Bridal Bouquet

- Sprigs of Queen Anne's Lace
- 5-6 White Stock
- 4-6 Cream Spray Roses
- 4-6 White Lisianthus
- Sprigs of Greenery



Bridesmaid Bouquet

- 1-2 Sprigs of Queen Anne's Lace
- 3 White Stock
- 3 Cream Spray Rose
- 2-3 White Lisianthus
- Sprigs of greenery



Bouts & Corsages

Average 1-2 spray rose buds and greenery sprigs per bout, and 3 buds per corsage with greenery of your choice! Save a lisianthus for the groom's bout to make it special!

Recipes for White Wildflower Packages



2 Large Ceremony Urns or 2 Large Foam Cages for Arch

- Per urn or cage:
- 8-9 White Carnations
- 4-5 White Queen Anne's Lace
- 4-5 White Stock
- 4-5 White Snapdragons
- 4-5 Cream Spray Roses
- 4-5 Cushion Poms
- 1/2 Bunch Pennycress
- 1 Bunch Sword Ferm
- 1 Bunch Variegated Pittosporum



10 Centerpieces with 5-6" Vase Diameter

- 2-3 White Queen Anne's Lace
- 2-3 White Stock
- 2 Cream Spray Roses
- 2 White Lisianthus
- Sprigs of White Cushion Pom
- 1/4 Bunch Pennycress
- Sprigs of Variegated Pittosporum
- 4-5 Stems Sword Fern

Recipes for White Wildflower Packages



25-30 Mason Jars -or-3-4" Vase Diameter

- 1-2 White Queen Anne's Lace
- 1 White Stock
- 1 Cream Spray Rose
- 1 White Lisianthus
- 1 White Cushion Pom
- Sprigs of Pennycress, Sword Fern, and Variegated Pittosporum



60-70 Bud Vases

Each one will look different. I average 2-3 blooms per bud vase and a sprig of green. These are the flower allotted for centerpieces:

- 4 bunches Queen Anne's Lace
- 30 White Stock
- 20 Cream Spray Roses
- 20 White Lisianthus
- 2 bunches White Cushion Poms
- 3 bunches of Pennycress
- 3 bunches of Sword Fern
- 2 bunches of Variegated Pittosporum

Special Care Notes

Special Flower Care Notes for Items Specific to this Package

- **Queen Anne's Lace**: Can be droopy after shipping. Give them a deep cut, place in fresh, cool water, and let sit overnight to rehydrate.
- **Bug Nibbles:** Remember that you are working with unprocessed greenery, so you may find some leaves that have been munched. Just snip those away! Nibbles are typically found on eucalyptus and salal.
