


The Dragon Murder Case

Philo's not so sure: He is (of course) an expert on both dragons and the Lenape Indians, with a sort of sideline expertise in pools and fish.

ABOUT THE BOOK

No longer on the sprightly side of 70, Professor Andrew Basnett is looking forward to retirement, to really digging into the biography he plans to write of an obscure 17th-century botanist, to settling into the little village where he's borrowed a cottage while his flat in town is being renovated. It all sounds peaceful and bucolic, even if **the village murderess lives right up the road**. But the case never came to trial, says Basnett's nephew, lender of the cottage: She had the perfect alibi.

Not entirely comforted, Basnett is yet more unnerved when a blizzard hits, knocking out the power and igniting powerful memories, throughout the village, of that similarly snowy night six years ago when Mrs. Hewison...well, when someone shot Charles Hewison through the head. It doesn't really help that there's now been another murder and that Pauline Hewison, once again, had motive to spare.

ABOUT E.X. FERRARS

Morna Doris MacTaggart was born was born in Burma in 1907 and sent at the age of six to a prestigious boarding school in England. After an early marriage and the publication of two novels, in 1940 her life was turned upside-down when she both met Robert Brown and published *Give a Corpse a Bad Name* (as E.X. Ferrars), her first mystery and the first in what would become the five-book "Toby Dyke" series. She and Brown married in 1945 and in 1951 moved to the US, though they returned to the UK only a year later, sickened by America's turn toward McCarthyism. In 1953 Ferrars helped found the Crime Writers' Association. The couple lived in Edinburgh for 25 years, during which Ferrars wrote more than 35 crime novels, finally returning to series mystery—first with the "Virginia and Alex Freer" series and then with "Andrew Basnett"—only in the late 1970s, after a move to Oxfordshire. She died in 1995, having published more than 75 novels and numerous short stories, nearly all of them involving dead bodies.



Andrew Basnett's cousin Felicity is old, rich, and the owner of a swanky Berkshire estate (among other craveable items). 
ABOUT THE BOOK

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Michelle Birkby wrote her first book at the age of seven. It was about a bunny rabbit, and the rabbit survived the book. Over the next thirty years, Michelle set her hand to fanfic, romance, science fiction, and ghost stories, and all these endeavors had one thing in common: At least one of the characters ended up dead. In the end, she yielded to the inevitable and started writing crime fiction, where she could scatter around as many dead bodies as she liked.

Michelle's employment history has been similarly diverse. She has worked as a tour guide in a prophetess-cave, a library assistant, a film extra, and at McDonald's, and in her spare time she has acted, belly-danced, and had a lot of fun at sci-fi conventions. GUIDE TO THE CATEGORIES

BRITISH Set in or around the UK, these feature the highly literate, often witty prose that fans of British mysteries demand.



ESPIONAGE Spies, spooks, and conspiracy theories, from World War I to the present.



FOREIGN Intricately observed, richly atmospheric settings anywhere in the world outside of England and the U.S.A.



HARD BOILED Mean streets and meaner bad guys, with a cop or a PI usually carrying the story and landing a few punches besides.



HISTORICAL From the Ancient World to the 1940s, and everything in between.



TRADITIONAL Classy cozies with little gunplay or gore, but often a fair amount of humor and—always—an intrepid amateur sleuth.



VINTAGE Originally published prior to about 1965, these promise the kind of twisty, ingenious puzzles beloved by fans of Agatha Christie.



WILD CARD We can't promise these will press particular buttons, but we do guarantee they will be unusual, well written, and worth a reader's time.
