Another new piece of Oxford aircraft tooling is unveiled this month, with the launch of a carrier-capable fighter aircraft that saw service in WWII and later the Korean War of the 1950s. In 1:72 scale, we have reproduced the example of the WWII F4U Corsair as flown by Don Balch of Marine Fighting Squadron (VMF-221), one of the United States Marine Corps fighter squadrons, which was also known as the 'Fighting Falcons' squadron.

The Corsair proved a worthy match against the Japanese Zeros in the war over the Pacific. The squadron ended WWII with 185 air to air victories. The notable squadron aces included

Donald Luther Balch,

who had 5 kills. Vought manufactured the majority of Corsairs but as demand grew, both Goodyear and Brewster also produced the aircraft. From delivery of the first prototype in 1940 to the last to come off the production line in 1953, Vought manufactured 12,571 Corsairs.

William Lyons launched the 2.5 litre saloon at the Mayfair Hotel in September 1935. The model was the first to carry the Jaguar name and cost £395. It was the first four-door car to come out of the SS Company and for the following two years, the Jaguars would have coach built bodies and wooden frames. By 1938, the car had been upgraded to include an all-steel frame – a Jaguar innovation amongst small specialist car manufacturers. The SS Jaguar 2.5 litre saloon remained in production until 1949, during which time 6777 had been produced for the discerning motorists of the period.

Our Modern Truck sector of the Haulage Company range benefits from another new piece of Oxford tooling in 1:76 scale, which comes with all the features of the latest Volvo FH 'facelift' cab, which the manufacturers introduced last year, which includes new styling to the front grilles and headlights. In real life, the Volvo FH was introduced in 1993 and is still very much in use today. FH stands for Forward Control High Cab and if you see numbers afterwards, e.g. FH12 or FH16, these signify the engine capacity in litres. The Volvo engine design put them amongst the world leaders, resulting in their FH range being one of the most successful introductions ever sold, with a reputed 400,000 units worldwide. Albert Road Recovery is part of the Canute Haulage Ltd group, which acquired Albert Road Recovery in 1995. This branch of the company, in the bright yellow and red liveried vehicles, still operates from Purfleet in Essex, providing part of Canute's national roadside recovery network of engineers and workshops. With the current UK weather situation, we bet they were busy throughout last winter!

The Austin Welfarer Ambulance is a variation of the Austin K8, which we introduced as part of the Oxford new tooling programme very recently. Launched in 1947, the K8 was a versatile vehicle used for a wide range of commercial purposes. The factory built ambulance conversion on the K8 was called K8/AA and featured various modifications to make it suitable for transporting patients. For instance, it was fitted with low-pressure tyres, whilst the suspension was altered to give a softer ride by using different springs and shock absorber settings.

Access to the rear accommodation was either through the nearside side door or via the double doors at the back, where folding steps were fitted.

The basic cost of the Austin Welfarer Ambulance was £805 but ambulance services could order various combinations of seats and stretchers, depending on their requirements. It is thought there are only two Austin Welfarer ambulances still in existence in the UK, one of which 'starred' in the sci-fi film 'Quatermass Experiment' For our first release on the 'Welfarer', we have chosen the livery of Nottinghamshire County Council Ambulance Service, registration KOK 88, in mid blue with contrasting trim and wheel arches. Note particularly the emergency spotlight and Ambulance sign above the front window. The real vehicle, which we used for reference, is owned and has been restored by the East Midlands Ambulance Service Conservation Group and attends many shows. Something to look out for next season!

By 1939 there were 52 Leyland/Metz turntable ladders being used by British fire brigades. However, due to the WWII hostilities, further orders were cancelled, to be replaced in due course by Merryweather appliances. However, 32 of the TLM/Metz remained in service – some lasting until the mid 1960s. This is an updated piece of tooling, a closed cab version of our Leyland TLM fire engine. It is in the Newcastle City Fire Brigade livery - fantastic colours ! TAFF

The need for Austin to create uniform coloured vehicles across the country was very difficult, with local dealers adopting different styles. This led to various newsletters requesting the use of Austin Stone Grey, Austin Claret or Austin Blue. Slogans were also suggested, such as “You can depend on Austin Service” or “Express Spare Parts Delivery”. Dealers were reminded that a well designed service vehicle will have a long term impact in the public. This Austin K8 is shown in the Mann Egerton livery and is a nice edition to the range that we have released.


