
ROOM IN YOUR HEART: TEACHING AND ACTIVITY GUIDE

ACTIVITIES FOR PRESCHOOLERS



DRAMATIZE THE STORY - Assign roles to different children in the classroom - One can be the old woman, one can be the monk and the others can be the visitors - and enact the story out in the classroom or library while doing a read-aloud.



EXPLORE THE WORLD - Use a world map and show the distance from your location to Bhutan. Explore ways in which a person can travel to Bhutan and discuss various facts and information listed about Bhutan at the end of the book.



TEACH KINDNESS AND SHARING - Talk to children about how we can all be kind and share with others. Ask them to list things that they would be ok with sharing and what may be difficult for them to share. Talk about why they wouldn't want to share, and how they can overcome their hesitations.

TEACHING GUIDE FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Use the popular teaching strategy of Text-to-Text, Text-to-Self, Text-to-World with this book to bring the story alive for the children.

Through this methodology, children will be able to connect Room In Your Heart to their own experiences, and with current events around the world that will help them expand their knowledge and better understand the book. It will also enable them to develop multiple associations and better retain the message behind Room In Your Heart.

TEXT-TO-SELF

Take a deeper dive into how the story resonated with each child, as they may have a unique connection to the story or the characters. Encourage children to share how the story relates to incidents in their own life, and reflects their ideas and experiences. Below are suggested questions:

What did they like about the story?

Was there anything they would do differently or change in the story?

Was there anything about the illustrations or characters that was familiar to them in their personal life?

Ask children to share a time they felt like the old woman and a time they felt like one of the visitors.

Discuss ways for children to enter play when a group of their friends are playing. For example, other ways in which we can say "Is there room for me?"



TEXT-TO-WORLD



Use the Text-to-World approach to tie in the main ideas behind Room In Your Heart with current affairs and events happening around the world.

Discuss the location of Bhutan on the map, its' form of government, flag and currency. Use the fun facts listed in the book to learn more about Bhutan. Compare and critique how Bhutan is similar to and different from the United States of America.

This story ties in very well to discussions on immigration and refugees and the importance of being open to sharing available resources with those who don't have as much as we do. Use this story to expand how the idea of community goes from an individual to a neighborhood to a city to a country and then to the entire world.
