Mary, the New Eve (Solemnity of the Assumption, August 15th)

1 Corinthians 15:20-27—The New Adam and the New Creation

²⁰ But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. ²¹ For as by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. ²² For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive. ²³ But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. ²⁴ Then comes the end, when he delivers the kingdom to God the Father after destroying every rule and every authority and power. ²⁵ For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. ²⁶ The last enemy to be destroyed is death. ²⁷ "For God has put all things in subjection under his feet." (1 Cor 15:27)

- 1. Adam: "as by a man came death" (15:21)
- 2. Christ: "by a man has also come the resurrection of the dead" (15:21)
- 3. In Adam: "all die" = mystical body of Adam (15:22)
- 4. <u>In Christ</u>: "all be made alive" = mystical body of Christ (15:22)
- 5. First-Fruits: Christ is the "first fruits" of the bodily resurrection (15:23)
- 6. <u>Under His Feet</u>: "all his enemies under his feet" (15:25)

The Lord God said to the serpent... I will put enmity between you and *the woman*, and between your seed and *her seed*; *he shall strike your head*, and you shall strike his heel." (Genesis 3:14-15)

The Living Tradition

<u>Ireneaus of Lyons</u>: [T]he knot of Eve's disobedience was loosed by the obedience of Mary. For what the virgin Eve had bound fast through unbelief, this did the virgin Mary set free through faith. (Irenaeus, Against Heresies 3.22.4 [2nd century A.D])

<u>Jerome of Stridon</u>: Death came through Eve, but life has come through Mary. (Jerome, *Letters* 22.21 [4th-5th century A.D.]; trans. Scaff, *NPNF2*, 6:30).

Benedict XVI: ...Mary, Mother of God, full of grace, fully docile to the action of the Holy Spirit, *already lives in God's Heaven with her whole being, body and soul*." (Benedict XVI, "Homily on the Solemnity of the Assumption," August 15, 2011).
