# 1 Timothy 6:11-16—The Spiritual Athlete

<sup>11</sup> But as for you, man of God, shun all this; *aim at righteousness, godliness, faith, love, steadfastness, gentleness.* <sup>12</sup> *Fight the good fight of the faith; take hold of the eternal life to which you were called when you made the good confession in the presence of many witnesses.* <sup>13</sup> In the presence of God who gives life to all things, and *of Christ Jesus who in his testimony before Pontius Pilate made the good confession,* <sup>14</sup> *I charge you to keep the commandment unstained and free from reproach until the appearing of our Lord Jesus Christ;* <sup>15</sup> and this will be made manifest at the proper time by the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords, <sup>16</sup> who alone has immortality and dwells in unapproachable light, whom no man has ever seen or can see. To him be honor and eternal dominion. Amen. (1 Tim 6:11-16)

1. <u>Virtues</u>: "aim" at acquiring virtues (6:11)

- a. "righteousness"
- b. "godliness"
- c. "faith"
- d. "love"
- e. "steadfastness"
- f. "gentleness"

2. Spiritual Contest: "fight" or "contest" or "competition" (Greek agona) (6:12)

<sup>24</sup> Do you not know that in a race all the runners compete, but only one receives the prize? So run that you may obtain it. <sup>25</sup> *Every athlete* (Greek *ho agōnizomenos*) *exercises self-control in all things*. They do it to receive a perishable wreath, but we an imperishable. <sup>26</sup> Well, I do not run aimlessly, I do not box as one beating the air; <sup>27</sup> but I pommel my body and subdue it, lest after preaching to others I myself should be disqualified. (1 Cor 9:24-27)

- 3. Good Confession: the "confession" or "profession" (Greek homologia) (6:12)
- 4. <u>Testimony</u>: Christ's "confession" (Gk *homologia*) before Pilate (6:13; <u>Luke 22:1-3</u>)
- 5. <u>Epiphany</u>: the "appearing" (Greek *epiphania*) of Christ (6:14)

### Living Tradition

<u>Tertullian</u>: In like manner, O blessed, consider whatever is hard in your present situation as an exercise of your powers of mind and body. *You are about to enter a noble contest in which the living God acts the part of superintendent and the Holy Spirit is your trainer*, a contest whose crown is eternity, whose prize is angelic nature, citizenship in heaven for ever and ever. (Tertullian, *To the Martyrs* 3.3; trans. R. Deferari)
