Washing the laundry was really hard work and normally happened each Monday.

Servants would need to learn exactly what was needed for each different kind of fabric and stain, not only to make sure that they got the washing clean, but also to make sure that they didn't ruin it in the process!

Some loads of laundry needed homemade soap jelly, some needed dangerous chemicals such as sulphuric acid, some even needed handfuls of fresh ivy leaves – and this is to name just a few!

avoid the washing becoming dirty
again in the sooty air. Basements
became very damp and often

(very smelly!).


Soap

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Answers

10 Squeeze the water out of the sheets and hang them up to dry.



4 Wait for the water to get h (this could take a while!)




11 Iron the sheets, fold the sheets and put them away (it must be time for bed now – yawn!)



5 Scoop the water out of the copper and into the washtub with the sheets (be careful, it's very hot!)



6 Rub homemade soap jelly through the sheets. Do this three times!



7 If sheets are still a little bit yellow, repeat steps 3-6 and add blue dye.
