WHY DOES GENERATIONS OF GRACE EXIST?



Generations of Grace exists because we must commit again to spread God's grace from one generation to the next (Deut 6:4–7). We have to admit that we can be very much like the disciples, who rebuked the people when they brought their children to Jesus (Matt 19:13). Like them, we can be sincere and well-meaning as we seek to minister to the church, the community, and the world. But like them, we easily forget the children in the process. We even act as if the children in our churches are an inconvenience. Is this not true? How often do we scramble to find enough nursery workers? How often are the most effective and godly teachers transferred into adult ministry?

Yet experience readily confirms that the best time to teach a person is during childhood (Prov 22:6). While neglecting children sets a tragic direction for their lives, investing in children pays dividends many times over as God's grace captures their hearts and spreads through them to many others. You could even measure the vitality of a church by the godliness of its young people.

The wonders of the LORD are designed to be passed from one generation to the next (Ps 78:4). So if the younger generation is to stand in awe of God, the older generation must stand in awe of God first. To have godly children, we need godly parents and teachers. Therefore, *Generations of Grace* is uniquely designed with three objectives: to evangelize children, to encourage parents, and to edify servants.

In order to declare God's mighty acts from one generation to the next (Ps 145:4), *Generations of Grace* is:

- Biblically Driven covering the whole story-line of the Bible
- God Centered magnifying God's character and works recorded throughout Scripture
- Christ Exalting glorifying Christ as the pinnacle of God's redemptive plan
- Gospel Saturated showing how every passage fits into God's plan of salvation
- Family Focused uniting the whole family around the same passage of Scripture each week



GENERATIONS OF GRACE EXISTS TO GLORIFY GOD BY:

1. EVANGELIZING CHILDREN

The Bible is not just a collection of stories teaching moral lessons, nor is a child's greatest need behavior modification. A child's greatest need is to be born again, because from birth they are dead in their sins (Ps 51:5; Eph 2:1). So the greatest gift we can give the next generation is the gospel. Only the gospel is able to rescue their soul from sin and death and secure for them an inheritance in heaven forever.

But what is the gospel? While the core of the gospel is forgiveness of sin through the death of Christ (Matt 1:21; John 1:29), this is only the center of a much bigger story. After all, why do we need forgiveness? What is God's plan for those who are forgiven? *Generations of Grace* leads children through the whole story of God's great rescue mission. It does so in the hope that children would come to a comprehensive understanding of the gospel message and that by the grace of God they would look to Christ in saving faith. All the books in the curriculum are designed to reach children with this goal in mind.

2. ENCOURAGING PARENTS

The most important job of parents is to raise their children in the discipline and instruction of the Lord (Eph 6:4; Col 3:21). Parents are to be the primary evangelists and spiritual trainers of their children. Parents must work very hard at this, teaching their children every day by their regular example and specific instruction (Deut 6:7). So an effective children's ministry will do all it can to encourage parents in their mission, and one way to do this is by providing helpful tools to parents. This is what *Generations of Grace* strives to do.

Generations of Grace provides the Family Devotional, a valuable tool designed with both parents and children in mind. The Family Devotional aims to aid the parents in their own knowledge, love, and holiness. Then as the parents grow in godliness, the Family Devotional also helps parents teach their children throughout the week the same stories and principles that are taught each Sunday.



3. EDIFYING SERVANTS

The church is commanded to edify and equip its people to serve (Eph 4:11–16). This happens as the elders of the church preach and teach, but it also happens when the elders provide resources to help the members grow in Christlikeness. *Generations of Grace* is designed to be just such a resource.

Unlike many Sunday school curricula, The *Teacher Book* does not script out lessons that a teacher can read without much thought. Instead, the lesson commentary in particular is designed to go beyond what the teacher will actually be able to teach in one lesson. It is designed to edify the teacher, filling his mind with truth and his heart with passion. The Family Devotional is also a great tool for the teacher, allowing him to approach the lesson in a devotional way throughout the week before he teaches it on Sunday. Then the teacher will have a deep well to draw from as he crafts a lesson specifically for his own Sunday school class.