Such a big vehicle, the 1:76 versions will appear in a couple of months and they are certain to create a lot of interest, at the smaller scale some of our models become even more appealing.

We have featured the Co-op livery on many items over the years and this 1:43<sup>rd</sup> Bedford CA Milk Float is a nice addition to the range. Robert Owen is often regarded as the father of the Co-operative movement, but the concept goes back further when trading companies were formed to arrange the bulk purchases of cheap foodstuffs. The Co-operative Wholesale Society came into existence in 1863 in a small warehouse in Manchester. In 1873 they started to manufacture goods: biscuits, boots and shoes, soap, washing machines, corsets, bicycles etc. They later purchased tea plantations in Ceylon and butter facilities in Denmark. However, for many what was so attractive were the advertisements, particularly pre-war, that had their own very unique style.

The original - CDU 700 - belonged to Mrs Greta Lyons - later Lady and wife of Williams Lyons, who had launched the car at the Mayfair Hotel in London in 1935. Lady Lyons, who used the car for her own personal transport, added a few personal touches - made at her request. You can see the real thing in the Jaguar Daimler Heritage Trust Museum at the famous Browns Lane, Allesley site in Midlands.

the MG ZA Magnette that was designed by ex-Jowett Javelin designer Gerald Palmer. It made its debut in 1953 to an eager band of MG saloon enthusiasts. The new Magnette shared its Palmer designed bodyshell with the Wolseley 4/44 which appeared at the same time. The Magnette made good use of the BMC 1489cc, B-Series engine which gave this mid-sized family car good performance for its day. It had a graceful four door body style that looked almost Italian from some angles, it featured the traditional MG front grille which was raked to give it an aerodynamic shape to match the rest of the cars design. Inside the Magnette was well equipped and came complete with a semi-octagonal speedo as normally found in MG saloons. The Magnette ZA was replaced by the improved ZB in 1956

It was the only one of the four great railways to be confined to England.

The RT was London's standard post-war double decker, replacing all other types, except for those designed to go under low bridges. At their peak, there were around 7000 of them in use in and around the capital. The first pre-war RT came into service in 1939 and the last – RT624 – came out of London Transport service in 1979. The famous RT also starred in many films, including a James Bond film car chase. Since their demise from the streets of London, many RTs are still being used around the world, either as working or preserved vehicles. Our model, advertising Jacobs Cream Crackers on one side and that famous slogan of the '60s – Drinkapintamilkaday – on the other. It is travelling on Route 165.

For many years, London Transport used chassis from both AEC and Leyland. It was seen as what we would now call 'politically correct' for London to be using Leyland as well as AEC products, especially in the important export market. Therefore, when the post-war standard bus for London was proposed, a Leyland powered version was essential. If it could be made to fit the same bodies as the AEC vehicle, even better! And so the RTL was born. To the eye, they looked identical to the RTs except for modifications that included a Leyland radiator, slightly different front chassis and foot of the cab front. Our No. 25 bus carries a Vernons Football Pools advertising panel on one side and Daily Express on the other.

