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

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# Reflecting on the Past, Envisioning the Future: A Transition in Leadership for the City of Huron

As Huron welcomes Mark Robish as its newly elected Mayor, it's an opportune time to reflect on the achievements and challenges during Gary Harrington's tenure. With a peek into the vision for the city's future, we chatted with both leaders about the past and the aspirations for the journey ahead.

## **Mayor Gary Harrington**

I have enjoyed the last four years serving the City of Huron as the Mayor, and several years before that as a City Commissioner. There were definitely some challenges we encountered during my term as Mayor, but we also had successes that I am proud of.

The first and biggest challenge was Covid 19. I was thankful that Mayor Paul Aylward stayed on as Mayor for an additional six weeks and I took over that role on June 8, 2020. While it was certainly a challenge, I was thankful for all of the people in our community who stepped up and worked together to get through a very difficult time.

In 2022 we had two derecho storms, one in May and one in July. Those storms caused extensive damage to public and private properties. I was proud of the street department and others for their quick action to get the mess cleaned up. We helped our neighbors and came together as a community to help where needed.

In January 2023, we experienced devastation with fish dying because of lack of oxygen at the James River which raised concerns from our citizens. We acted quickly and did what was needed to resolve this problem.

Some of the successes, upgrades and investments that happened during my term include: new waste water treatment facility; new solid waste transfer station; the purchase of 77 acres in southeast Huron for the City's future housing development; assisting with the promotion of city-wide projects; including The DEX.

We worked with Greater Huron Development Corporation and the Huron Chamber to bring new businesses to Huron and maintain current businesses. The City Commission worked hard to wisely spend tax dollars where needed and I worked with the DOT on the City's behalf on the highway 37 construction updates.

I have been fortunate to have great department heads at City Hall and staff to help me the last four years.

I wish continued success for the City Commission and the newly elected Mayor, Mark Robish.



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## **Incoming Mayor, Mark Robish**

I cannot even begin to tell you how much it means to me for all your support, encouragement and prayers that I received during this campaign. It is very humbling to know I have been entrusted to lead your city and your community. I am the luckiest guy in town. As I said throughout my campaign, I want to be a leader that serves. But it would be impossible to do this alone. We need to help, support and trust each other along the way.

Working together is the border for this puzzle we call "Huron". It's not fair to think that one piece is more important than the next. It is especially encouraging to see the young people who grew up in Huron decide to come back and live their adult lives here as well. During my time as Mayor, it will be critical to oversee the housing development southeast of town and housing throughout town for new and existing families to want to live in Huron. We have to develop more housing so we can continue to attract and recruit new businesses to town. Working with Greater Huron and the Huron Chamber to attract businesses and new events to town to continue to raise the bar in Huron.

My campaign slogan was "Leadership that Serves". I challenge you to hold me accountable to serve. Like I said earlier, I am the luckiest guy in town. I get to serve the City of Huron.

With two of their three sons living in the Black Hills area, they now split their time between Huron and the Black Hills with a few winter months spent in Arizona.





May 1st - May 10th - *Grant application period.* Electronic applications and three hard copies along with supporting material must be received by 5:00 pm on May 10th. Late or incomplete applications will not be considered.

**May 13th- 17th** - *Review period*. The UWHR board will review each grant application to prepare for the upcoming interviews. Dates and times of interviews will be determined upon receipt of applications, and announced this week.

**May 20th - 22nd** - *Agency interviews*. Each agency requesting funds will meet during scheduled appointments with an interview panel made up of UWHR board members. This year there will once again be an option for in person meetings at the Huron Campus Center, or virtual interviews via Zoom for all agencies applying for funding.

They host the Ag Appreciation Banquet in December, provide Harvest Bags to our farmers, coordinate the 3rd Grade Farm Tour that brings in students from the Huron Public School District, James Valley Christian School and Holy Trinity Catholic School. The committee also maintains two trolley shuttles that run during the SD State Fair and solicit sponsor signage on the shuttles to promote local businesses.

**Governmental Affairs:** Meets 2nd Friday of the month at 8am at the Chamber Board room. The Governmental Affairs committee advocates for issues that affect businesses and the quality of life in the Huron area. Our committee strives to keep the community informed on issues, improve communication between the community and governmental entities, and take a leadership role in political forums. **Parade of Lights:** The first half of the year this committee works on revitalizing and sometimes generating new Christmas Lanes. The second half of the year is focused on the Parade of Lights and several holiday contests. The contests include: coloring contest for elementary students from Huron, Wolsey, Iroquois and Hitchcock-Tulare schools and a Christmas Lane Game BINGO/scavenger type hunt during December as a fun holiday experience that helps to showcase the homes that work to provide a memorable holiday display. They also host a Holiday Wreath and Christmas Tree Auction. The committee meets the 1st Tuesday of the month from 12-1 via zoom or in-person at the Chamber.

