COVER STORY

You may have seen Rita Anderson's name or photo in Prairie Tracks since it's fruition in 2011. Rita worked with Peggy Besch and the Huron Chamber of Commerce in 2010 to make Prairie Tracks a reality and has been one of the top contributors of monthly articles. Over the past 12 years, Rita has written 144 pages of De Smet Happenings! Now Rita is retiring and the Prairie Tracks staff is featuring her with her dedication and passion for our magazine and her many accomplishments to improve our area and state.

Residents of De Smet, SD (a small-town of 1000 people) know that if they want something done they will all have to "kick-in" and help to make it happen. It takes that one special person to do the groundwork and the legwork to get everyone working together. That "spark plug", that "whirlwind" of energy and ideas hit De Smet in January of 2010 in the form of Rita Anderson.

She is the daughter of the late BC and Ruth Aughenbaugh, being raised nearby and had relocated back to the farm home place. She had already been involved in economic development in Colorado – in fact, had received Yuma, Colorado's 'Citizen of the Year' award. With that know-how and innate enthusiasm, the projects started happening and new businesses and opportunities came to town.

Within two years Rita was the catalyst to bring the Development Corp, city, school and community together to build a \$4.8 million Event and Wellness Center operated by the city. The school's \$1 million football field and track plus \$500,000 baseball fields were all part of the plan. Rita, as Economic Development Director, established the Community Foundation which has been the 'pathway'



Sitting in front of the De Smet townhomes under construction in 2015, Rita was instrumental in the planning, funding and implementation of the project. The Development Corporation received grant funding from the SD Housing Authority for one-half of the cost of the 4-unit complex. for approximately \$5 million brought to De Smet for all types of community projects. The De Smet community recognized her efforts by honoring her with the prestigious Spirit of Dr. Bell Award for an individual who "gives willingly, energetically and consistently without seeking recognition".

In the 13 years Rita has been in De Smet she has promoted every aspect of quality of life.

Business & Commerce

For a small, rural South Dakota town it is unusual to have a large manufacturing park that Rita has helped to expand with two additional 10,000 sq.ft. buildings & recruiting numerous companies that have chosen to relocate in the Industrial Park and downtown. These have brought new employees and families to become part of the community. In addition, she has helped businesses expand utilizing the Development Corporation's Revolving Loan and Workforce Incentive programs. Rita can tell some inspiring stories about recruiting businesses, medical facilities and convincing others to merge and expand.

Housing

Rita realized the community cannot grow without additional housing, even before the present housing crisis. She wrote many successful grant applications receiving millions of dollars in funding and developed programs that have brought housing projects, including an assisted living facility, townhomes and chiropractic clinic building.

Community Improvements

Rita has proven that 'if you stick with it' and do not give up, you can finally get it done! This was demonstrated with the success of the Kingsbury County Transit system. After being turned down for partnerships with several transit groups across the state, being told the community did not have enough residents, the Rural Office of Community Services was discovered and one of the most successful transit systems in the state was put into place. Operating successfully for over three years, giving an average of 30 rides each day and raising large funds locally for new vehicles, the program is expanding to be countywide.

And the amazing Kingsbury Journal story of the Development Corporation saving the local newspaper through volunteers and going countywide has proven that smaller rural communities can accomplish almost anything by bringing the community to work together to make it happen!

Tourism

Tourism brings over 50,000 people to De Smet each year to visit Laura Ingalls Wilder sites. She has grown this economic impact by developing a community website and writing/editing a 64-page annual De Smet Community Guide. All this while fielding calls 24/7 with her personal phone which she listed for any tourism questions, e-mail requests or housing needs.

National & Statewide Promotion/Coordination

Rita is well known as she represents De Smet nationally and makes certain the area is well represented and promoted at the State level, creating an outstanding network of contacts throughout the State. She has given presentations to the South Dakota Legislature and many mid-western economic development conferences. She has served as President of the South Dakota Chamber & Economic Development Council, and instrumental in forming a greatly needed South Dakota Economic Development Professionals Association. She has played a large role in bringing international recognition to the area through the Hwy 14 Tower and Trails architectural design competition and involving countless volunteers with over twenty state and national organizations.

The above list could go much longer. And yes, this

is just one person we are talking about without any office staff. Yet if there is an event, she has been the one doing the leg work, bringing food and cleaning up. Even though she is busy, she is quick to share her expertise. She received an award as the 2019 Mentor of the Year by Dakota Resources for actively helping other young Economic Development entrepreneurs. She does it all – she was responsible for writing the successful \$325,000 grant application to the prestigious Bush Foundation and De Smet receiving the Innovative Community of the Year Prize. It is a lucky thing that Rita is good at her famous "allnighters" to meet deadlines.

In addition to all of the above, she is a much-loved mother and "push-over" Grandma who is often traveling to see her two children and four grandkids in Colorado.

