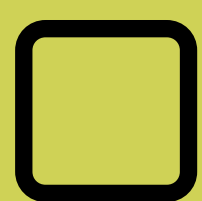




HOWLIDAY PET SAFETY CHECKLIST



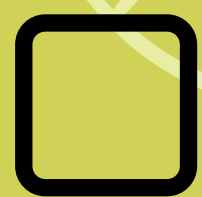
KEEP HUMAN FOOD OUT OF YOUR PET'S REACH

Switch your glass ornaments for shatterproof ones. You might also want to consider removing the tinsel from your tree if you have a cat.



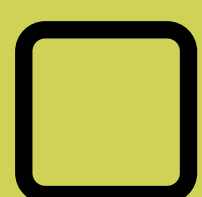
PACK WIRES AND BATTERIES AWAY

Wires can deliver harmful electric shocks, and a punctured battery can cause unpleasant burns to your pet's mouth.



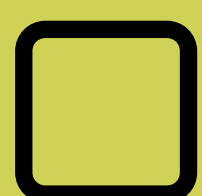
SECURE THE CHRISTMAS TREE PROPERLY