**Ringneck Festival:** This committee coordinates hunting teams to come to Huron for a Bird Dog Challenge and a six-man competitive hunt. Ringneck Festival is a three-day event held the first weekend in November. Scholarship opportunities are available for volunteers that help with the bird dog challenge or six-man competitive hunt. We could NOT do this event without land owners that offer up their land for a day along with the volunteers helping with the scorekeeping and the event set. The Ringneck Festival hosts teams competing from all over the United States. The committee meets from March through December at 5:15pm in the Chamber Board room.

**SD BBQ Championships:** This committee hosts a "smoked" meat and chili competition contest during Wheel Jam. They coordinate teams to come to Huron and participate in the Original SD BBQ Championships which is a KCBS sanction event. It is held at the SD State Fairgrounds and is a two-day event held the first weekend in June. Beginning with on Friday the F.A.T Friday Chili Contest, KCBS Rib Competition and Kid's Que followed by the Backyard BBQ and KCBS four meats competition on Saturday. It is a weekend of fun and good food! The committee meets January through July at 5:15pm at the Chamber Board room.

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

I recently spoke with someone who use to have similar frustrations as I do, so he shared a few unique ideas to stay outdoors.

Terry Nelson is the owner and operator of West Prairie Resort and Guide Service north of Pierre. Between fishing and hunting clients, their busy season runs from mid-May through the end of the year. Terry told me that years ago, he struggled with "cabin fever" during his

off-season. When asked about his favorite things to do now during that time of year, he rattled off several. "My absolute favorite thing to do in the early spring months is to go down to Texas to shoot pigs." Acknowledging that that isn't realistic for most people, he made a few other suggestions. "People don't realize how good fishing on the Missouri River in February, March, and April can be," he said. "If



you get a day or two of nice weather, the walleye fishing is incredible below the dams." The third suggestion he made was coyote hunting, specifically with thermal vision scopes. "Coyote populations are high right now making the success rates go up," he said. We talked about not everyone having access to thermal scopes, but they are becoming much more popular and affordable. "Our first night out this year, a buddy and I shot seven coyotes."

As I previously stated, the "in between" can cause some people (A.K.A. me) to become a little stir crazy, but there are plenty of opportunities our state provides if a person is willing to think somewhat "outside the box."



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## **Small Business Loan Basics**

Over the years I have worked with hundreds of existing and prospective business owners. When business loans are part of the discussion, there are many opportunities for education. Here are some basics to keep in mind.



A Different Animal – Business loans are very different from car and home loans in terms of requirements, time tables, underwriting. Businesses rely on a stream of business profits to

make loan payments so cash flow is critical. A business plan is important to demonstrate this cash flow and illustrate how the business owner will implement the plan. You will be better served to present a complete package to a lender to act on rather than dribbling information to them bit by bit.

**Personal Credit** – Your personal credit DOES affect your ability to get money for your business. Your credit score is an indication of your ability to manage money, and cash flow management is critical in business.

**Down Payment** – Funders expect you to bring something to the table. Cash is preferred but assets you own and will use in the business (equipment, inventory, vehicle, etc.) can also be considered part of your down payment. The exact amount is dependent on the specifics of each project with a common range of 10-30%.

**Equity vs. Collateral** – Equity is the cash or assets the owner(s) is investing in the business (your 'down payment'). Collateral is the assets (business AND personal) that are pledged to your loan. Lenders expect repayment from the business profits. If there is a default, the liquidation of collateral is a secondary way to recover their funds.

If at First You Don't Succeed – If the first request is not successful, get as much information as you can from the lender as to the reason why. See if those can be filled by reimaging the financing request or involving additional funding sources or credit enhancements in the project.

**It's Not Always About You** – Keep in mind that certain industries are riskier than others. Your ability to get financing is sometimes influenced by the industry or that particular lender's experience with that industry. Each lender has its own policies so don't be afraid to approach more than one if needed.

There can also be confusion about funding options available. Each business is unique so funding sources are unique to each project. The Small Business Development Center can explain what programs fit and help brainstorm options to consider. Understanding the basic tenets of business financing is critical to success.

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## What a Friend...We Have in Jesus

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
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## Class of 2024
