps \$25 for a burial. "Beautiful prayers for a pup will be not offered here, as this will be consid-ered sacrilegious, nor will soloists sing

at the services. But there will be culogies in the pets' cemetery, such as 'In ever loving memory of our daring little Frog-gy,' 'Dear, faithful Mille friend Jack,' on the tombatones.

"The dog life is, on an average, very

short: A 10 year old dog is equal in age to a person of 40."

The tract of land for the pets' ceme-tery was purchased from A.T. McIntosh & Co. for \$640. It is situated at One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and Springfield avenue.
