Jonah is an inventive musical story that can be presented in worship, chapel, or Sunday school throughout the year. The story and dialog are inspired by the book of Jonah, chapters 1-4. Additional insights may be found in Exodus 34: 6 and 1 Kings 19: 3b-9.

Flexibly conceived, **Jonah** may be presented by unison or 2-part voices as a minimusical drama, with dialog for 3 characters: God, Jonah and Narrator. Reproducible dialog appears on pages 2-3. Important themes in this story include feeling sorry for yourself, trying to run away from God and responsibility, turning to God in times of distress, and repenting and receiving God's grace. These themes are as applicable today as they were in biblical times!

○5 JONAH DIALOG

NARRATOR: (spoken in rhyming cadence) Once upon a time, in the belly of a whale

sat poor old Jonah—what a sad, sad tale! Jonah was frightened and running away from God and life. What a pitiful display! Sitting down there with seaweed on his head, with all of his terrible problems to dread, poor old Jonah had a change of heart,

and this is where our story starts!

GOD: Jonah!

Yes, Lord? JONAH:

GOD: Why are you running away from me?

Lord, I have always tried to serve You faithfully. But now You tell me JONAH:

I must go to the terrible city of Nineveh and make those Ninnies give up their evil ways! Why have You chosen ME to go, Lord? WHY ME?

GOD: Jonah, have faith, and the plan will be revealed.

JONAH What kind of an answer is that? WHY ME? (sighs)

Okay, Lord, I'd rather be alive than dead. Please forgive me! If You'll

get me out of this smelly fish, I'll go to Nineveh.

NARRATOR: (spoken in rhyming cadence) The whale swam to a nearby beach

and spit Jonah out! He began to preach and spread God's word in Nineveh city, "Believe in God, or He'll have no pity. He'll punish you and destroy your town."

Then Jonah found some shade and sat right down.

GOD: Jonah, the people of Nineveh have listened to you. They have given up

their evil ways. I am very pleased, and I have decided not to punish

them.

JONAH: What?! How can you let them off the hook so easily? I've been your

faithful servant for years, but I had to sit in the belly of a whale before

you would forgive me! WHY ME!?

GOD: What right do you have to be angry? Was I angry with you when you

sailed away from me on a sinking ship? No, I saved you because you

asked me to forgive you.

So it is with the people of Nineveh. They have repented of their sinful ways, just as you did. Now they also are my faithful children. Jonah, let go of your anger. Grow in faith and wisdom, and you will know

my grace.

NARRATOR: (spoken in rhyming cadence) Jonah was a lot like you and me,

when he heard God call, he ran to the sea! Confused and frightened, he tried to hide,

until, at last, deep down inside,

he knew the truth. He found God's grace.

All of life's troubles he could face.

So here's the moral of this little tale:

When YOU land in the belly of a whale,

remember this—let God be your guide.

You can't go wrong with God by your side!
