## Bridal Bouquet

- 5-6 London Bell Roses
- 4-6 Pink Floyd Roses
- 4-5 Deep Violet Ranunculus
- 3-4 Minerva Carnations
- 5 Light Pink Lisianthus
- 3-4 Raspberry Scabiosa
- Sprigs of Gunni Eucalyptus, Leatherleaf Fern and Israeli Ruscus


## Bridesmaid Bouquet

- 2-3 London Bell Roses
- 2 Pink Floyd Roses
- 2 Deep Violet Ranunculus
- 2 Minerva Carnations
- 2 Light Pink Lisianthus
- 2 Raspberry Scabiosa
- Sprigs of Gunni Eucalyptus, Leatherleaf Fern and Israeli Ruscus



## Bouts \& Corsages

Average 1-2 light pink mini carnations buds per bout, and 3 buds per corsage. Add sprigs greens. I like to save a scabiosa or ranunculus for the groom's bout!

- 2-3 Pink Floyd Roses

- 2 Violet Ranunculus
- 3 Light Pink Mini Carnations
- Sprigs of Leatherleaf Fern, Israeli Ruscus and Gunni Eucalyptus

25-30 Mason Jars

- Or -

3-4" Vase Diameter

- 1 Pink Floyd Roses
- 1 Minerva Carnation
- 1Pink Lisianthus
- 1 Raspberry Scabiosa,
- 1Violet Ranunculus
- 1 Light Pink Mini Carnation
- Sprigs of Leatherleaf Fern, Israeli Ruscus and Gunni Eucalyptus


## 60-70 Bud Vases

Each one will look different. I average 2-3 blooms per bud vase and a sprig of green. These are the flower allotted for budvases:

- 25 Pink Floyd Roses
- 25 Minerva Carnations
- 20 Pink Lisianthus
- 20 Raspberry Scabiosa
- 20 Violet Ranunculus
- 20 Light Pink Mini Carnations
- 1 bunch of Leatherleaf Fern
- 3 bunches of Israeli Ruscus


## Special Care Notes

## Special Flower Care Notes for Items Specific to this Package

- Roses and Lisianthus: Reflexing your roses and lisianthus is a baller florist move! Not only does it create visual interest, it makes your product larger, getting you more bang for your buck! I do this right before I pull the flower into a design.
- Ranunculus: Have 22 gauge straight floral wire on hand in case they are heavily curved and bending under their own weight. We have a Youtube video on how to do this!
- Carnations: Sometimes these guys can come in closed, but with carnations, you can easily use thumbs to push or 'mash' them open. They are extremely tough and hardy, and the only flower you can manhandle in that way
- Bug Nibbles: Remember that you are working with unprocessed greenery, so you may find some leaves that have been munched. Just snip those away! Nibbles are typically found on seeded euc and salal predominately
