PHONICS:

- Long E spellings: EE, -Y, E-E, -E. (EE words: "trees", "green" and "eek." -Y words: "Emily" and "chompity." E-E word: "Zeke." -E words: "she" and "he").
- Some long A review: ape, grapes, afraid, away.
- Pinchy E review: Zeke, grapes, named, ape.
- Schwa review: afraid.
- Use of ED for past tense: asked, named, yelled, dropped. Identify the words in which ED sounds like T: asked, dropped. Also identify which words have a double consonant: yelled, dropped. Tell the child that if you have a double letter, then Pinchy E cannot reach around to pinch, so the vowel is short. The only word that has the long vowel sound is "named," and it is long because Pinchy E can reach around the M to pinch A.


