Why we need to Make Space for Homeless Queers

LGBTIQ+ people regularly face discrimination, lack of understanding and violence throughout Britain. 18% of LGBT people have experienced homelessness, 25% for trans people and 28% of LGBT disabled people.

Discrimination often follows people as they try to access services intended to help vulnerable individuals.

"abuse and homophobia, biphobia and/or transphobia can be perpetrated by services themselves" - Homeless Link, 2020

What can I do to Make Space for Homeless Queers

Who are The Outside Project

The Outside Project are an LGBTIQ+ identity responsive service primarily run and founded by queer people with lived experience of homelessness.

The Outside Project provides shelter to people regardless of recourse to public funds, has a majority trans and neurodiverse staff team and works to challenge discrimination within the homelessness sector and wider society.

What can I do to Make Space for Homeless Queers

Activate your workplace; make a statement about your organisations' values

- Fundraising as a team can help identity-responsive organisations increase their capacity and encourage activism in your team.
- Share the campaign with your network.
- Services and resources that your workplace may be well placed to provide can deliver meaningful impact for organisations like The Outside Project. Bare in mind that offers like a single day of volunteering per year are unlikely to have any impact.
- Ask 'could a homeless LGBTIQ+ person confidently apply for an entry level job at my workplace?'


Join the virtual protest

- Is there an LGBTIQ+ Shelter in your local area?


If the answer is no, please join our campaign;
