NEW STUFF

I finally found THE fabric for the long awaited (by some of you) Early Doublet. It's a beautiful, dense, wool blend satin-weave, (never saw anything like it before), in nine deep gem colors. It's in production as I write, and will be our least expensive doublet at \$145. And beautiful! Men's sizes from small to XL.

vere named after a musical where they were launched, on a friend's stage. They are a child of thrift, (or pack-rat tendencies) and crustacean design; For five years I've saved the scraps of our expensive custom-quilted doublet materials. And one day, there it was, a pieced vest with shoulder shields, hand cut, multicolored, (or all black) quilted, crustacean, beautiful, in six sizes from women's small to men's XL. At \$75- and 85- depending on size.

ON BODICES

Since I first designed our brocade bodice 15 years ago, material costs have at least quadrupled. To keep them within affordable range I've had to downgrade the materials yearly while making less on them. Copies have appeared all over the Faires. The stiffening we've used will eventually accordion pleat under the pressure of even the most svelte slouch. They keep selling, but frankly, I'm sick of them!

AH, the eventual rewards of the pack-rat! The "Starmites" gave me the idea. Out came the bales of precious scraps for a perfect pieced bodice, with three front openings edged with steel bone. NOW we're talking bodice! Bring me your bosoms, ladies, and we will lace you into steel! We're considering a canvas version too. The brocade ones are \$85- and

The old bodice is still available mostly in smaller sizes till we run out or decide to re-instate it. We still have peplum bodices in five sizes and will be working on less expensive bodice variations.

SKIRTS

To go with all these bodices we have a new skirt. It's a satin double kerchief skirt available in many lush color combinations, edged and beaded. Decidedly flirtatious. Not serious. Wenchy. What else... New doublets (quilted) in lots of new colors; blue, green, purple, and plum velvets. New Skye Clowns. Lots of new baggies. Plenty of stock in all our standard designs.

And, oh yes, you may have noticed the shoes, in our Carver booth last year. Quite gorgeous, yes. There are 75 pairs in our warehouse right now. The truth is that we haven't decided what to do about them yet. Feet need a lot of attention we may not have...

So. 1991. Is the dread "Economy" Jabberwock going to bite us, or is it just showing its teeth and weeding out some schlock? One thing seems clear; if you're small, you have to be best. It's the one thing that will keep you individuals coming.
