The "Seal" of the Spirit and Confirmation (7th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B)

2 Corinthians 1:18-22—The "Yes" of Christ and the "Seal" of the Spirit

1. <u>Accusation</u>: some are accusing him of vacillating insincerity, telling the Corinthians both "Yes" ("I will visit") and "No" ("I will not") (1:17).

2. Integrity: "our word to you has not been Yes and No" (1:18;. cf. Matt 5:36-37)

3. <u>The "Yes" of Christ</u>: "all the promises of God find their Yes in him" (1:20)

4. <u>The "Amen"</u>: we "utter the Amen through him" (1:20)

5. <u>"Seal" of the Spirit</u>: God has "put his seal (Greek *sphragizo*) upon us" (1:22)

6. <u>Anointing</u>: not "commissioned" but "anointed" (Greek *chrio*) us (1:22)

Now he who has established us with you in Christ and has anointed us (Greek *chrio*), is God, who also hath sealed (Greek *sphragizo*) us and given the pledge of the Spirit in our hearts. (2 Cor 1:21-22, Author's trans.)

The Living Tradition

<u>St. Ambrose</u>: So recall that you have received *a spiritual seal*, "the spirit of wisdom and of understanding, the spirit of counsel and fortitude, the spirit of knowledge and of piety, the spirit of holy fear" [Isa 11:2-3], and preserve what you have received. *God the Father sealed you; Christ the Lord confirmed you, and gave a pledge, the Spirit, in your hearts*, as you have learned in the lessen of the Apostle [cf. 2 Cor 5:5]. (Ambrose, *The Mysteries* 7.42)¹
