

Thanksgiving Menus of the Ninth Field Artillery

Although the colonists of Plymouth Colony are known to have celebrated a day of Thanksgiving in the Autumn of 1621, the soldiers of the United States Army did not officially celebrate the holiday until the Civil War. In 1864, President Abraham Lincoln announced that the last Thursday of November was to be a day of national rejoicing and thanks to God. When the soldiers of Camp Lewis celebrated their first Thanksgiving at the new cantonment in 1917, the holiday was firmly established as a day of feasting, celebration, and thanks for the many blessings bestowed on America.

The Lewis Army Museum has an outstanding collection of Thanksgiving Day Menus, dating back to 1917. However, among the most colorful menus in the collection are those produced for the Ninth Field Artillery Regiment during the 1930s. Not only do these menus capture the spirit of the holiday, but they are true works of art.

In addition to the colorful graphics, the menus also give us the bounty of food, drink and "smokes" enjoyed by the soldiers of the Ninth Field Artillery on Thanksgiving Day.

Although American soldiers continued to enjoy the Thanksgiving holiday, in times of war and peace, the menus of the 1930s have never been surpassed for their visual appeal.

The 1st Battalion of the 9th Field Artillery was activated on Fort Lewis in 1930 and served on Fort Lewis until 1942, when it deployed for service in World War II.
