Bridal Bouquet

- 5 Yellow Ranunculus
- 5 White Lisianthus
- 3-5 Cream Spray Roses
- 5-7 White Roses
- Several sprigs of Feverfew
- 4-5 Yellow Carnations
- 2 Yellow Button Poms
- Sprigs of Baby Eucalyptus, Variegated Pittosporum, and Israeli Ruscus



Bridesmaid Bouquet


- 2 Yellow Ranunculus
- 2 White Lisianthus
- 1-2 Cream Spray Roses
- 2-3 White Roses
- Sprigs of Feverfew
- 2-3 Yellow Carnations
- 1Yellow Button Pom
- Sprigs of Greenery



Bouts & Corsages

1-2 Cream spray roses, yellow button poms, and lisianthus buds, with sprigs of greenery. Save a ranunculus for the groom's bout!

Recipes for Citrine Packages



2 Large Ceremony Urns or 2 Large Foam Cages for Arch

Per Urn or Cage:

- 13 White Roses
- 12 Yellow Carnations
- 10 Yellow Button Poms
- ½ bunch of Brillantina
- 1 bunch of Variegated Pittosporum
- 1 bunch of Baby Eucalyptus



10 Centerpieces with 5-6" Vase Diameter

- 2 Yellow Ranunculus
- 2-3 White Roses
- 2-3 Yellow Carnations
- 2-3 White Lisianthus buds
- 2 Cream Spray Roses
- Sprigs of Feverfew
- 1-2 Yellow Button Poms broken apart and dispersed
- Sprigs of Baby Eucalyptus, Variegated Pittosporum, and Brillantina

Recipes for Citrine Packages





25-30 Mason Jars -or-3-4" Vase Diameter

- 1 Yellow Ranunculus
- 1White Rose
- 1 Yellow Carnation
- 1 White Lisianthus bud
- 1 Cream Spray Rose
- Sprigs of Feverfew
- 1 Yellow Button Pom broken apart and dispersed
- Sprigs of Baby Eucalyptus,
 Variegated Pittosporum, and
 Brillantina

60-70 Bud Vases

Each one will look different. We average 2-3 blooms per bud vase and a sprig of greenery. These are the flowers allotted for bud vases:

- 20 Yellow Ranunculus
- 25 White Roses
- 25 Yellow Carnations
- 20 White Lisianthus
- 20 Cream Spray Roses
- 2 bunches of Feverfew
- 20 Yellow Button Poms
- 2 bunches of Baby Eucalyptus, 2 bunches of Variegated Pittosporum, 2 bunches of Brillantina

Special Care Notes

Special Flower Care Notes for Items Specific to this Package

- Roses and Lisianthus: Reflexing your roses and lisianthus is a baller florist
 move! Not only does it create visual interest, it makes your product
 larger, getting you more bang for your buck! I do this right before I pull
 the flower into a design.
- **Ranunculus**: Have 22 gauge straight floral wire on hand in case they are heavily curved and bending under their own weight. We have a Youtube video on how to do this!
- Carnations: Sometimes these guys can come in closed, but with carnations, you can easily use thumbs to push or 'mash' them open. They are extremely tough and hardy, and the only flower you can manhandle in that way.
- Feverfew: This little daisy is delicate and doesn't like extreme temps.

 Great to keep in cooler or fridge, if available. It's normal to have more loss and 'chewiness' within the bunch. Be prepared to snip off ugly pieces. So sensitive but so worth it! Treat your Feverfew with care and it will love you back!
- Bug Nibbles: Remember that you are working with unprocessed greenery, so you may find some leaves that have been munched. Just snip those away! Nibbles are typically found on seeded eucalyptus predominately
