# The Imitation of Christ (6<sup>h</sup> Sunday of Ordinary Time, Year B)

## 1 Corinthians 10:31-11:1—The Imitation of Paul

<sup>31</sup>So, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God. <sup>32</sup> *Give no offense to Jews or to Greeks or to the church of God*, <sup>33</sup> just as *I try to please all men in everything I do*, not seeking my own advantage, but that of many, *that they may be saved*. <sup>1</sup>*Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ*. (1 Corinthians 10:31-11:1)

<u>Context</u>: dispute over eating food in the pagan markets (cf. <u>1 Cor 10:23-30</u>)
<u>Imitation of Christ</u>: be "imitators" (Greek *mimētēs*) of Paul (1 Cor 11:1; cf. 1 Cor 4:16)

### The Living Tradition

<u>Catechism</u>: Christ enables us to live in him all that he himself lived, and he lives it in us. "By his Incarnation, he, the Son of God, has in a certain way united himself with each man." We are called only to become one with him, for he enables us as the members of his Body to share in what he lived for us in his flesh as our model: "We must continue to accomplish in ourselves the stages of Jesus' life and his mysteries and often to beg him to perfect and realize them in us and in his whole Church.... For it is the plan of the Son of God to make us and the whole Church partake in his mysteries and to extend them to and continue them in us and in his whole Church. This is his plan for fulfilling his mysteries in us." (CCC 521, quoting St. John Eudes [emphasis added])

## Dr. Brant Pitre The Mass Readings Explained

<u>Pope Francis</u>: At its core, *holiness is experiencing*, in union with Christ, *the mysteries of his life*. (Pope Francis, Apostolic Exhortation *Gaudete ex Exultate* no. 20)

St. John Gabriel Perboyre: O my Divine Saviour. Transform me into Yourself. May my hands be the hands of Jesus. Grant that every faculty of my body May serve only to glorify You. Above all. Transform my soul and all its powers So that my memory, will and affection May be the memory, will and affections Of Jesus. I pray You To destroy in me All that is not of You. Grant that I may live But in You, by You and for You, So that I may truly say, With St. Paul, "I live - now not I -But Christ lives in me".

#### Questions for Discussion and Reflection (6<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Ordinary Time, Year B)

1. How can Paul be so seemingly audacious to command the Corinthians to "imitate" him, even as he "imitates" Christ? (1 Cor 11:1) How can we live out this inspired command in our own live?
