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Restore Our Song First Rehearsal Plans

I keep thinking about what that first choir rehearsal will be like after not being able to sing together at the same time and in the same space for so long. I know that many of us will be shedding tears of joy!



With that in mind, we came up with plans for that first, glorious rehearsal. These plans are intended to be a time of reunion and celebration rather than they are lesson plans for a regular musical rehearsal. Since many of your members have had to take a break from singing for many months, you will certainly want to include many of your favorite warm ups and other teaching devices to achieve musical proficiency. Also, they have been written with the possibility in mind that you might want to invite other members of the congregation—persons who have not regularly sung in the choir in the past, and maybe even children and youth—to join in presenting the theme song, "Restore Our Song" to your congregation.

In addition to learning the theme song, plans include group sharing and prayer, a celebration response, and even a time of fellowship and refreshments with an option for celebrating birthdays and holidays that could not be observed during the pandemic.

Things to do in preparation for the first rehearsal

- 1. Communicate with regular choir members via email or Zoom about the following:
 - making this in-person choir "restart" an opportunity for recruiting new members.
 - inviting members of the congregation to join the choir in introducing "Restore Our Song" in worship.
 - asking choir members to invite persons in their Sunday School classes or other groups within the congregation.
 - asking members to make new persons feel welcome.
- 2. Invite congregants to join the choir for the first rehearsal in order to learn "Restore Our Song" with plans to introduce it to the congregation during the next worship service.

Restore Our Sond Choir Rehearsal Devotions

There are devotions included for 6 rehearsals. Feel free to use them in any order you wish, and also, you may use them all, or as many as you would like.

Writing these devotions was an extremely spiritual and hope-filled experience, as they are reflections of thoughts and prayers as we moved through the COVID-19 pandemic. Even though they were written during times when infection rates were high and fear was great, they had to be written with the assurance that we had survived this dark time and were now free to gather, and especially, to sing.

Most of the devotions are reflections on persons, either from the Bible, or from around our world who have not only gone through times of great struggle, but have also had their voices silenced during these times. With God's help, all have come through the trials as victors.

Also included in each devotion is a responsive reading based on a psalm of praise about singing. Finally, there is a short prayer of blessing that leads into your weekly rehearsals. Notice that, in each case, there is a page break between the story and the other components of a devotion. This is meant to allow you to reproduce the responsive readings and prayer for your group.

It is our sincere desire that these devotions will provide your choir members with hope as they face the days ahead.



Or another:

Why is light given to one who cannot see the way?"

from Job 3:20,23 (NRSV)

In deep despair, finally, he cried out:

"O that I knew where I might find God." Job 23:3 (NRSV)

It was a young friend who began to help Job see that God was *for* him, and in fact, God was *with* him, right there in that heap of ashes. At last, Job heard God speaking, not giving Job direct answers, but emphasizing the power that the Creator has over our entire world. After hearing God speak and feeling God's presence with him, Job responded;

"I know that You can do all things, and that no purpose of Yours can be thwarted. I had heard about You by the hearing of the ear, but now, my eyes see You."

Job 42;2, 5 (NRSV)

Now Job saw God. Job saw His mighty power, and Job saw that He is God even in the midst of a disordered and tragic world. Because of love, God causes the universe to continue to run its course. God's love is with us, never letting us go.

Scripture (responsive reading) Psalm 13:5, 6 (NRSV)

Leader: I trusted in Your steadfast love.

All: My heart shall rejoice in Your salvation.

Leader: I will sing to the Lord,

All: who has dealt bountifully with me.

Restore Our Song Hymn Sings

If your congregations are anything like ours, there will be tremendous rejoicing on that day when we can raise our voices in corporate songs of praise to God without the fear that someone will become sick. That is why we decided to include suggestions for two hymn sings. I knew that our own congregation loves to sing so much that we would probably be willing to hold two hymn sings.



The first is a song service based on scripture readings from Psalms and Isaiah. Between each reading is a list of appropriate hymn suggestions. These hymns should be familiar to most congregations, but feel free to insert other hymns or contemporary songs that are loved by your own group.

The second hymn sing is a service based on songs that have probably been sorely missed during this pandemic year. It is a service to "reclaim the church year in song." Narration moves us through the seasons of the church and calendar year, with appropriate hymn and carol suggestions after each narrative.

Each hymn sing also includes responses and prayers to lead your gathered flock in celebrating and praising our faithful God.

Suggestion 1: A Service of Scripture and Song

Welcome

Call to Worship

Leader: O come, let us sing to the Lord.

All: O come, let us sing songs of joy to our God who has brought us to this

new day.

Leader: This is the day that the Lord has made.

All: This is a day of thanksgiving and celebration.

Leader: Praise God, for our days of silence now have ended.

All: Lord, restore our joy! Restore our song!

Prayer

Faithful God, You have led us through a time of dark valleys, a time of sadness and loneliness and loss. Thank you for always walking with us, for supporting us and holding us closely.

Suggestion 2: Reclaiming the Church Year in Song

Prelude

Welcome

Welcome to this time of celebration and worship. During the past months, we have walked through times of sickness and sadness, of loneliness and pain. During this challenging period in our history, we have not been able to observe the special, holy times of the church year as we usually do. We have observed our holidays and holy days in isolation, yearning to gather together to sing the songs that tell the blessed story of God's love and faithfulness.

Today, we attempt to reclaim our joy during these seasons as we move throughout the year in song. I invite you to join as we read together the Call to Worship.
