**Premier**<sup>®</sup> **Yarns** *Home Cotton*<sup>®</sup> *Solids* (85% Recycled Cotton, 15% Polyester; 2.65 oz/75g, 131 yards/120 m)

• 38-09 Fuchsia, 38-21 Lime Green, and

38-14 Christmas Green — 1 ball each **Premier® Yarns** *Home Cotton® Multis* (85% Recycled Cotton, 15% Polyester; 1.94 oz/55g, 96 yards/88 m)

44-20 Grey Splash, 44-38 Granite Splash
— 1 ball

**Notions:** Glue, scissors, pencil, book cover or other surface, double-pointed knitting needle or other pointy tool

### **PATTERN NOTES**

This project is customizable! Use a book cover as shown, or consider decorating the front of a greeting card, flower pot, foamboard, or anything you can imagine. Sketch your design on the surface, plot out the colors, and start glueing!

The yarn listed is more than enough to complete the project shown. Most any glue should work fine. Basic craft glue was used in the project shown.

Skills/techniques used in this project:

- Sketching a design.
- •Cutting and glueing yarn.

### YARN PAINTING

#### Step One

Begin by sketching your design on your surface of choice. Plot out your colors and gather your yarn, glue, and scissors.

You can plan to cover the entire surface as shown, or just bits of it. Keep in mind that if there will be blank spots with no yarn, that the surface itself looks the way you want it to. You could prep the surface with paint or other covering before beginning, if desired.

### Step Two

Pick a color and start glueing! If there are any thinner lines in your design, begin with those, or with smaller areas. Find a good starting place. Begin glueing by applying a thin line of glue along your line, or within your small areas. Work in small areas at one time so the glue doesn't have a chance to dry before you've placed the yarn on it. Use a double-pointed needle or other tool with a pointy end to help nudge your yarn strand exactly where you want it to go. Work directly from the ball of yarn, and only cut the strand when you have completed a section.

#### **Step Three**

Continue working from the center outward. If you have other small areas in the center of your piece, continue covering these as needed. When working in small spots as shown in the photo below, it may be easier to pre-cut a length of yarn before beginning to glue. Use trial and error to determine the best length for an area.

### Step Four

In areas that have definite outlines, try completing the outlined portion first, and then filling in the individual spaces as shown. There is no right or wrong way to do this! You can run the yarn strand in swirls, vertical or horizontal lines, or whatever looks best to you.
