	1Clem. 42:1 The Apostles received the Gospel for us from the Lord Jesus Christ; Jesus the Christ was sent forth from God. 2 So then Christ is from God, and the Apostles are from Christ. Both, therefore, came of the will of God in good order. 3 Having therefore <i>received their orders</i> and being fully assured by the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ and full of faith in the word of God, they went forth with the firm assurance that the Holy Spirit gives,[103] preaching the good news that the Kingdom of God was about to come. 4 So, preaching both in the country and in the towns, <i>they appointed their firstfruits</i> , when they had tested them by the Spirit, <i>to be bishops and deacons for the future believers</i> .
	1Clem. 44:1 Our apostles likewise knew, through our Lord Jesus Christ, that there would be strife over the bishop's office. 2 For this reason, therefore, having received complete foreknowledge, they appointed the officials mentioned earlier and afterwards they gave the offices a permanent character;[108] that is, if they should die, <i>other approved men should succeed to their ministry</i> .