Land Rover Fire Engines were built on 80-inch, 86-inch and 88-inch chassis. These small and easily manoeuvrable fire tenders, were capable of operating in restricted spaces that larger appliances could not reach. Many were sold to works fire services or small airfields where they filled the role of first-response vehicles - this was the Rover works 88 inch. Although Land Rover sub-contracted the construction of later Fire Engines to specialist manufacturers through their Special Projects Department, the Series I models were actually built at the Rover factory. The vehicles were all petrol engined. This is updated tooling, with a new rear section. Our success is in the detail! TAFF

The Royal Ulster Constabulary was the name of the police force in Northern Ireland from 1922 to 2001. At its peak the force had around 8,500 officers with a further 4,500 who were members of the RUC Reserve. The RUC had long used armoured vehicles to provide protection to its officers. The first to be based on the Land Rover appeared in 1957, on a Series 1 109" wheelbase pick-up body (registration WZ 599, fleet number 233). This incorporated only a basic level of protection, designed to repel bricks and bottles in a public order situation. Our model is based on this first version and carries the authentic registration.

The Morris Eight was a small car inspired by the sales popularity of the Ford Model Y. The success of the car enabled Morris to regain its position as Britain's largest motor manufacturer. The Series I ran from 1935-1937, the Series II was slightly restyled and in late 1938 the Series E appeared on which our model is based. This continued in production during the war for the military, essential civilian use and export. Post war general production restarted in 1945 but there were no more tourers made in the UK. In Australia, however, a flourishing body building industry continued to provide tourer versions on imported chassis/mechanicals. The engine went on to be used, with very minor changes, in the Series MM from 1948-1953, they were also adapted as auxiliary power units in Centurion, Conqueror and Chieftain tanks. Morris also used this engine as the basis of special Marine and Stationary power plants. There was a van version of the Series E rated at 5 cwt capacity called the Z Series. It was first produced in 1940 and outlived the saloon, ceasing production in about 1953 when the engine was phased out. Over 120,000 of the Series E version were produced.

# 2010 UPDATE

Once again it is time for me to update everyone with our development plans. Our schedules are now looking ever further forward and our tooling plans for 2011 are already taking shape. We are trying to excite the market and plug the gaps, of which there are many. We have some delays, predominantly because of our need to fulfil the increasing demand, also because of the sheer scale of what we are trying to achieve. I concentrate here more on the tooling, of course we have updated liveries across the range.

## N Scale – 1:148

The new Cresta Friary and DS420 will be the first to appear next month, followed by the Jaguar MkVIII and the SS Jaguar, we also add to this range the caravan based on our 1:76 model. The AEC RF and Trolleybus are running a few months late, but we are also tooling a Tram which will appear in Q3. The Scarab is ready and we have a Dennis F12 fully developed. Further cars are also ready, but we need to phase them into the plan.

## 1:43 Scale

The new Cresta Friary Estate and Low Loader Taxi will appear in the next month. The Sunbeam Talbot will appear in Q3, we have also been working on the Armstrong Siddeley Hurricane and Lancaster. The 400E is running late, the Series 1 Land Rover Fire variants are just starting to appear.

## 1:76 Scale

The Alvis SpEed 20, SS Jaguar, MGZB and Riley Kestrel will all release in the next eight weeks, the Wolseley in August/September. We have been under intense pressure to release some more modern items. Our recent Capris and XR3i's were well received, so we are adding a Golf GTI, new and the old Minis. This doesn't mean that we are moving away from earlier models, just that we are trying to cover other territories. The modern truck range will see the addition of D-Tec trailer, which can be used for containers. Hopefully it will be compatible with those already available from Hornby, Bachmann etc. The modified Goddess will appear in the next two months at the same time as the AEC Merryweather and Shelvoke and Drewry dustcart. The Austin 18 ambulance will appear in Q3, we have also developed a Bedford J1 ambulance. We have hinted at the Land Rover Transporter, this is already tooled, with a trailer. The Scania Pump, also has an aerial variant and a MAN pump variant. A modern transit will be appearing, along with the Land Rover Defender.

## 1:72 Scale

The Battle of Britain set is not far away, the Kawasaki Ki-61 Hien, and Maachi C220 are also added.

That concludes the update for now. Without becoming a bore, I once again thank the team for their tremendous support, and all of those who are supporting our product launches. We are only as good as our last game, so the final message is for us all to work harder and create more detailed and exciting models.