Rita is a joy to visit with and is known for bringing fun and laughter wherever she goes with many unique experiences to talk about. Be sure to ask her about when she was kissed by Elvis and he gave her his scarf! She and her sisters are in the National Baton Twirling Hall of Fame and she was named one of the Top 10 Baton Twirlers in the Nation, honored at the Indianapolis 500 Speedway Race where she performed in front of the large crowd twirling her baton as she marched down the tricky, sloping track! She and her sister were on national TV when they twirled on the Ted Mack Variety show.

Future Plans

Our entire area is fortunate that even though Rita has retired, she continues her tireless efforts promoting and working towards improvements for community needs and quality of life. Keeping her calendar straight has to be an amazing task as she is still very involved with many local projects and being an active board member on several statewide organizations continuing her passion for housing, trails, nonprofits, economic development, funding and the arts. She laughingly tells others, "I am still busy volunteering for my favorite projects and organizations but I have found retirement means 'no pay check'!" And we must mention – she continues to be very involved in baton twirling, and recently returned from Liverpool, England where she and her sister attended the World Baton Twirling Championships.

We salute you – Rita Anderson! We will miss your Prairie Tracks involvement but know we will be seeing you as you continue being a South Dakota promoter!

Teachers, it's time to shine a spotlight on your students' talents! Enter their exceptional work in the Education Department at the SD State Fair. The 2024 Education Department handbook is now available online for educators to see how they can get their students involved in the 2024 SD State Fair by entering a project from school! Any and all classroom subjects are able to be entered. Public, private, and homeschools can enter in the Education Department. Kids love going to the fair and seeing their project on display! Teachers, we would love for you to enter, especially if you haven't in the past. Show the world the amazing things happening in your classroom!



The Education Department handbook can be found at sdstatefair. com. The deadline to submit entries is April 12. Education entries transitioned to online only this year which will be a positive change for the teacher and the fair office! A fantastic, easy to follow instructional video was made to help teachers through the online entry process that can also be found on the education webpage.

Now, onto a different kind of class and subject! The annual Original SD BBQ Championships, held in conjunction with Wheel Jam on the SD State Fairgrounds, is a Kansas City Barbeque Society (KCBS)

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sanctioned event. To judge a KCBS sanctioned event, judges must be a certified KCBS judge. To increase the

pool of certified judges and offer continued training to those already certified, a KCBS judging school will be held at the Nordby Exhibit Hall on the SD State Fairgrounds in Huron on Saturday, April 13 from 10 AM - 2 PM

Following the judging school, a table captain class will also be held. Taking the class will result in becoming a certified KCBS table captain.

The classes teach you the art and mechanics of judging and at the end of the class, you'll be a certified judge. Those active or interested in becoming active in competitive BBQ may also consider taking the class as it teaches what the judges look for when judging.

Registration for the judging school is \$115. Registration for the certified table captain class is \$60 and participants must be a certified judge. To register, go to www.sdbbgchampionships.com or call the State Fair Office at 605.353.7340 for more information. The deadline to register for the classes is April 3. To take either class, you must be a registered KCBS member. To become a member, go to kcbs.us and click join now.



Myopia Control

Myopia (nearsightedness) is a condition where distance vision is blurred more than near vision. While myopia usually starts during the early teenage years, in some patients it can start much earlier, increasing the risk of developing high myopia.

High myopia tends to have a genetic component, with children having myopic parents, but there are also environmental influences. Children who spend more time outdoors and less time using electronic devices are LESS LIKELY to become myopic or continue to progress.

While there is no cure for myopia, optometrist have a group of methods called Myopia control, that are used to slow the progression of childhood myopia.

High Myopia risk factors:

- · Onset of myopia prior to age nine
- Lower than expected hyperopia (farsightedness) at a young age
- Rapid progression in glasses prescription in a short amount of time
- Parents with High Myopia
- Asian ethnicity
- Near work (greater than two hours/day)
- Time spent outdoors (less than two hours/day)

Myopia control techniques can be used to prevent myopia in children without a prescription, or slow changes in already myopic children. Unfortunately, these techniques cannot reverse myopia and these children will still require glasses and/or contact lenses for clear vision.



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Myopia Management techniques:

There are a number of different options in myopia control to try and slow prescription progression, each with a different reduction in progression:

- Progressive glasses: 12-55%
- Multifocal contact lenses: 29-49%
- Orthokeratology: 63%
- Low dose atropine drops: 64%

Progressive glasses and multifocal contact lenses are traditionally used to improve near vision in adults over the age of 40, but are a great therapeutic option to relax children's strong focusing muscles.

Orthokeratology are contact lenses worn at night to reshape the cornea. This corrects your prescription so glasses and contacts aren't needed during the day.

Atropine is a special-mixed eye drop that relaxes the focusing muscles and slows eye growth.

Why control myopia:

In addition to having poor vision requiring stronger glasses, as your prescription increases it also stretches the internal structures of your eye. This can lead to an increased risk of retinal detachments (4-16 times), cataracts (2-5 times), and glaucoma (4 times).

The best way to take advantage of myopia control is to detect nearsightedness early. Even if your child is not complaining of vision problems, it's important to schedule routine eye exams for your children, starting at six months of age. School screenings, while a great tool does not replace a comprehensive eye exam.



