Bridal Bouquet

- 5-6 White Anemones
- 5-6 Quicksand Roses
- 5-6 Burgundy Carnations
- Sprigs of Thistle
- 3-5 Deep Wine Ranunculus
- 3-5 Burgundy Scabiosa
- 3 Rubicon Spray Roses
- Sprigs of Leather Leaf, Israeli Ruscus, and Baby Eucalyptus



Bridesmaid Bouquet

- 3 Quicksand Roses
- 3 Burgundy Carnations
- Sprigs of Thistle
- 3 Deep Wine Ranunculus
- 3 Burgundy Scabiosa
- 1 Rubicon Spray Rose
- Sprigs of Greenery



Bouts & Corsages

Each one can look different. We average 1-2 spray rose buds or Thistle buds per bout, and 3 buds per corsage. Add sprigs of your favorite green!

2 Large Ceremony Urns or 2 Large Foam Cages for Arch

Per Urn or Cage:

- 13 Quicksand Roses
- 13 Burgundy Carnations
- 1 bunch of Leather Leaf and Baby Eucalyptus



10 Centerpieces with 5-6" Vase Diameter

- 3 White Anemones
- 2-3 Quicksand Roses
- 2-3 Burgundy Carnations
- 2 Burgundy Scabiosa
- Sprigs of Thistle
- Sprigs of Greenery

25-30 Mason Jars -or-3-4" Vase Diameter

- 1White Anemone
- 1 Quicksand Rose
- 1 Burgundy Carnation
- 1Burgundy Scabiosa
- Sprigs of Thistle
- Sprigs of Greenery



60-70 Bud Vases

Each one will look different. I average 2-3 blooms per bud vase and a sprig of green. These are the flower allotted for budvases:

- 30 White Anemones
- 25 Quicksand Roses
- 25 Burgundy Carnations
- 20 Burgundy Scabiosa
- 2 bunches of Thistle
- 2 bunches of Leather Leaf
- 2 bunches of Israeli Ruscus
- 1 bunch of Baby Blue Eucalyptus

Special Care Notes

Special Flower Care Notes for Items Specific to this Package

- Anemones: I love and hate'em. They are the fussiest flower that we sell and should be cared for carefully! Please give them their own vase, set them out at room temp until they open, and then, if you can, place them in the fridge until you're ready to design. Be sure and turn the fridge to the warmest setting and don't place them in the back because that's where it's coldest. As we mention on the product page, Anemones have a shorter vase life and typically have more loss. I average 6 good stems per bunch. Also, it is normal to see some slight spotting and imperfections, but this will blow-out in pictures. Refunds will not be given for minor imperfections.
- **Roses**: Reflexing your roses is a baller florist move! Not only does it create visual interest, it makes your product larger, getting you more bang for your buck! I do this right before I pull the flower into a design.
- Scabiosa: Scabiosa often comes with clear straws on the stem. Leave these on, even in your designs, if possible. I only remove if I want the stem to curve or stick out of an arrangement. Burgundy scabiosa can have lavender pollen that can be pinched off if you don't enjoy. Sometimes throughout the year, the petals will not be popped and you're more working with a bud.
- **Ranunculus**: Have 22 gauge straight floral wire on hand in case they are heavily curved and bending under their own weight. We have a Youtube video on how to do this!
- Carnations: Sometimes these guys can come in closed, but with carnations, you can easily use thumbs to push or 'mash' them open. They are extremely tough and hardy, and the only flower you can manhandle in that way.
- **Bug Nibbles:** Remember that you are working with unprocessed greenery, so you may find some leaves that have been munched. Just snip those away! Nibbles are typically found on seeded eucalyptus predominately
