## Wag the Nag

#### **BEFORE YOU READ:**

(All Alphabet and SnapWords® resources are available at child1st.com)

#### **SOUNDS:**

The word "his" has the final S that sounds like a Z. Brainstorm other words with that final Z sound. You could include "has," "was," "hers," "runs," etc. Contrast these words with other words ending in S where the sound is soft. Ideas: this, its, yes, lets.

#### **SNAPWORDS®:**

- 1. Review all the sight words learned to this point, including color and number words.
- 2. New sight words: "back," "his," and "an." Generate a word family for "back" in order to reinforce the CK spelling at the end. Possible words: duck, pack, tuck, lick. Something that would be fun for the child is to start a chart of words that end in CK. As the weeks go by and he finds words in print that have that ending, he could write them on the chart. Over time, he'd acquire quite a collection of words ending in CK.
- 4. Use the new words in sentences for the child to read and write.
- 5. Before reading the book, talk about what a nag is. The word nag is sometimes used to talk about a small saddle horse or pony, and at other times it refers to a horse that is old and worn out. The story you are about to share implies the latter. The horse in this story enjoys his retirement with a man who can play games with him and obviously treats him well.

#### READ:

Wag the Nag and dictate short sentences from the book for the child to write. The child might enjoy thinking up other ways the man might have gotten his kerchief back when Wag snitched it. This would make a great student-created book.






I have a brown nag. He is Wag. Wag likes to play.
