The Mass Readings Explained

The Ordination of Timothy (27th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C)

2 Timothy 1:6-8, 13-14—The Laying on of Hands

⁶ Hence I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; ⁷ for God did not give us a spirit of timidity but a spirit of power and love and self-control. ⁸ Do not be ashamed then of testifying to our Lord, nor of me his prisoner, but share in suffering for the gospel in the power of God, ⁹ who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not in virtue of our works but in virtue of his own purpose and the grace which he gave us in Christ Jesus ages ago, ¹⁰ and now has manifested through the appearing of our Savior Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. ¹¹ For this gospel I was appointed a preacher and apostle and teacher, ¹² and therefore I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know whom I have believed, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that Day what has been entrusted to me. ¹³ Follow the pattern of the sound words which you have heard from me, in the faith and love which are in Christ Jesus; ¹⁴ guard the truth that has been entrusted to you by the Holy Spirit who dwells within us. (1 Tim 6:11-16)

- 1. Gift: rekindle the "gift" (Greek charisma) of God (1:6)
- 2. Laying on of Hands: through the "laying on" (Greek epithesis) of Paul's hands (1:6)
 - a. Blessings: Israel blesses Ephraim and Manasseh (Gen 48:14)
 - b. Consecration: Levites have "hands" laid on them (Num 8:5-11)
 - c. Sacrifice: Levites "lay their hands" on bulls (Num 8:12-13)
 - d. Commission: Moses "laid hands" on Joshua (Num 27:18-23; Deut 34:9)
 - e. Ordination: later rabbinic "laying on of hands" (Hebrew semikhah)

Do not neglect the gift you have, which was given you by prophetic utterance when the council of elders (Greek *presbyterion*) laid their hands upon you. (1 Tim 4:14)

- 3. <u>Suffering</u>: Paul calls Timothy to "suffer" for the sake of "the gospel" (1:8)
- 4. Vocation: a holy "calling" (Greek klēsis; Latin vocatio); by "grace," not "works" (1:9)
- 5. Cruciformity: Paul suffers as "preacher," "apostle," and "teacher" (1:11)
- 6. Truth: guard the "truth" that has been "entrusted" to you (1:14)

Living Tradition

<u>Ambrosiaster</u>: "Paul urges Timothy to nurture his spirit with eagerness of mind, rejoicing in his faith, *just as he once rejoiced in the newness of his ordination*." (Ambrosiaster, *Commentary on the Second Letter to Timothy*; trans. P. Gorday)

Council of Trent: Since from the testimony of Scripture, apostolic tradition, and the

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unanimous agreement of the Fathers it is clear that grace is conferred by sacred ordination..., no one ought to doubt that orders is truly and properly one of the seven sacraments of the Holy Church. For the apostle says: "I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands..." [2 Tim 1:6]." (Council of Trent, Session 23, Chapter 3; trans. R. Fastiggi and A. E. Nash).¹
