
## Take to the stage!

Maybe you would prefer your family to be the audience and you will read everything yourself?


It's up to you!

In the story of Oliver Twist, poor little Oliver is an orphan, all alone and desperately hungry. One day he is so hungry that he decides to ask the man in charge, Mr Bumble, for a second helping of food...

Child as he was, he was desperate with hunger and reckless with misery. He rose from the table, and advancing, basin and spoon in hand, to the master, said, somewhat alarmed at his own temerity,

"Please, sir, I want some more"

In this section, Oliver is desperate and terrified! If he makes the men in charge of the workhouse angry, they will shout at him or beat him or maybe even worse...

reckless = taking risks temerity = boldness, bravery

The master was a fat, healthy man, but he turned very pale. He gazed in stupefied astonishment on the small rebel for some seconds, and then clung for support to the copper. The assistants were paralysed with wonder, and the boys with fear. "What!" said the master at length, in a faint voice.

In this section, the master of the workhouse has never heard anything so astonishing in his life! In all his years of service, nothing like this has ever happened before! He is a 'fat, healthy man' and has no idea what it might feel like to be truly hungry. He thinks that Oliver should be grateful for the tiny portions of horrible food he is given!
