Sermon on the Mount 5: Money and Anxiety (8th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year A)

Isaiah 49:14-15—I Will Never Forget You

1. God will never forsake his people; more faithful than a mother for her child!

Psalm 62—Rest in God Alone, My Soul

- 1. For "God alone" my souls waits or "at rest" (v. 1)
- 2. God is my "rock" and "my salvation" and my "fortress" (v. 2, 6)
- 3. Trust in him "at *all times*" (v. 8)

Matthew 6:24-34—Money and Anxiety

- 1. No one can serve two masters:
 - a. "Serve": Greek *douleuō*, "be a slave" to
 - b. "Masters": Greek kyrios, "lord"
 - c. Literally: "No one can be a slave to two lords..."
- 2. You cannot serve God and Mammon (Aramaic, "wealth" or "property")
- 3. Jesus Commands: "Do not be anxious about your life"
 - a. Food and Drink
 - b. Clothing
- 4. Examples from Creation:
 - a. <u>Birds of the Air</u>: God feeds them; "Are you not of more value than they?"
 - b. Lilies of the Field: God clothes them; "Will he not clothe you?"
 - c. "You of little faith/trust (pistis)"
- 5. 2nd Time: "Do not be anxious"
 - a. Gentiles/Pagans: "seek" after food and clothing
 - b. Jesus' Followers: "seek *first*" the kingdom and his righteousness
 - c. Augustine: seek temporal things not for their own sake, but for the kingdom
- 6. 3rd Time: "Do not be anxious about tomorrow"
 - a. Tomorrow will be anxious for itself
 - b. Let the day's own "evil" "misfortune" "trouble" (kakia) be enough for the day

The Love of Money

For the love of money is the root of all evils... (1 Timothy 6:10)

Keep your life free from love of money, and be content with what you have; for he has said, "I will never fail you nor forsake you." (Hebrews 13:5)

The Catechism on Money-Worship

- 1. "Idolatry" is not only "false pagan worship"
- 2. Man commits "idolatry" when he worships anything in place of God
- 3. Examples: power, pleasure, race, ancestors, the state, *money* (CCC 2113)

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The Catechism on Trust in Divine Providence

- 1. God does not "abandon" his creatures to themselves
- 2. "At every moment," he "upholds and sustains them in being" (CCC 301)

Questions for Discussion and Reflection (8th Sunday Ordinary Time, Year A)

1. We saw in the video that Jesus says that a person cannot be "a slave" to money and serve God. What are some ways that a person can become a "slave" to money? Or that money can become their "lord"? Have you ever known anyone like that, who gave themselves entirely to the pursuit of wealth?
2. In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus <i>commands</i> us three times not to be "anxious" about food, clothing. But is this really possible? What are some practical ways that we can ge anxiety under control? (Hint: the answer lies in trying to live out the command to "seel first" the kingdom of heaven).
3 In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus also commands us not to be anxious about the future ("tomorrow"). Why shouldn't we be anxious about tomorrow? Is this realistic?
