# The Mass Readings Explained

## Eyewitnesses to the Transfiguration (Feast, August 6<sup>th</sup>, Year A)

#### 2 Peter 1:16-19—Eyewitnesses to the Transfiguration

- 1. <u>Myths</u>: Jesus' "coming" not a "myth" (Greek *mythos*) (1:16)
- 2. Eyewitnesses: "eyewitnesses" of his "majesty" (1:16; cf. Mark 9:2-7)
- 3. Earwitnesses: "we heard the voice" of God (1:17-18)
- 4. <u>Apostolic Authority:</u> "We have the prophetic word (*prophētikos logos*)" (1:17)
- 5. Apostolic Preaching: comparable to "light" of Scripture (cf. Psa 119:105)

6. <u>Scripture</u>: "not a matter of one's own interpretation (*idias epilyseōs*)" (1:20-21)

#### **Living Tradition**

<u>Venerable Bede</u>: "For we did not follow learned myths when we made known to you the power and presence of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we were made beholders of his greatness" (2 Pet 1:16). Here he strikes at pagans and heretics at the same time. The former have not been afraid to call gods whatever was pleasing to them, the latter, after having received the mysteries of the true God, from then on have been inclined not to pay attention to the divine scriptures but rather to alter these to their own erroneous meaning by interpreting them wrongly." (Venerable Bede, *On 2 Peter*; trans. David Hurst)
