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FOREWORD

Come to the Manger is a compelling Christmas cantata that sparkles with the artistry of its composer/arranger, Mark Hayes. In the first half, *The Nativity of Jesus*, we visit the humble manger in Bethlehem and gather with the shepherds to worship the Christ Child. An inventive combination of traditional carols and spirituals enlivens the scene, and two narrators provide biblical commentary.

In the second half, *The Visit of the Wise Men*, we celebrate the gift of God's Son with the magi. The final medley, *Christmas in the Manger*, gradually builds to a joyous conclusion as the people of God shout the glad news throughout the world that Jesus Christ is born!

Designed as an inspiring yet flexible Christmas program, Come to the Manger may be performed in its entirety, lasting approximately 30 minutes, or in two parts, the first at Christmas and the second at Epiphany. The author highly recommends the use of featured soloists, a unison children's choir and congregational singing, as indicated in the score, although the entire work may be presented by an S.A.T.B. choir.

Come to the Manger may be accompanied by keyboard instrument alone or with Mark's outstanding orchestration. An InstruPax is available separately, No. 20025, consisting of director's score and individual parts, including 2 flutes, piccolo, oboe, Bb clarinet, French horn (opt. flugel horn), 2 Bb trumpets, piccolo trumpet, trombone, bass trombone, master rhythm, piano, percussion, solo violin and solo cello. A fully-orchestrated performance/accompaniment CD recording, No. 20024, is also available.



be counted. This was the first census, and it was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. So all people traveled to the towns of their births to be counted. (Luke 2: 13)





I. THE NATIVITY OF JESUS

NARRATOR 1: Unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given, and the government will be upon His shoulder, and His name will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. (Isaiah 9: 6)

NARRATOR 2: And this will be a sign for you: you will find the Child wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger. (Luke 2: 12)

1. Away in a Manger (A Medley of Traditional Carols)