While emphasizing the teacher's own edification, The *Teacher Book* also gives practical help by clearly and simply laying out main points, objectives, outlines, questions, introductions, illustrations, and applications. Also, additional questions in the *Family Devotional* can add to a lesson or provide discussion questions for small groups following the main teaching time.



HOW DOES GENERATIONS OF GRACE WORK?



1. TEACHING THE STORY OF THE BIBLE

Generations of Grace focuses on the narrative portions of the Bible for two reasons. First, it focuses on the stories in order to show God's glory from one generation to another. We see God's glory as we grow to understand His master plan of redemption, and each story in the Bible is a part of this great story.

Another reason *Generations of Grace* focuses on the narratives of Scripture is because children learn best through stories. On the one hand, children are usually weak in their ability to think abstractly or reason logically (as is required in the New Testament epistles, for example). On the other hand, children are strong in their ability to notice and remember tangible aspects of the world around them. By communicating in a tangible, real-life way, the stories of the Bible have a profound influence on the way a child perceives reality. In this way, the Bible becomes a part of their own life-story.

2. A UNIFIED CURRICULUM

Generations of Grace is set up as a unified curriculum, meaning that all the children in a family will be learning from the same passage of Scripture each week. This streamlines the parents' task, allowing them to interact with all of their children on the same truths.



3. REPEATING A THREE YEAR CYCLE

Generations of Grace is a three-year cycle aimed at children from three to twelve years old. So a child being taught through *Generations of Grace* will go through the curriculum three times. This repetition solidifies truth in their memories, but even more than that, it allows the teacher to start simple and then go deeper and deeper. For this reason, the objectives, outlines, questions, illustrations, and activities are designed according to three levels with the following suggestions:

- AGES 3-5: A 5-10 minute lesson telling the story and teaching one simple truth.
- AGES 6-8: A 15–20 minute lesson telling the story and developing the main truth more.
- AGES 9–11: A 25–30 minute lesson leading the children through the text and adding increasing depth to the main point.

However, since all these levels are included in each lesson, a teacher can creatively pick and choose ideas from each level to most effectively reach his own particular Sunday school class.



GENERATIONS OF GRACE IS MADE UP OF FIVE BOOKS:

TEACHER BOOK

Each Year of *Generations of Grace* is divided into three *Teacher Books*. The *Teacher Books* equip teachers to teach each passage of scripture clearly and effectively. It presents the passage to the teacher's own mind and heart, and it provides teaching tools to enable the teacher to impress the same powerful message upon the children's minds. It is enriching but also simple and quickly accessible to the layperson.

CRAFT BOOK

Each Year of *Generations of Grace* is divided into two *Craft Books*. Good crafts reinforce lessons and cause them to be remembered. The *Craft Book* contains pages that are needed to do the crafts explained in the teacher book. The pages can be torn out, photocopied, or printed directly from the digital version.

COLORING BOOK

Each Year of *Generations of Grace* has one *Coloring Book*. The *Coloring Book* includes two pictures for each lesson. The pictures accurately depict the Bible stories but are also creative and fun. Each picture has a key truth from the lesson on it, making it a practical teaching tool as it hangs on the fridge during the week!

ACTIVITY BOOK


Each Year of *Generations of Grace* has one *Activity Book*. The *Activity Book* provides age-appropriate activities corresponding to the lesson. Preschoolers will enjoy dot-to-dot, tracing, mazes, comparisons, etc. Older children will enjoy crossword puzzles, word searches, decoding, find the difference, word scrambles, review sheets, etc. Each activity includes key truths from the lesson.

FAMILY DEVOTIONAL

Each Year of *Generations of Grace* has one *Family Devotional*. The *Family Devotional* unites the classroom and the home. It equips parents to teach their children during the week. It enables teachers to meditate all week on the truth they will be teaching on Sunday, and it also provides extra questions that are helpful for small group discussions after the teaching time. Five daily devotionals go with each lesson in the teacher book.

Study the Lesson

This section of the *Teacher Book* is designed to edify and equip teachers and to guide them through the preparation of an age appropriate Bible lesson.



Teach the Lesson

This section of the *Teacher Book* is designed to provide the teacher with resources to engage children from the moment they walk into the classroom until pick-up time.



