The Mass Readings Explained

The High Priestly Prayer of Jesus (7th Sunday of Easter, Year A)

Acts 1:12-14—The Disciples in the Upper Room

1. <u>Twelve Apostles</u>: devoted themselves to "prayer" in the "upper room" (1:12-14)

Psalm 27—I Shall See the Good Things of the Lord

1. <u>Temple</u>: "one thing" I desire; to live in "the house of the Lord" (27:4)

John 17:1-11—The High Priestly Prayer of Jesus

- 1. "<u>High-Priestly Prayer</u>": Lutheran theologian David Chytraeus (1530-1600)
- 2. Consecration: Jesus uses the word "consecrate" (Greek hagiazo) (John 17:17, 19).

Now this is what you shall do to them to *consecrate* (Greek *hagiasai*) *them*, that they may serve me *as priests*. (Exod 29:1 LXX)

3. Intercession: corresponds to the Day of Atonement (Hebrwe yom kippur).¹

<i>The Day of Atonement</i>	<i>The Prayer of Jesus</i>
1. The High Priest	1. Jesus prayes for himself:
sacrifices "for himself"	"glorify your Son"
(Lev 16:11, 17)	(John 17:1, 5)
2. The High Priest sacrifices "for his house" (Lev 16:11, 17)	2. Jesus prays for the disciples:"I am praying for them"(John 17:9, 10, 12)
3. The High Priest	3. Jesus prays "also for those who
sacrifices for "the assembly"	believe in me through their word"
(Lev 16:17)	(John 17:21, 22)

The Living Tradition

<u>Catechism:</u> When "his hour" came, Jesus prayed to the Father. *His prayer, the longest transmitted by the Gospel, embraces the whole economy of creation and salvation, as well as his death and Resurrection*. The prayer of the Hour of Jesus always remains his own, just as his Passover "once for all" remains ever present in the liturgy of his Church. *Christian Tradition rightly calls this prayer the "priestly" prayer of Jesus. It is the prayer of our high priest, inseparable from his sacrifice, from his passing over (Passover) to the Father to whom he is wholly "consecrated."* In this Paschal and sacrificial prayer, everything is recapitulated in Christ: God and the world; the Word and

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the flesh; eternal life and time; the love that hands itself over and the sin that betrays it; the disciples present and those who will believe in him by their word; humiliation and glory. *It is the prayer of unity*. (CCC 2746-49)