Want Happy Customers? Meet Their Expectations

More than ever, customer loyalty is not a given. If you want to get and keep customers, you must meet their expectations. Expectations, by the way, are not static and are changing faster than ever. Each purchase comes with an expectation. When we walk into a restaurant, we expect to be seated and have our order taken within



a certain period of time; we expect our order to be

correct and properly prepared when delivered. If our expectations are met, we are happy; if they are not met, we are dissatisfied. If our expectations are exceeded, we may be inclined to share it with someone else (although not as readily as we share the times our expectations were not met!)

Successful businesses understand a customer's expectations are based on a lifetime of experiences, not just the specific interaction with their business. As they gain more experiences, the expectations can change. If businesses are smart, they try to understand those expectations and in some case they need to help set the expectations by communicating with the customer so they know what to expect. Here are some simple steps to proactively manage your customers' expectations and create a better experience and stronger relationship with them.

1. Understand the customer's base expectations. If expectations are unrealistic, create a plan to educate the customer to give them the knowledge and experience to reset their expectation.

2. Influence expectations. Communicate with your customer so they know what to expect. This could be as simple as posting your business hours or what forms of payment you accept to educating them on your product and service.

3. Focus on performance. Use complaints and solicit customer feedback to understand their expectations of your product/service and make relevant improvements.

4. Create a company experience. Beyond 'customer service', great companies train staff to solve problems on the front lines. They collect information to improve company processes thereby creating a consistent experience. Having a consistent experience builds trust in the company.

5. Follow up. Only 4% of customers with problems will complain to you. Contact after the sale allows you to learn how you are (or are not) meeting the customers' needs and correct problems early on. This will solidify your relationship with the customer and may even open the door for additional sales.

While none of this information is revolutionary, it is surprising how little most companies invest in such strategies. Always test to make sure you understand customer expectations and do your part to help them have realistic expectations of your products and services. Take a proactive stance in managing your customers' expectations and you will reap the rewards.

A burger from the JVC Junior Store might be just straight nostalgia for me....like back to the 90's...kind of like going to Brookings and slamming three or four burgers from Nick's, or a slice of pizza out the window from George's Pizza, or in Sioux Falls getting up early to get a cream-filled nutty long john from Daylight Doughnuts. Or the ultimate "fill your senses" restaurant.... The Smokehouse BBQ in Gladstone, MO. I can still taste my first "REAL" K.C. BBQ experience. Sitting in that old fancy booth with Steph's folks and trying to eat like a gentleman...every time we go back there I feel lucky to have found that girl, and that Kansas City BBQ institution.

it on the menu as a double cheeseburger then got branded? The answer to the question is the Class of 1972. In the first semester of their Junior year they became the curators of "The Junior Store", and Winona Stahl was the Junior Store manager.

"We ordered the candy in boxes from Westpark, and that was a big deal, we didn't have a Sam's Club," said Stahl. "In the back of the old gym there was a kitchen and that is where we made the burgers." Stahl doesn't remember if the double burger was on a menu prior to having a name, but her class is the one that named it the Valley Burger. She even recalls making the addition to the menu signage.

But like all good stories, this burger had to survive some turmoil. About a year after its introduction to the public, the old wooden JVC gymnasium burned down, and along with it the kitchen and Junior Store signage that adorned the walls....and this is where the history turns into lore. I interviewed several students that would have graduated in the mid-70's and many had no memory of the Valley Burger, but a couple did. There would have been a couple of basketball seasons without a home in the 70's so when the Junior Store came back online and the Valley Burger with it....kind of remains a mystery.

We know for sure that over 50 years ago this talented Junior class at JVC invented something so delicious that people throw away their diets for the night....that perfect "cheat day" meal of basketball fans all over the 281 Conference....they invented the "Big Mac" of JVC. WE ARE IN THE 50TH-ish or so ANNIVERSARY YEAR OF THE VALLEY BURGER AND NOBODY IS CELEBRATING!!!

Well, we do celebrate, every time a person eats their first one. I was there last week for that moment in someone's life. Nicole Erasmus (Hofer), or as she is known around our house, London and Lennix's mama, took her first bite of the Valley on January 4, 2024 at around 18:00 hours. When she said, "that was my first Valley Burger!" I was shocked, Melissa Hofer was sitting by Nicole, and she was also shocked...people all around celebrated and talked about their first Valley Burger...ok maybe not, but it was a big deal...I mean sometimes I only go to basketball games for the burger!

That got me thinking, how many other people have never had one? Well it is time.....get on the JVC school website find a home game, and head north to the best burger spot in town, on game days, at James Valley, from 5pm to before the 4th quarter starts, order a burger, spring for the Mt. Dew, a candy bar and some popcorn. You can even stay for the basketball if you want to!

Also if you don't want to spend the money on one, tell my uncle, Skipper Glanzer, to treat you to one. Somehow he bought a punch card for like 20 of them, and says he may have a hard time eating all them or giving them all away.

So again WE SALUTE YOU "JVC CLASS OF 1972" Ray Kroc and Dave Thomas would be proud of your hustle!
