Gather Supplies

Suggested Fabrics

Exterior: I like to use vintage woolen blankets, but you can use any warm fabric such as wool, wool blends, corduroy, denim, pre-quilted cottons, or velvet. Fleece and soft-shell are also suitable fabrics. You could also use quilting cottons or linen for a spring weight vest or quilt an extra layer in between the exterior and lining fabric for extra warmth. Oilskin and lightweight suede make for a stunning vest.

Lining: Traditionally you would use a slippery fabric for lining; however, cotton, linen and flannel work well too. If using a lightweight exterior fabric, you could use pre-quilted polyester lining to provide extra warmth.

Other Supplies & Notions

- Spool of coordinating thread
- Button(s) or toggle(s)

- Cord elastic for fastening loops (optional approximately 7"/18 cm per button)
- If using a heavyweight fabric, you might benefit from using a walking foot.

100% Pure wool blanket. Blankets make wonderfully warm vests. Use the stitched selvedge edge for a feature on the tops of pockets.

Denim jeans and corduroy pants for exterior or for accents and details.



Leather scraps from old coats and jackets make excellent accents and details such as back yoke.

Selection of vintage leather buttons, and wooden toggles.

Linen and cotton shirts work well for vest linings.
