**recipes broken down per bouquet/centerpiece

- **Bridal:** 5-6 Romantic Antike garden roses, 3-5 red spray roses, 3-5 red ranunculus, 5-6 Sahara Roses, 3-4 burgundy carnations, 3-4 light pink lisianthus, sprigs of nagi, and seeded euc
- 5-7 Bridesmaids: 1 Romantic Anike, 2 red spray roses, 2 red ranunculus, 3-4 Sahara Roses, 2-3 burgundy carnation, 1-2 light pink lisianthus, sprigs of greens
- Bouts or Corsages: Average 1-2 spray rose buds per bout, and 3 buds per corsage. **Pro-Tip: Save a sexy ranunculus for the groom's bout!
- **2 Ceremony Urns or 2 Foam Cages for Arch:** 13 Freedom roses, 13 sahara roses, 13 burgundy carnations, 1/2 salal, 1 bu nagi, 1 bu silver dollar per cage or urn
- **10 Centerpieces with 5-6'' Vase Diameter:** 2-3 Freedom roses, 2-3 Sahara roses, 2-3 burgundy carns, 3 red ranunculus, 2 light pink lisianthus, sprigs of salal, seeded euc, and nagi
- **25-30 Mason Jar or 3'' Vase Diameter:** 1 Freedom roses, 1 Sahara roses, 1 burgundy carns, 1 red ranunculus, 1 light pink lisianthus, sprigs of salal, seeded euc, and nagi
- 50-60 Budvases: Each one will look different. I average 2-3 blooms per bud vase and a sprig of green. These are the flower allotted for bud vases: 25 Freedom roses, 25 Sahara roses, 25 burgundy carnations, 30 red ranunculus, 20 light pink lisianthus, 2 bunches of salal, seeded euc, and nagi

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SPECIAL FLOWER CARE NOTES FOR ITEMS SPECIFIC TO THIS PACKAGE:

- Romantic Antike Garden Roses: Garden roses in general are more delicate than standard roses. However, Romantic Antikes tend to be more so, and often have a 'floppy' appearance. While I love working with them and their vintage (Ok, they can look old) vibe, it sometimes rattles DIY brides. The head of the flower often needs to be supported by other blooms, so I typically tuck my Romantic's and nestle them around stronger flowers.P
- **Roses and Lisianthus:** Reflexing your roses and lisianthus is a baller florist move! Not only does it create visual interest, it makes your product larger, getting you more bang for your buck! I do this right before I pull the flower into a design.
- **Ranunculus**: Have 22 gauge straight floral wire on hand in case they are heavily curved and bending under their own weight. We have a Youtube video on how to do this!
- **Carnations:** Sometimes these guys can come in closed, but with carnations, you can easily use thumbs to push or 'mash' them open. They are extremely tough and hardy, and the only flower you can manhandle in that way.
- **Bug Nibbles:** Remember that you are working with unprocessed greenery, so you may find some leaves that have been munched. Just snip those away! Nibbles are typically found on seeded euc and salal predominately
