Ephesians 1:3-14—The Mystery of the Church

[¹ Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God,

To the saints who are also faithful in Christ Jesus:

² Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.]

³ Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, ⁴ even as he chose us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before him. ⁵ He destined us in love to be his sons through Jesus Christ, according to the purpose of his will, ⁶ to the praise of his glorious grace which he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved. ⁷ In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace ⁸ which he lavished upon us. ⁹ For he has made known to us in all wisdom and insight the mystery of his will, according to his purpose which he set forth in Christ ¹⁰ as a plan for the fulness of time, to unite all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth. (Ephesians 1:1-14)



The Living Tradition

<u>Vatican II</u>: The Son, accordingly, came, sent by the Father who, before the foundation of the world, chose us and predestined us in him for adoptive sonship. *For it is in him that it pleased the Father to restore all things* (cf. Eph. 1:4–5 and 10). *To carry out the will of the Father Christ inaugurated the kingdom of heaven on earth and revealed to us his mystery*; by his obedience he brought about our redemption. *The Church—that is, the kingdom of Christ already present in mystery—grows visibly through the power of God in the world....* All men are called to this union with Christ, who is the light of the world,

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from whom we go forth, through whom we live, and towards whom our whole life is directed. (Vatican II, Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, *Lumen Gentium* 1.3, trans. A. Flannery).

1. How does Paul's understanding of the "mystery" of God's will inform your own understanding of the Church? Do you think of the Church primarily as an institution, or as a mystery?