Apply the Lesson

The *Craft Book* provides the resources that are designed to engage children after you have taught the lesson. The craft is meant to not only reinforce what is taught in Sunday school but is to be a visual reminder of the lesson in the home.



Illustrate the Lesson

The *Coloring Book* provides two coloring pictures which creatively and accurately portray the Bible. Each picture communicates the truth of each lesson.



Review the Lesson

The Activity Book provides age-appropriate activities corresponding to the lesson. Each activity includes key truths from the lesson.



Share the Lesson

The *Family Devotional* guides the family through the Generations of Grace lesson, a cross-reference passage, and a passage about Christ to lead the family through the whole counsel of God.

TEACHER BOOK

Central Truth

God is the main character of the Bible and every story teaches us who He is or how man relates to Him.

Each lesson of *Generations of Grace* has a *Central Truth* which forms the core of the entire lesson.



Make sure to stick with **one big idea** and repeat it often as you teach, especially with younger children. It is helpful to have the class repeat it after you.

Supporting Truths

The *Supporting Truths* further develop elements of the central truth.

Objectives /

The five *Objectives* correspond to the five *Supporting Truths*. These objective are specific ways to see if your children have learned.

TEACHING HINTS

The Supporting Truths go from easy/primary to harder/secondary. For preschool, it is often best to pick just one. These truths allow the same lesson to be taught multiple times to the same children. Just pick a different supporting truth to emphasize.

The Objectives are for the children. By the time you finish teaching, ask yourself, "Can the children do your chosen objective(s)?"

STUDY THE BIBLE LESSON

God creates the heavens and the earth • Genesis 1:1-2:3

Lesson Summary

In the beginning God created everything. From the tiniest ant to the largest elephant, God spoke everything into existence. But nobody created God. He was alive before anything was created because He has always existed. When God finished creating He said that His creation was very good. God created everything exactly as He wanted and ruled over His perfect creation.

Spotlight on the Gospel

God created a perfect world and ruled over it as King. Yet even in this perfect world man did not obey God. Man sinned against God by disobeying His command (Gen 2:17). Man has been in rebellion against the rule of God ever since. Only the salvation provided through Jesus Christ, the only one to perfectly obey God's commands, can restore man to God.



Lesson Summary

The *Lesson Summary* provides a brief overview of the entire story.

Spotlight on the Gospel

The Bible is God's story of redemption. The story of salvation is the story about God restoring man to the purpose God gave him. Although God's story culminates in Christ, not every story is directly about Christ. So the *Spotlight on the Gospel* shows how each story fits into the story of salvation, either by connecting the chronology or by identifying key gospel doctrines like, holiness, sin, grace, or faith.

TEACHING HINTS

The Spotlight on the Gospel is very helpful to avoid teaching the stories as merely moral lessons. While stories do teach us what to do and what not to do, there is always a larger context of redemption.



Redemptive Timeline

The story of God's salvation of man has five major parts or developments:

- 1. Creation
- 2. Fall
- 3. Promise
- 4. Redemption
- 5. Restoration

This timeline helps the teacher to remember the context of each week's lesson in God's story of redemption.

TEACHING HINTS

Review is key to understanding. Use the questions from last week to review before beginning the current lesson



TEACHER BOOK

Lesson Commentary

The Lesson Commentary on the passage serves to stretch and strengthen the knowledge of Sunday school teachers.

The deeper and clearer the teacher's knowledge is, the more confidently and clearly he can teach children.

As teachers grow in grace, the outpouring of their own godliness will flow into the lives of the children.

TEACHING HINTS The Lesson

Commentary is not meant to be read as the lesson.

THINK ABOUT IT

These boxes highlight key doctrines, applications or clarifications.

TEACHING HINTS

Do not try to teach everything in the commentary. Choose what will most help your children get the main point.

LESSON 1

Lesson Commentary

God created a perfect world and ruled over it.

Everything that exists, in both the spiritual and physical worlds, owes its existence to God (Gen 1:1). Nothing has been created apart from Him. Therefore, all things can be properly understood through the knowledge of, and a relationship with, the One who created all things.

