Come and Praise the Risen Lord is a regal hymn concertato incorporating the majestic hymn tune ***Crown Him with Many Crowns***. It is appropriate for Easter, Eastertide, Ascension and Christ the King Sunday. Suggested corresponding lectionary readings include Psalm 47, John 20: 1-18, 1 Corinthians 15: 19-26 & 51-58 and 1 Timothy 6: 11-21. One basic homiletical theme is proclaiming throughout the world the victory of the risen Lord.

This flexible arrangement may be performed by larger choirs with brass quartet and percussion accompaniment (parts available separately, see p. 2), or by smaller choirs with solo trumpet (see page 11). A reprintable part for congregational singing may be found on page 12.

Joseph M. Martin is Recognized throughout the United States for his many choral compositions, both sacred and secular, with numerous compositions currently in print and the list continues to grow. His music can be heard in such diverse locations as Carnegie Hall in New York City; the Mel Tillis Theatre in Branson, Missouri; and in hundreds of worship services in churches across the United States and Canada.

Pamela Stewart has more than 200 pieces in publication, several of which have been honored by *Creator Magazine* in its “Select 20” anthems. In 2000, the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation commissioned her to write a song cycle for chorus and symphony. Titled *Sing for the Cure*, it has been performed at Carnegie Hall and has been recorded featuring Dr. Maya Angelou as narrator.
