

Norton shares her work

T'S difficult to write a story about artist Helen Norton without using superlatives. So we'll start with a quote from one of her elaborate and colourful brochures.

"Mention Helen Norton's work and many collectors of Australian art will have their own story to tell about her paintings. Her work is reminiscent of Sydney Nolan — the ochre reds, the cobalt blues — and a cast of characters who resemble Ned Kelly types through duckshooters posing as God; angels and butterfly men, Mona Lisa languishing in the outback and the moose style neighbours in front of a white picket fence.

"Her images of dogs, usually white, are one of her trademarks, they add a magical quality to her paintings with a mixture of whimsy and hope."

Helen Norton's works are outstanding. So is her attitude. And her philosophy.

But perhaps the best part of this story is that Helen Norton is exhibiting her work at the Cockatoo Gallery in Eumundi.

Early this year Cockatoo Gallery opened in Memorial Drive, Eumundi. Cockatoo Gallery specialises in Nortons works.

Originally from Melbourne, Helen spent 10 years working in the Australian outback in varied occupations ranging from jillarooing to truck driving. She then settled in Broome in the North West and built up her career as a sought after national and international artist for 15 years before moving to

Vanuatu two years ago.


She is just 40 and did not start her painting career until 1986.


Her work has featured in more than 50 exhibitions in Australia, London and New York. With the bulk of the demand for her work in Europe, Perth, Sydney and Melbourne, why has she chosen to exhibit in Eumundi? "I wanted to share my work with Queenslanders, because there was a noticeable absence of Queenslanders coming to Broome therefore my imagery was not reaching them."

Norton has been very successful commercially, with some of her large paintings selling for up to \$20,000.

> "I want them to come and have a journey with me.


> "I prefer that the viewing of a major exhibition is more like a complete experience rather than a visit to an art gallery or an exhibition of paintings for paintings sake.