God existed before creation (1:1-2)

In the beginning, before the creation of the heavens and the earth, there was God. This is because God always exists. Nobody created God. He is eternal, without a beginning or an end. He existed before creation and everything in creation owes its existence to Him (Col 1:16).

Genesis 1:2 indicates that the earth was empty before God created everything. This was the situation on earth before it was touched by the creative hand of God. Everything that we can see, hear, smell, taste, and touch has been created by God. Even things we can't identify with our senses—things we can't see or touch like angels—all these have been created by God too!

THINK ABOUT IT We can make things with our hands, but only God can create with His words.

God created everything (1:3–30)

The Heavens and Earth and all things in them were created or made through the power of God's spoken. word. Creation was not the result of physical processes

or universal laws. Rather the existence of all things came as the result of God's divine command.

DAY ONE (1:3-5)

8

God called for light and separated the light from the darkness. God called the light day, and the darkness He called night. By giving names to the light and the darkness, God was declaring His right to rule over them. God is **sovereign** or <u>in control of everything</u>. everywhere, all the time. He is king. To name something or someone in ancient times implied dominion or ownership (2 Kgs 23:34; 24:17). Day and night belong to the Lord (Ps 74:16).

DAY TWO (1:6-8)

God created the sky. God made the sky, or visible atmosphere, with the power of His words. God spoke and the sky appeared!

THINK ABOUT IT Naming something shows personal ownership.

Consider the great expanse of the sky. Now consider the God who spoke it into existence. What a powerful God!

DAY THREE (1:9-13)

The water below the sky (Gen 1:9) was gathered together, and God created dry land, seas, and plants. The plants were to reproduce within categories ("kinds") that were carefully distinguished from one another. The creativity of God is also seen in the variety of His creation. Even today we are still discovering and identifying new kinds of plants and animals.

DAY FOUR (1:14-19)

God created the sun and the moon. Why are the sun and the moon called the "two great lights" in Genesis 1:16? Perhaps the words sun and moon are deliberately avoided here since in ancient times pagan nations deified them and worshiped them under those names. Moses, the author of Genesis, may have wanted his readers to understand that the lights are light-bearers to be appreciated, not gods to be worshiped. It is the one true God who made both the sun and the moon.

Verse 16 also mentions the fact that God created the stars. In reading the verse, the mention of the stars seems almost an afterthought, probably because of the emphasis on the specific functions of the sun and moon. Can you number the stars? God can. He has even given names to all of them (Ps 147:4).

STUDY THE BIBLE LESSON

God creates the heavens and the earth . Genesis 1:1-2:3

DAY FIVE (1:20-23)

God created sea creatures and flying things (birds and flying insects). God showed gracious, loving concern to the animals by blessing them and telling them to fill the waters and the sky (Gen 1:22).

DAY SIX (1:24-30)

image bearers.

God created land animals and man. Verses 24 and 25 describe God's creation of animals that filled the land. Large and small animals, cattle, and creeping things (worms, creeping insects, and reptiles) were brought forth from the earth. From the enormous elephant to the crawling caterpillar we see God's power and wisdom on display in creation.

THINK ABOUT IT Just as the moon reflects the light of the sun, we were made to reflect God's glory as His

Included in the sixth day of creation is God's special creation—man and woman. Verse 26 reveals that man was created in the "image of God". Being created in the *image* of God means that God <u>made man to be</u>

like Him. Think of a picture

or copy of something. Though man is not exactly like God, he is unlike the rest of creation as God created man with the ability to know Him and to have a relationship with Him.

God exalted man above the rest of creation and has "crowned man with glory and honor" and "made him to have dominion" or rule over the rest of His creation (Gen 1:26; Ps 8:5–8). Man was created by God (Gen 2:7) and is not a product of natural evolution.

Genesis 1:28 depicts God as man's provider. It is in this role that we first see His love. God provided for man's physical needs. He brought food (1:29; 2:9) and shelter (2:15) to man. (Note: 1:29–30 indicates that both people and animals were vegetarian before the flood. See also 9:3.) God is also the provider of work (2:15, 19–20), giving man the job of cultivating the garden and naming and classifying the animals.

