








(1) (ut up some paper straws – squeeze the pipe cleaner through them.


Draw shapes on a paper and make them using the pipe cleaner.

Of course, the ever favorite finger puppets or shapes.






1) Put pompom balls in a tray and use cupcake liners to sort them in different colours.

Make shapes out of the sticks, using Velcro to hold them together.






Make different shapes by placing popsicle sticks.






1) Stick some toothpicks into play-doh and drop the buttons into each.

Make different patterns on a paper, and let your LO put buttons on the outline.








A friendship

1 Look at the skies and identify different types of clouds! Practice the names with cotton.

Dab and create fun scenes with cotton and paint!





3 Classic cotton fun draw outlines of
sheep, penguin,
bunnies and stick
cotton balls on
them.

4 Counting with cotton! Roll up some cotton and practice numbers and counting.














1 Hone counting skills with colourful bottle caps.
















Practice basic addition and subtraction.














Fun with Slime

3 Fun shapes like croissant and heart from red slime.

















Make small shapes and build a story around them.














Making 2D and 3D shapes using toothpick and clay.

Make a little bunny using paper cups.

A teddy finger puppet with paper to shoo away the boredom.
















Use pasta to hone counting skills and practice simple addition/subtraction.

Paint pasta in different colours and pass it through a straw.











3 Trace letters and numbers using pasta.

A classic DIY pasta necklace is always fun to make, or you can also make a bracelet.













1 Mud play - If you have plants at home, or mud in the garden, let your child enjoy some sensory fun by messing around with mud!

Using rubberband and a tin can – wrap the rubberbands around the can – very good for hand-eye coordination and motor skills.





Cut out flower shapes, colour them and put clothespin on the petals. Colour match the clothespin and the petals.

4 A little atta and maida– free play!





Build a fort at home with pillows, blankets, cushions, mats and any other items lying around.



6 Sorting colours with candy and bowls – M&Ms, gems or any simple candy will do.

Mixing POP with water to make a paste – and setting them into different moulds which can be painted and decorated upon hardening.



8 Learn shapes using cookie cutters.





Tape tracks—on the floors, walls, and beyond.

4 And fun fruit shapes like pineapple, grapes, etc.















1 Link different coloured paper clips together to make letters or numbers.

Colour matching with paper clips and play-doh.










3 Link different coloured paper clips together to make shapes. Alternate the colours and make it a sequencing activity.

4 Counting with paper clips.










S Fun with Paper Cutting

Draw outlines of simple objects like teddy, flower, etc and let your LO cut them out.


4 Make easter eggs in different patterns, cut them out and decorate.







Fun with Jigsaw






Sequencing of shapes is another good idea for a jigsaw puzzle.

Fun with Straws



1 Drop daals into a straw that is balanced on play-doh or atta - great for motor skills.

2 Cut straws into an inch size pieces and pass it through a woolen thread to make a necklace, bracelet, or simply practise motor skills.





Use a straw to blow liquid paint around on paper, creating interesting designs.


4 Take five bending straws and tape them together, dip in paint and stamp flowers on a paper!

Make lego towers using matching pieces.














Use lego to trace letters and numbers.

A pouty-snouty fish.






