(November 1st, Solemnity)

The Solemnity of All Saints

1. Commemorates: all the *unknown saints* presently in heaven.

Revelation 7:2-4, 9-14—The Innumerable Multitude

1. Seal: "servants of God" are "sealed" upon their "foreheads" (Rev 7:4)

³ Now the glory of the God of Israel had gone up from the cherubim on which it rested to the threshold of the house; and he called to the man clothed in linen, who had the writing case at his side. ⁴ And the Lord said to him, "Go through the city, through Jerusalem, and *put a mark* (Hebrew "t," shaped like +) *upon the foreheads of the men* who sigh and groan over all the abominations that are committed in it." (Ezekiel 9:3-4)

- 2. <u>Israelites</u>: 144,000 remnant of Israel (12 X 12 X 1000 = 144,000) (Rev 7:4-8)
- 3. Gentiles: innumerable multitude "from every nation" (Rev 7:9)
- 4. Great Tribulation: time of suffering that precedes the final judgment (Dan 12:1-3)

Psalm 24—This is the People that Longs to See Your Face

- 1. <u>Jerusalem Temple</u>: ascend the "hill of the LORD' and stand in "holy place" (v. 3)
- 2. <u>Vision of God</u>: who "seek the *face* of the God of Jacob" (v. 6)

Matthew 5:1-12—The Beatitudes

- 1. <u>Beatitudes</u>: "Blessed," literally "Happy" (Greek makarios; Latin beatus) (5:3)
- 2. <u>Poor in Spirit</u>: those who are humble (Gk. *ptōchos*, "dependent," "needy")
- 3. Mourners: those who lament sin, suffering, and death
- 4. Meek: (Gk. praus, "gentle"); those who yield to insults; conquer evil with good
- 5. <u>Hunger/Thirst for Righteousness</u>: those who are 'starving' for righteousness
- 6. Merciful: those who forgive the faults of others
- 7. Pure in Heart: (Gk. katharos, "clean", "pure"); those who act with integrity
- 8. Peacemakers: those who reconcile with others and foster reconciliation
- 9. Persecuted: those who are slandered, falsely accused, reviled for Jesus' sake

The Living Tradition

<u>Catechism</u>: The Beatitudes depict the countenance of Jesus Christ and portray his charity. They express the vocation of the faithful associated with the glory of his Passion and Resurrection; they shed light on the actions and attitudes characteristic of the Christian life; they are the paradoxical promises that sustain hope in the midst of tribulations; they proclaim the blessings and rewards already secured, however dimly, for Christ's disciples; they have begun in the lives of the Virgin Mary and all the saints. (CCC 1717)