God also provided man with standards of right and wrong, telling man which trees in the garden he could eat from (2:16–17). God even provided relationships for man. Man was not left alone (2:21–23). The joys of

God gave us life so that we would glorify Him with our lives.

THINK ABOUT IT

friendship, the blessings of teamwork, marriage, and the family are all products of God's love. Finally, God provided mankind with purpose and hope. Ultimately, man's purpose is to glorify God by acting, thinking, and speaking in a way that praises God, pleases God, and accurately portrays God (2 Cor 5:9).

Everything God created was very good (1:31-2:3)

DAY SEVEN (1:31-2:3)

God saw everything He created and said that it was "very good". God made everything exactly the way He wanted it. There were no mistakes and nothing was missing. His creation was perfect. The entire universe is a testimony to the power of God. He is **omnipotent** or <u>all</u> powerful. God is able to do anything Herlesires because His power is unlimited.

Then on the seventh day, God rested God did not need to rest (He never gets tired), but stopped creating on the seventh day to set a pattern of work and rest for man to follow. The world God mane was perfect. There was nothing missing or broken. Everything was just as God wanted it to be and everything obeyed God's rule.

Lesson Outline

The main lesson outline has been embedded into the *Lesson Commentary* so that from the beginning of their own study, teachers can already begin to think about how to structure their own individual lesson.

TEACHING HINTS

Have the children repeat back to you key words and definitions. Young children love to say interesting sounding words.



Key Words

Key Words are defined to help teachers explain deep theological truths in simple, child friendly phrases.

TEACHER BOOK

Lesson Outline

Children need structure when they learn. We provide lesson outlines which teachers can use while teaching. Often the Ages 3–5 Lesson Outline develops the doctrine while the Ages 6–11 Lesson Outline develops the narrative.

TEACHING HINTS

Use the outlines as they are, or modify them to make them most useful in communicating the lesson's truth.



Lesson Activities

From the time a student enters the class until the time he leaves, it is the teacher's duty to impart the truths of God's Word to him. Teaching does not occur during the Bible lesson only; it occurs throughout the entire class period.

First, there are activities to *Introduce* the lesson. Hook your students' interest and point them to the coming Bible lesson.

Second, there are activities to *Illustrate* the lesson, clarify the truth, and reawaken the children's attention.

TEACHING HINTS

Physical props are especially effective. Every prop or vivid illustration expands your children's attention span.

Third, there are activities to *Apply* the lesson. Help the children interact with the truth of the lesson.

Lesson Questions

We often lament about our students' apparent lack of thinking. But what are we doing in our Sunday school classrooms to help them develop that ability? Do not lecture children but ask them



questions. Make them do the discovering, thinking, and speaking. Asking questions throughout your lesson helps to ensure that students participate in and understand each lesson.

TEACHING HINTS

Plan at least 1 question per minute of teaching. These questions will get you started, but think of more.

If you have a shy, quiet class, awarding points or small treats even for wrong answers can get them to answer questions until they grow more confident.

Use basic factual questions, (who, what, when where), mid-level process questions (how), and harder purpose/cause questions (why, what was the reason/purpose). If kids can't answer, simplify or even suggest the correct answer. For example, if they cannot answer, "Where did God come from?" Ask, "Was God created or did He always exist?"

To encourage clear thinking and articulate speaking, teach the children to answer in complete sentences.





Early elementary students will enjoy find the difference, word searches, word scrambles, and other engaging activities.

TEACHING HINTS

Activities make Generations of Grace useful as a homeschool curriculum! Or encourage families to use them as they go through the Family Devotional.



The *fourth* activity covers a broader range, 6–11 years old. It starts easy then gets harder at the end.

The final activity for each lesson is a worksheet designed to increase students' understanding and to help them remember the lesson.

EXPLAIN @

The truth of Gen 1:3-30

The Heavens and Earth and all things in them were created or made through the power of God's spoken Word in six literal days. Man was created in the "Image of God". Being created in the Image of God means that God made man to be like Him. Though man is not exactly like God, he is unlike the rest of creation as God created man with the ability to know Him and to have a relationship with Heim. God exalted man above the rest of creation to rule over the rest of His creation (1:26).
